In recent years, Rotary has rightly emphasized ensuring that our membership reflects the diversity of our communities and prioritizing inclusion in the work of our clubs, the district, and Rotary International. The RI Board of Directors recently voted to create a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Task Force to put forth a plan for meaningful action that creates measurable, lasting change throughout Rotary. In addition, a stubborn glass ceiling was shattered last month when the Nominating Committee selected Jennifer Jones, a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, Canada, to become Rotary International's president for 2022-2023. She will be the first woman to hold that office in our organization's 115-year history. Jennifer is a long-time friend of District 6360 and a superb choice. I hope that Jones' selection will inspire us all to redouble efforts to recruit and retain a diverse membership and prompt other Rotarians—especially women—to step into leadership roles in our organization.

On August 25, after four years without a single case of wild polio, the 47 countries in the African region were certified free of wild poliovirus. The magnitude of this accomplishment cannot be overstated and it would not have been possible without the work of Rotary over the course of the last 35 years. You can learn more about polio eradication in the African region here: www.africakicksoutwildpolio.com. Of course, our work to end polio is yet unfinished. Polio remains endemic in both Afghanistan and Pakistan and we can't afford to rest on our laurels. Take a moment to make a contribution to PolioPlus marking this milestone. Together, we can keep Rotary's promise to the children of the world, drop to zero, and end polio for good.

Who wouldn't prefer shopping unmasked? Yes, there are undoubtedly reasons to be discouraged. Rotary is helping me choose inspiration over discouragement. I hope it does the same for you. Together, we can celebrate these milestones and then get back to doing the daily work of bringing **Service Above Self** alive across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves.

- The person must demonstrate willingness, commitment, and ability to fulfill the duties and responsibilities of the office of governor, as well as knowledge of the duties and responsibilities of the office of governor.
- The person must have been a member of a Rotary club for at least seven (7) years at the time of taking office as governor.

The official "District Governor Nominee Nomination Form" must be used, and a Resolution by the club must also accompany the completed form. The form is available from the District Office. Jennifer Jones, Nominated as First Woman RI President

Jennifer E. Jones, a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, Canada, has been nominated to become Rotary International's president for 2022-23, a groundbreaking selection that will make her the first woman to hold that office in the organization's 115-year history. Jones will officially become president-nominee on 1 October if no other candidates challenge her.

Jones says she sees Rotary's Action Plan as a catalyst for increasing Rotary's impact. "As we reflect upon our new strategic priorities, we could have never envisioned that our ability to adapt would become our North Star during what is inarguably the most profound time in recent history," Jones said in her vision statement. "Silver linings rise out of the most challenging circumstances. Using metric-driven goals, I will harness this historic landscape to innovate, educate, and communicate opportunities that reflect today's reality." Read more <u>HERE</u>.

Donation Matching Program Begins September 1

Rotarians Doing Good In Their Communities Thanks to The Rotary Foundation!

In the August newsletter, we featured some of the projects made possible through the district designated funds through The Rotary Foundation. Let's take a look at a few more of the projects planned for 2020-2021!!

Thanks to all of the Rotarians in District 6360 who invest in and enhance their communities and citizens through your projects. Special thanks to the Rotarians who support the Rotary Foundation Annual Fund which makes grant funding available each year!

Wagner Building Energy Efficiency/ADA Compliant

The Marshall Rotary Club will complete its restoration of an historic building that houses a visual arts studio. This grant will be used to make the building completely compliant with the American with Disabilities Act, especially providing access and safety equipment (handrails /, safety rails and bathroom fixtures) on all

levels of the facility.

Prairie Ridge Elementary Reading Program

The Oshtemo Rotary Club visits the local elementary school to read with the students during Reading Month (March). At the conclusion of the month, each student will receive a new book that is for them to keep. The money for this grant is used to purchase the new books.

Summer Step up Program

With this grant, the Otsego Rotary Club will introduce the Summer Step-Up to Literacy project to help prevent the summer slide with students at Otsego Public Schools. This program gets books in the hands of students during the summer months while school is not in Water and Sanitation

session. This program's strategic action is to increase summer reading, maintain reading skills and abilities, and prevent the "summer slide." This has a greater impact on our lower-income families, but the reality is that the summer slide can affect any child. It is an ongoing challenge that schools face every year, and is discouraging development for our most at-risk learners.

Saugatuck-Douglas Boys & Girls Club

The Rotary Club of Saugatuck-Douglas launched an effort to bring permanent and much needed after school and summer programs to the Saugatuck public schools. One of the major components of cost to deliver after school and summer program is dedicated supplies and equipment. This grant will provide for supplies for educational, art, physical education and technology needs.

