Committee member Amy Hopkins noted that "Currently, 71 percent of membership leads are never contacted by clubs." The good news, said Nick, is that District 6450 is doing a better job than Rotary International when it comes to recruiting members under the age of 40. "Our District is not in competition with R.I., but we're winning!"

Why do members choose to stay in Rotary? Amy said, "club experience matters most." That includes five elements: 1) meeting enjoyment 2) confidence in club leadership; 3) personal growth opportunities;

- 4) experiencing meaningful service; and
- 5) making business connections



Amy urges each club to create its own "elevator speech" based on personal stories and personalities; don't rely on outside sources such as Google. "Draw (potential new members) in with an 'aha'

moment; personalize your speech with a story about a Rotary experience that stands out for you. Brag on yourself!"
