In 2020, disease prevention and treatment has taken on new meaning for Rotary and for each of us amidst COVID-19. Our clubs have embarked on new service projects to slow the spread of the present pandemic and support the healthcare workers and first responders working tirelessly to treat our friends and neighbors that have been infected by the novel coronavirus. Rotarians and clubs across District 6360 have stepped up in a big way these last nine months and our communities and state are better for it. Remarkably, at the same time, many of our clubs continue their pre-pandemic service projects in addition to these COVID-19 efforts.

Of course, club projects aren't the only way Rotarians are responding to COVID-19. But, here again, the exigencies of living in a time of pandemic disease call on each of us to postpose those cherished gatherings (or take them virtual) to slow the spread of COVID-19. It's hard, to be sure, but sacrifices made this year, and a vaccine on the horizon, will help ensure that our clubs are meeting in person and we're back to those family meals just as soon as possible.

As 2020 draws to a close, I want to thank each and every Rotarian in District 6360 for the myriad of ways in which you've risen to the challenges of the last year and wish you and your families happy holidays and a joyous new year.

We can all agree that 2020 has been a challenging Rotary year on virtually every level. And the District 6360 Foundation Annual Raffle was no exception. But Board Trustee and Annual Raffle Chair, Stephen B. Harsh from the Haslett/Okemos Club, was determined that the Annual Raffle would happen as it had for many years. Under Steve's leadership, Board Trustees and Club representatives across the District drove great participation in their Clubs and the 2020 Raffle was even more successful than in previous years!

Do you know that each Club receives Foundation Youth Credits (20% of the ticket price - currently \$5 per ticket) for each ticket sold? The Club has one year to use the funds and is based on the Rotary fiscal year. Most Clubs use the funds to send one or more high school students to RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Academy). To receive reimbursement, the expenditure for RYLA (or other approved Youth projects) must be documented. Any unused funds revert to the District 6360 Foundation as unrestricted funds.

The Annual Raffle also provides the money for Clubs to apply for one matching grant award of up to \$5,000 each year. Has your Club applied for one yet? Endowing Peace...One Scholar at a Time


When **Bill Dimond** signed up to serve in Korea as a young man, he had never heard of Rotary International, let alone comprehend the organization's impact all over the world.

What Bill did learn through

his experience in Korea...which he carries in life, is the gift of peace and achieving it through conflict resolution rather than war.

Fast forward four decades; Bill Dimond joined Rotary with the Kalamazoo Sunrise Club. An active leader in his club and District 6360, Bill was named District Governor in 1990-2000. He shared that serving as district governor "took him places and showed him things he never thought he would experience." During this time, the Rotary Peace Scholars Program became one of Bill's passions.


Marshall Rotary Member Spotlight: Ron Ducheney

Williamston Rotary Club Helps Local Schools During Pandemic

Last spring, when schools were closed due to the Covid -19 pandemic and instruction moved online, **Williamston Sunrise Rotary** (WSR) donated \$4000 to Williamston Community Schools toward support for the children in our district who did not have internet access.

The \$4000 - from a Karl Sandelin Foundation grant of \$2000 plus matching funds from the WSR club - purchased 17 mobile hotspots that immediately provided opportunity for learning in families where internet access was limited. The potential is for

hundreds of families over time to have this opportunity as the mobile Hotspots can be reassigned at any time. Williamson Sunrise Rotary is proud to have contributed toward the enrichment of children in our community.

As Covid-19 continued over the summer and into fall to present everyone and every institution with challenges, WSR again rose to the challenge. With the decision by the Williamston school district to bring all staff into the buildings in the fall while continuing online learning, it was evident that safety procedures needed to be in place. In November 2020, we provided the Williamston school district with \$1850 toward the purchase of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to be used by all building personnel.

In addition, we are currently collaborating with Webberville and Dansville school districts on how we can support the meeting of their needs as a result of the current learning challenges. Andrew Smith, Dean of Students of Webberville High School, and Amy Hodgson, superintendent of Dansville Schools, met with our club to outline their plans and share their challenges in meeting learning needs. WSR funds have been set aside to support both districts with their ongoing efforts to provide instruction for all children in their districts.

Williamson Sunrise Rotary is honored to be able to continue to serve our local communities by providing the schools with much needed financial support to meet needs of children. We are and will continue to support schools and others whose efforts are directed to the youth of our communities. *They are the future.*





Benton Harbor Sunrise Rotary Club Donates Thanksgiving Baskets

The Benton Harbor Sunrise Rotary Club donated Thanksgiving Day Baskets again this year. Each basket had a handmade liner, a thawed Turkey, all the fixings for Thanksgiving, plus extra food. Club member Farai summed it up at a recent meeting, "We have the best Rotary Club."

East Lansing Rotary Club Helps Out at Thanksgiving

East Lansing Public Schools provided more than 500 bags of food to some students' families for Thanksgiving after Superintendent Dori Leyko put out a call for district families to help. Leyko called the response "tremendous." She sent out a request to ELPS families on Nov. 13, and within 24 hours, 110 families had signed up to provide five bags of food each — a total of 550 bags.

