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The Presence of Justice

February is Rotary's Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution Month and I've been thinking a lot about what Rotarians mean when we talk about the concept of peace. Putting an end to armed conflict? Yes, surely. But, I think Rotarians mean more. We mean assisting the more than 70 million people across the world who have been displaced from their homes by violence, persecution, and human rights violations. Ameliorating privation and the other drivers of conflict surely fits the bill as well for an organization charged with Doing Good in The World. Martin Luther King Jr. observed that "true peace is not merely the absence of tension; it is the presence of justice." Now that sounds like what we are striving for in our communities, our country, and across the globe as Rotarians.

In many ways, our organization's long-overdue focus on diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) is part and parcel of peace and conflict prevention/resolution and is key to ensuring the "presence of justice" in RI and more broadly. To that end, President Holger recently announced that our own RI Director, Valarie Wafer, will be chairing Rotary's DEI Taskforce, which is charged with shaping a comprehensive action plan with achievable, measurable and meaningful outcomes for Rotary. The Board of Directors also adopted a DEI statement for Rotary International that I believe does an excellent job encapsulating our commitment to building a more welcoming Rotary family:

As a global network that strives to build a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change, Rotary values diversity and celebrates the contributions of people of all backgrounds, regardless of their age, ethnicity, race, color, abilities, religion, socioeconomic status, culture, sex, sexual orientation, and gender identity.

Rotary will cultivate a diverse, equitable, and inclusive culture in which people from underrepresented groups have greater opportunities to participate as members and leaders.

It's easy to think that promoting peace and preventing conflict is the job of governments and world leaders, but the reality is that we each must play our part in our daily lives, in our Rotary clubs, and in the projects we choose to undertake. District 6360, for example, has committed \$25,000 to supporting Rotary's six Peace Centers located at seven prestigious universities across the world to offer Rotary Peace Fellows a rigorous program of study and applied field experience in areas relating to peace and conflict resolution. It's a start, but there's much work left to be done. It's one more reason the world needs Rotary. Stay safe, Rotarians.

DISTRICT 6360 FOUNDATION HELPS FEED THE HUNGRY IN SOUTHWEST MICHIGAN

Your District 6360 Foundation established a COVID-19 Food Fund this past June. The Foundation's Trustees allocated \$50,000 from its endowment (twenty-five \$2,000 grants) for this purpose. The District 6360 Foundation was established by District 6360 Rotarians to help District Rotary Clubs better finance their service projects in their communities and the world.

The Foundation's Trustees recognized that the pandemic had disrupted our economy and, as a result, people were going hungry. The COVID-19 Food Fund was established for Rotary Clubs to help their communities assist those in need of food. Clubs were able to apply for a \$2,000 grant. Twenty-four clubs applied and were awarded grants for the following purposes: human nutrition including but not limited to food banks, soup kitchens, food pantries, Meals on Wheels, backpack food programs, programs that prevent malnutrition, etc.

District 6360 Foundation President Gene Svebakken said, "We are delighted that so many clubs got involved in partnering with local food distributors in their communities to provide food for those who, perhaps for the first time in their lives, found themselves needing assistance. This is truly a once-in-a-lifetime emergency and the Foundation responded accordingly."



Gene added, "We still have one more grant available. Remember NO MATCH IS REQUIRED! There is no submission deadline. Applications will be considered on a first-come-first-served basis."

Clubs interested in applying should use the existing **Karl Sandelin grant application** that is located on the District 6360 website <u>HERE</u>. **Please be sure to type COVID-19 FOOD FUND on the application** as these grants are not Karl Sandelin grants. Requests will be processed similarly to Karl Sandelin grant applications. If you have any questions, contact the Grant Chair listed on the application form.

Updates from District 6360 Rotary Foundation Committee

The Rotary Foundation Trustees and Rotary International Board of Directors have both unanimously approved adding a new area of focus: supporting the environment.

More than \$18 million in Foundation global grant funding has been allocated to environment-related projects over the past five years. Creating a distinct area of focus to support the environment will give Rotary members even more ways to bring about positive change in the world and increase our impact. RI President Mark Maloney says that during his travels around the world as a Rotary senior leader he encountered many Rotary members and Rotaractors who advocated for the environment to be an area of focus.

"I believe strongly that our Rotary Foundation programs now have a valuable added dimension to our efforts," says, Maloney. Foundation Trustee Chair Gary C.K. Huang says that with the global population reaching near eight billion, protecting the environment is increasingly important. "It is time for us to use our collective resources to invest in a smart and efficient way to protecting our environment," says Huang. "We are qualified to take this initiative because we are a global group of problem solvers with diversified talents."

In 1990-91, RI President Paulo V.C. Costa made the environment one of his primary causes, creating the Preserve Planet Earth subcommittee, which looked at ways clubs and members could conduct environmental initiatives. "We have finally caught up to Costa [his vision]," says Past RI President Ian H.S. Riseley, chair of the Environmental Issues task force, which championed the new area of focus. "As a lifelong environmentalist, I'm delighted that our great organization has recognized that the environment is a worthy and appropriate destination for our project activity," says Riseley. "This is an exciting moment in Rotary history."

