Rockin' Robin

In 1920, Walter Fredenhagen bought the Naperville Creamery, which delivered ice and milk for Naperville's burgeoning ice boxes. The creamery was located near what is now Fredenhagen Park. In a stroke of good luck, Borden Milk purchased his business six months before the 1929 market crash.

As described to us by Fredenhagen's grandson, **Tom Castagnoli** (right), in 1931 the entrepreneur teamed with **Earl Prince** to create the Prince Castle ice cream store chain and sell directly to customers, rather than to other vendors. The enterprise grew



to 50 stores, with the two men splitting management responsibilities and profits 50-50.

The business evolved, and hamburgers were added to the menu. Then Fredenhagen decided to change the name of his stores to Cock Robin, a familiar local franchise until being overwhelmed by aggressive national fast food chains beginning in the late 1980s

How did the Fredenhagens come up with the name "Cock Robin?" Castagnoli said, "it was the name of someone's boat on the DuPage River...they decided that the name was so bad that it's good!"

Know Your Rotarian

Shae Hess overecame early-life health setbacks to become an associate advisor at Sebold Capital Wealth Management.

Shae, who joined our club last August, told our March 14 breakfast that he was diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes at the age of nine. He wears a pump linked to a sensor on his arm that keeps his insulin level stabilized.



Shae's childhood was also interrupted by a severe eye condition requiring five surgeries.

In 2000, Shae helped establish Keystone Diabetic Kids Camp in Breinigsville, PA, a week-long sleepover camp for over 100 youths with Type 1 diabetes.



While attending Millersville University, Shae worked at his father's printing company in Pennsylvania. After graduation, he worked in accounts receivable at a large distribution warehouse. He started his professional career doing investment analysis and operations at Northwestern Mutual. Evenetually he moved to a more tax/planning job iin York, then on to Sebold.

"Sports have always been a big part of my life. I grew up going to NASCAR races with my dad,"

Shae, partner **Chelsea**, and their dog **Arlo**, live in western Naperville.
