Representatives of Administer Justice explained how their organization provides low-cost legal services to those who cannot afford them. **Mark Garavaglia** said, "one in three Americans cannot afford a lawyer, and every year, 46-million citizens are turned away from legal help."

Emily O'Donnell said, "If you're a victim of a crime you have to fend for yourself; Only those accused of a crime get a public defender."

There are 71 Justice Centers in 15 states; 17 are in Illinois. "What they need," explained O'Donnell, "is exposure and contributions to fund new centers. Help us get the word out. It costs \$5,000 to launch a new center." Clients pay \$30 for a 45-minute session with an attorney. Also needed are volunteer attorneys: "Give us your time once a month for three to four hours."

For the past 20 years, **Roger Breisch** manned a suicide
hotline out of Batavia. He
said the job is still
emotionally draining. Those
he speaks with, including
many adolescents, beat
themselves up...defining
themselves using "words in

red," like "failure," "boring," "lazy," "worthless," and "unwanted." Breisch said for adolescents "it feels like the end of the world because they don't have the wisdom and experience that come with adulthood. He added, "when you're lonely and in darkness, reach out...find a truth teller who knows you and loves you."

Citizens Appreciate Public Safety (CAPS) is a Naperville community group that recognizes

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public safety personnel for their contributions to the City. CAPS Chairman Wes Warnette said, each year, Naperville residents are asked to nominate public safety employees who have served "above and beyond the



call of duty and exhibited a genuine concern for the welfare and well-being of all Naperville citizens."

The CAPS Board "comprises residents from the Naperville community who discuss and decide on specific incidents and actions, accomplished throughout the year by Fire and Police Department personnel, that deserve recognition. A CAPS Awards event honoring the Naperville Police Department is held each May and a CAPS Awards event honoring the Naperville Fire Department is held in October. The public is always welcome."

Honduras Health Project

International Committee Co-Chairs **Dawn Newman** and **Deb Newman** discussed a project providing sanitary products to young women in Honduras. The aim is to prevent the students from having to take a break from school during menstruation. Dawn said a grant has been approved to fund supplies for the project, which will benefit from assistance from Interact students. The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) is working to "level the educational playing field" in developing countries where girls often get short shrift academically. Dawn said some policy makers have argued that menstruation may be causing girls to miss a significant number of school days.