The 550 bags of food will help families who rely on ELPS food distribution make it through Thanksgiving week. When schools closed in March due to the pandemic, the district began distributing food to make sure families – particularly those that had relied on the free and reduced lunch program – continued to receive meals. The program permits schools to purchase food and receive a reimbursement from the federal government.

The Rotary Club of East Lansing and the E. Lansing Kiwanis Club helped deliver the bags. The two organizations have been reliable volunteers throughout the pandemic and have partnered with other local groups to create weekend kits of food that they also distribute.

Other families in the district will also receive Thanksgiving food baskets as part of a separate effort.



Meals on Wheels gets Grant Boost from St. Joseph-Benton Harbor Rotary Club

At a time when their services may be more important than ever before, Senior Nutrition Services and their operation of Meals on Wheels of Southwest Michigan have gotten a monetary boost from the Rotary Club of St. Joseph-Benton Harbor through the Rotary District 6360 Foundation.



In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Rotary International Foundation allocated grant funding for distribution through Rotary

District Foundations. As a result, the Rotary Club of St. Joseph-Benton Harbor applied for and was awarded \$3,750 in funding for Senior Nutrition Services/Meals on Wheels.

Club President Matt Hanley says "Our club takes pride in caring for the people in our community. Supporting Senior Nutrition Services/Meals on Wheels of Southwest Michigan over the years has made a real impact for seniors in our area. We are thankful that the Rotary International Foundation, through the Rotary District 6360 Foundation, made available these Disaster Relief funds to support such an important local organization."

Senior Nutrition Services/Meals on Wheels of Southwest Michigan have provided meals and more to local seniors for more than 30 years, dating back to 1988. With the COVID-19 pandemic, the organization has experienced a tsunami of need and new requests. Prior to COVID, they normally would deliver 300 meals in a day. In the early weeks of the pandemic, they experienced a 66-percent increase. That equates to roughly 200 new meal recipients at a cost of \$22,000 per month, at a minimum. In Southwest Michigan, the organization is one of the very few home-bound meal programs that continues to deliver at pre-pandemic rates. and volunteers continue to deliver meals and provide a small bit of normalcy for the seniors who have come to depend on them, not only for a nutritious meal but also for the daily check-in.

Jackson Polio Busters

The **two Jackson Rotary Clubs** formed a go-fund-me page called the **Jackson Polio Busters** to raise funds to celebrate World Polio Day. Information requesting donations were posted on the Breakfast Clubs Facebook page. The fund raiser was headed up by Mike Tackett, a Breakfast Club member and a polio survivor. The fund raiser was set up in early October and ended formally on November 7. All contributions received went directly to the Rotary International's Polio Plus account.

As of November 7, donations from club members and friends of Rotary plus a generous donation from the Rotary Foundation of Jackson County totaled \$3,675 toward a goal of \$3,500. With the match from the Bill Gates Foundation that total will grow to \$7,350. **We** want to thank all you contributed to this very worthy cause.



Harbor Country Rotary Club Civility Project Success

Our current time period is one of polarization and divisiveness. It is from this context that the idea for the Civility Project signs emerged. Our aim was to reduce the temperature of the discourse from disdain to civil dialogue. We hope that if we learn to listen to each other, we can find common ground that will help our country move forward. Our club decided to act and help remind ourselves, and our fellow citizens, that we are better than this, that we

need to act better than this. So, we designed yard signs on-line and ordered about 75 with the simple message: Choose to Be: Respectful, Civil, Kind and have distributed them around Harbor Country. (We can facilitate the ordering of the signs if other clubs are interested).

In the Rotary Four Way Test, which is our guiding Mission, we ask: Is it the Truth? Is it Fair to all concerned? Will it build Goodwill and Better Friendships? Will it be Beneficial to all? These signs, inviting us, to be kind, respectful and civil certainly help build better friendships and goodwill; might be beneficial to all; are fair, in the sense that the signs are not really political, instead they are appeals to public comity; and might help us all see the truth more clearly once the smoke of angry denunciations have cleared away. In all these ways, this simple project is in resonance with the Mission of Rotary and we hope will benefit the public exchange of ideas around Harbor Country.

The response so far has been heartening. Bikers have stopped and applauded, as well as pedestrians and motorists. Several business owners have asked for signs for their locations. We are thrilled. This Civility Project is not meant to be political. Instead, it is focused on tempering the discourse between all citizens so that we can productively interact with each other for the common good.

Marshall Rotary Club Works to Keep Kids Warm

The Marshall Rotary Club has partnered with Operation Warm to provide 42 new coats to Marshall area children. The Rotary Club had a "Cookies for Coats" fundraiser in October to raise funds for the purchase of coats. The Rotarians have coordinated with Marshall Area Community Services (MACS) to distribute the coats.
