DGN Kathy Gallagher, who also serves as District Rotary Foundation Committee Chair, has put together three Zoom webinars, starting this month, to make sure that our Rotarians can access this important training safety and conveniently.

Finally, March marks one year since the novel coronavirus arrived in Michigan. One year since our clubs and our District moved to virtual meetings and masking up. One year since we all found ourselves needing to adapt Rotary and our projects to a new reality. It's been a long, challenging year. But, with vaccination efforts moving forward and the prospect of retuning in-person Rotary meetings on the horizon, I pause to reflect on how we could not have made it this far without the perseverance, selflessness, and hard work of Rotarians, including those I named above. ### **2021-2022** Rotary International Theme: *Serve to Change Lives*

Incoming Rotary International President **Shekhar Mehta** urged members to become more involved in service projects, saying that caring for and serving others is the best way to live because it changes not only other people's lives, but also our own.

Mehta, a member of the Rotary Club of Calcutta-Mahanagar, West Bengal, India, revealed the 2021-22 presidential theme, *Serve to Change Lives*, to incoming District Governors on 1 February during the Rotary International Assembly. "Rotary kindled the spark within me to look beyond myself and embrace humanity," he said. "Service became a way of life for me and I, like many others, adopted the guiding philosophy that 'Service is the rent I pay for the space I occupy on this earth, and I want to be a good tenant of this earth."

Mehta encouraged District Governors-elect to lead by example during their term and inspire Rotary and Rotaract members to participate in projects that have measurable and sustainable impacts. He's asking each club to conduct a Rotary Day of Service.

"At the end of your term as district governor, you should feel that because of your leadership, because of your inspiration to Rotarians and Rotaractors, the world has changed for the better because of the service done by them during the year," he said.

#### Focusing on Diversity, Membership


For the 2021-22 Rotary year, Mehta wants members to focus their efforts on empowering girls and ensuring their access to education, resources, services, and opportunities so that future generations of women leaders will have the tools they need to succeed. Mehta asked members to use Rotary's belief that diversity, equity, and inclusion is critical in all we do as a compass to guide this work.

Increasing membership while also continuing our commitment to eradicating polio, fighting COVID-19, and serving our communities is an ambitious goal. "And that should excite you," Mehta said. "Rotarians love challenges." Read more HERE.

### **Does Your Rotary Club Need Grant Money?**

Each year, your D6360 Foundation's Karl Sandelin Grants provide funds to Rotary Clubs within District 6360 for community service projects. This year there is much more need in our communities and your District 6360 Foundation would love to help your Rotary Club fulfill some of those needs. Grants from \$500 to \$5,000 are available. Completed applications are due April 30 and will be awarded in June upon approval by the Foundation's Board of Trustees.

We invite your Club to submit a grant application. Click HERE to access the Karl Sandelin Grant application's policies, guidelines, and instructions. Your Club must follow all policies, guidelines and instructions so that the District 6360 Foundation's Grants Review Committee may appraise your request appropriately. The Committee scores each application based on the items listed on the application's policies, guidelines, and instructions. Please note that Clubs must match the requested grant amount dollar for dollar up to \$5,000. In-kind contributions will not be considered in the match. The awarded funds are available to be used when the awardee requests them.

Karl Sandelin Grants are funded mostly by the Annual District 6360 Foundation Raffle. Therefore, the Grants Review Committee does give some consideration to the level of participation in the Raffle by the Club submitting the application. Raffle tickets are \$25 each and ticket purchasers have the opportunity to win many fabulous cash prizes. Each Club in the District is assigned a certain number of tickets to sell based on their number of members. Many Clubs are 100% Clubs meaning that they consistently – year after year - sell every raffle ticket they are allotted! We will be highlighting those Clubs in a future newsletter article. The more tickets Rotarians sell each year, the more money that will be available to fund Karl Sandelin Grants. Below is a list of the grants awarded in the 2020 grant cycle. ### SWM Interact Clubs Raise over \$38,000 to Help Others



Since 2019, the SWM Interact Clubs have raised over \$38,000 to bring education, housing, food and medical care to Haitian families living among sugar cane fields in La Romana, Dominican Republic. The effort has kept 120 kids living in a remote village called a Batey, in school. The Herald Palladium newspaper has been very supportive of the Club featuring efforts in PR, which has helped raise interest in Rotary.

This past January, the Interact Clubs

used funds to send \$9,000 to the DR to help ensure school age children stayed connected to what is now virtual school through donations of Tablets, WIFI and Hotspots. The partnering club coordinating the effort was the Rotary Club of La Romana Rio Dulce and the Dominican Republic Department of Education applauded the effort. Interact Club Members are now preparing for their annual mission trip to the Dominican Republic, which will take place this August. During the trip, students will build a home and learn more about a prosthetics clinic that is being built.

### Benton Harbor SR Rotary Club Build Desks for Students in Need



As students all across the globe have been forced to convert some part of their home into a school desk due to remote learning conditions during the pandemic, not everyone has been able to find the best solution. Fortunately, for members of the Boys & Girls Clubs of Benton Harbor, there are some great people at the Benton Harbor Sunrise Rotary Club working to resolve that.

With the transition from in-

classroom to remote learning during the COVID-19 pandemic, students are trying to find a place to study. Many times, kitchen tables or coffee tables are stand-ins for classroom desks. Sometimes the bed, the floor or a lap is all that is available in homes where extra furniture may be considered but not easily afforded. In those instances, concentration for the student is exceedingly difficult.

Benton Harbor Sunrise Rotary Club members agreed to assist and to participate in a matching grant to raise \$1,500.00 to be used towards building desks for kids in 1st to 6th grades who are in need and whose parents would not otherwise be able to buy a desk for their child.

Brian Saxton, former Rotary Club president and past CEO of the Boys & Girls Clubs of Benton Harbor, knows that a conducive home learning environment is not just a need during a pandemic. It provides the foundation for academic success, impacts school attendance, grades, development of study habits, and increasing skills proficiency. He immediately drew up a proposal to raise funds for the "Home School Desks for Vulnerable Students" project to present to the Berrien Community Foundation and for the Heart of Cook grant in hopes to raise enough money to build 500 desks.

Brent and Dave built 15 desks over the course of three weeks, and 13 of those desks were given to families in need through the Boys & Girls Clubs of Benton Harbor on January 27th.

Recently the Benton Harbor Sunrise Rotary Club became, with its members, the Benton Harbor Interact Club teens and other community volunteers, part of the growing army of desk builders inspired by Brent and Dave. At the same time, they are honoring the Rotary Club's mission to improve literacy, numeracy, and the personal development of the youth in Benton Harbor as well as Rotary International's vision statement; "Together, we see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change – across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves."