Supporting the environment becomes Rotary's seventh area of focus, which are categories of service activities supported by global grants. It joins peacebuilding and conflict prevention; disease prevention and treatment; water, sanitation, and hygiene; maternal and child health; basic education and literacy; and community economic development.

Grant applications for projects will be accepted beginning on July 1. Gifts and commitments from Rotarians and others will be sought to provide global support for the new area of focus.

Did you know . . . The Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group (ESRAG) advocated for the addition of the Supporting the Environment as the seventh area of focus for Rotary. The group argued that it would help to maximize the success of environmentally-focused projects.

Cereal City Sunrise Rotary Club Establishes Relationship with Caribbean Rotary Club

The **Cereal City Sunrise Rotary Club** recently hosted a virtual meeting with the **Rotary Club of Liamuiga**, the morning breakfast club on the Federation of St. Kitts and Nevis.

A club member, Tom Cramutolo, recently visited the island and is considering purchasing property there for a winter home. He struck up a friendship with the local Rotary Club and made the connection. He discovered there is a huge American presence on the islands and they are eager to welcome Americans to their "paradise."

"This is another example of Rotary's worldwide impact and appeal," Kelly O'Connor, Club President said. "One of the positive outcomes of the pandemic is our ability to have remote virtual programs from anywhere in the world."

The program was presented by Dr. Marcus Natta, a native of St. Kitts who was educated at the University of Nebraska. He said that Rotary is one of the driving social and cultural forces on the islands. Some of his clubs' project include a diabetes footcare clinic, a youth spelling bee and a meal service for the island's elderly. His club also sponsors a New Year's Gala each year which is their largest fund-raiser and one of the Island's most festive and anticipated events.

The Federation of St. Kitts and Nevis has a population of 54,000, similar to the City of Battle Creek, with 42,000 on St. Kitts and 12,000 on Nevis.

The Club also works with the Rotary Club of Nevis on their partner island. Both clubs have worked to improve the fresh water systems of both islands.

The Cereal City Sunrise Rotary Club is looking at some possible joint projects with the clubs and some international exchanges in the future, according to O'Connor.

Miracles Do Happen! That's How India Won

the Battle Against Polio

On January 13, 2021, India celebrated ten years without polio, the last patient to be diagnosed with the disease on this date in 2011 being two-yearold Rukhsar of Howrah.

In 2012, the government of India and Rotary organised a polio summit at Vigyan Bhawan, New Delhi and just before the inauguration, Bruce Avlward from the World Health Organisation (WHO), Geneva, came to the dais and announced that India had been removed from the active list of polio endemic countries.

On March 26, 2014, India was certified by WHO and declared polio-free. That is the reason why January 13 is a memorable day in the public health history calendar.

It was estimated that in 1988, 450 children in India were affected by polio every day. Only 1 out of 200 children who contracted the poliovirus got paralyzed. The other 199 went undetected. Experts opined that India would be the last country in the world to eradicate polio (even as late as in 2002), because of its huge cohort of 170 million children below the age of 5, the population density, unsanitary conditions, impure drinking water, and enteric diseases, etc.

India's victory over polio was achieved after a long drawn struggle. From 3,50,000 children affected by Polio in 122 countries of the world in the '80s, the global partnership of Rotary with WHO, UNICEF, Centre for the Control of Diseases and Prevention (CDC), Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, and numerous partners except for Afghanistan and Pakistan, the world as of now is free of polio. Rotary has contributed more than \$1.7 billion and countless volunteer hours to immunise more than 2.5 billion children in countries worldwide.

Rotary's advocacy efforts have also played a significant role in decisions by donor governments to add more than \$7.2 billion to the effort.


India has been very fortunate that irrespective of the party in power, the immunisation efforts continued year after year. Uttar Pradesh and Bihar, however, had problems with minority communities boycotting immunisation due to false rumours. The government encouraged Rotary to develop a connect with these communities. Through notable work conducting free polio corrective surgeries and befriending Ulemas this hurdle too was crossed. Rotary took up the responsibility of supplying the entire polio vaccine stock and also funding the activities of WHO and UNICEF in the country.

In August 2020, Nigeria, and all of Africa as a result, were declared polio-free. The only countries with polio cases now are Pakistan and Afghanistan. All efforts are being focused on them and after three years of nil cases the entire world will then be polio free, the second disease to be vanguished after smallpox.

Step by step, overcoming hurdles, never losing determination despite setbacks, the Indian government with Rotary and other partners moved forward.

Indeed, the last decade has shown that persistence, perseverance and perspiration can move mountains. Victor Hugo, well known poet and novelist rightly said, "Perseverance, secret of all triumphs."
