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**Geoff Roehll** said that with the departure of John Krummen, Club membership stands at 38. John has accepted a position as director of the project



The Rotary District 6450 Polio Plus Society is seeking cash donations as part of a Rotary International (RI) push to eliminate the disease

for good. Grants Chairman **Bruce George** says Rotarians can contribute by joining the Polio Plus Society and donating \$100 a year. RI says it "has been working to eradicate polio for over 30 years, and our goal of ridding the earth of this disease is in sight. We started in 1979 with vaccinations for 6 million children in the Philippines. Today, Afghanistan and Pakistan are the only countries where polio remains endemic." Bruce also urges Rotarians to give charitable donations to the Rotary Annual Fund, which is suffering from declining Rotary membership worldwide. Donations to both funds can be made on the District website.
