Avenues of Service

Proceeds from the Trivia Night event are being distributed to the Cherish Watoto ministry in Kenya. According to International Chair **Dawn Newman**, the money will be used primarily to fund scholarships. The goal is to get the kids out of the community and into high school and continue their progress toward higher education.

Standing in for Dawn, **Deb Newman** said it costs \$1,000 to outfit a high-school-bound student with books, shoes and other necessities. "If they don't move on to high school, they go back into the slums to fend for themselves."

Our Club is also assisting with the Pink Box program, which has distributed over 10,000 feminine hygiene products in Honduras. Sewing machines enable Honduran women to start their own businesses and boost local manufacturing, Deb said. "we're also supporting a grant for furniture and educational supplies for a school in Honduras, and another grant to fund a diagnostic imaging center in Mexico."

Shifting to Community Service, Chairwoman Deb clicked off the array of programs undertaken by our Club:

- Clean Sweep, including the annual cleanup of the garden at St. Patrick's Residence
- Holiday gifts (under evaluation)
- Diaper/food drives for the WSC Pantry
- School backpacks (under evaluation)
- Rotary Ride
- St. Paddy's Day run and walk
- Naper Lights
- Donations to Kids Matter, YMCA, DuPage Children's Museum, Little Friends, 360 Youth Services, the Grow Wellness Foundation, Teen-Parent Connection, the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI DuPage), the Naperville Education Foundation, Indian Prairie Educational Foundation, and the Turning Pointe Autism Foundation.

Mary Ann Bobosky's Vocational Service update underscored youth education and making the most of limited funds. She said the committee is allocating \$8,000 across several essential projects, including a scholarship. "We were able to help the Kids Matter Volunteer Fair, the District 203 Career Fair, (and) the Lego League Tournament."



\$5,000 of the fund was awarded as an "Above and Beyond" scholarship to **Emily Wu**, a star senior graduating from Neuqua Valley High School. A certified mathematics instructor, Emily, will attend MIT on the pre-med track with a degree in biotechnology. She

currently volunteers in the Department of Biomedical Imaging at St. Joseph's Hospital in Joliet.

Building confidence - In her brief, Youth Service Chairwoman **Lynne Nolan**, said "our vision is to engage youth by supporting local Interact clubs and inviting teens to assist at our community events such as Naper Lights and the 5K." Lynne said Interact students are provided necessary resources and encouraged to assume leadership roles and use grants to develop their own desired projects. "We create that space in which students can grow," she said.

They include 75 miles of bike paths, 76 ball fields, 24 pickleball courts, Centennial Beach, Knoch Knolls Nature Center, Naperville River Walk (maintenance), the **Alfred Rubin** Riverwalk Community Center, early childhood and senior programs, and two golf courses. Brad said the popular Ft. Hill Activity Center presents "capacity issues," with long wait lists for some activities.