Small Business Relief Online Technology Resources

The Rotary Club of Saugatuck-Douglas will create an online learning platform for local organizations dealing with the methods, practices, and tools for customer relationship management. The online learning platform will consist of short videos, full instruction guides, and access to skilled technology consultants for the purpose of bringing all customer-facing organizations up to par with the latest technologies for customer engagement via websites and social media, e-commerce and online payments, and advertising through online media outlets.

District 6360 Pilot Speaking Program with Toastmasters International

In January of this year, Rotary International and Toastmasters International announced an alliance to bring Toastmaster speaker training to Rotarians. This alliance will enable members of Rotary to enhance their skills, broaden their network, and increase their positive impact in their community through their voice.

Toastmasters created a set of eight structured communication and leadership development courses for Rotary based on the Pathway learning model they have for their members. The program is now available for online learning through the Rotary Learning Center, learn.rotary.org.

In the last couple of months, a joint group of members from Lansing area Toastmasters and Rotary have met to develop a pilot program to bring these new teachings to Rotarians. This in-person pilot program will be lead by Toastmasters who will help Rotarians sharpen their speaking skills.

The program will kick off in January and be held twice a month. Right now we are planning on Zoom for this first cohort. The nine-week program will proceed through the Toastmaster paths of learning that has been developed for Rotarians.

Our friends at Toastmasters will lead the program, which will be limited to ten Rotarians for this first round. Rotarians will be given the chance to craft and deliver a speech to their peers while being evaluated by the Toastmaster leaders.

We hope that both the members of Toastmasters and Rotary will benefit from this program; Rotarians will gain new skills in public speaking and leadership while Toastmasters will learn how we serve our communities through service projects and following the Four Way Test.

Why is this program so important to us as Rotarians and why should you participate? As Rotarians we are encouraged to get up in front of our club each week to share with our fellow members, whether it is a Happy/Sad Dollar or if you are the featured speaker. What if we use these lessons from Toastmasters to craft our speaking time to be meaningful and powerful during that time? We can make an even greater difference in our world with our words.

Marshall Rotary Restores Downtown Marshall Building



This huge project has made possible primarily by Marshall Rotary Club and its members, and has saved Marshall's first building to be made part of the National historic register. Marshall Rotarians have been working on restoring the Wagner building since 2012, volunteering thousands hours and many Marshall Rotary Foundation and District Foundation grants. This building was purchased in 2012 for \$170,000 and is currently in the final phase of renovations for its 150th anniversary. The building has recently been appraised for near two million dollars with the completion of its 1st to 3rd floor elevator and south extension.



COVID Doesn't Deter South Haven Rotarians: Virtual Pancake Breakfast Great Success!



While the COVID pandemic has kept organizations from their normal activities in recent months it hasn't deterred **South Haven Rotarians** from remaining active in the community as evidenced by a successful virtual fundraiser this past Sunday, Aug 9.

For nearly 50 years the Rotarians had sponsored a pancake breakfast at the South Haven Airport in conjunction with the National Blueberry Festival. That wasn't possible this year because of COVID and the absence of a traditional

festival schedule. So the Rotarians decided to go it alone, safely.

The Rotarians sponsored a virtual pancake breakfast fundraiser. The event from the downtown pavilion was streamed live on Facebook with a goal of raising \$9,000 in 90 minutes. The result was hundreds of donations, mostly on-line, **totaling \$11,000**. Those who came to the pavilion to watch the production and make a donation received safely packaged Jiffy pancake mix and freshly picked blueberries from DeGrandchamp Farms of South Haven. Delicious home-cooked pancake breakfasts abounded throughout the community!



Co-chairs Rosalie Plechaty and Dan Thompson hosted the production that featured many of the organizations benefiting from Rotary contributions. The South Haven Rotarians over the past year contributed a record \$51,000 to local, regional and international non-profit organizations. *Congratulations!*

Passport Club: A Rotary club that allows members to attend other Rotary club meetings as long as they attend a specified number of meetings in their own club each year. This style appeals to those who travel frequently, or those who enjoy trying a variety of club experiences and meeting lots of new people. Learn more in the Guide to Passport Clubs. Minimum number of members to charter: 20

Types of Rotary Clubs, continued...

Corporate Club: A club whose members (or most of them) work for the same employer. This style appeals to those employees of an organization who want to come together to do good in their community. Minimum number of members to charter: 20

Cause-Based Club: A club whose members are passionate about a particular cause and focus their service efforts in that area. This style appeals to those people who want to connect with others while addressing a particular set of problems. Minimum number of members to charter:20

Alumni-based Club: A club whose members (or most of them) are former Rotary or Rotary Foundation program participants. This style appeals to those who have participated in Rotary outside of a club. Minimum number of members to charter: 20

Rotaract Club: A club of members ages 18-30 that is sponsored by a Rotary club and often works with that club on projects. This style appeals to people ages 18-30 who want to serve their communities, develop leadership and professional skills, and have fun through service. Learn more in the Rotaract Handbook.
