Protocol and attention to detail



There's a correct way to introduce guests at our meetings, **Geoff Roehll** told a recent Club breakfast. At the outset of a meeting, before the sergeant asks for guests and visiting Rotarians, "Look around your table. If there's a visiting

Rotarian, introduce him by saying, 'This is Bob, and he's from the Rotary Club of (Henry)." Then we all respond, 'Hi Bob!' without applauding." Only applaud non-Rotarians.

President **Ryan Siebert** said a guest may be tempted to grab the microphone and introduce herself. Give her the mic <u>only</u> after she has been introduced and wants to say something.

When introducing a speaker:

- ✓ Smile and be enthusiastic in tone, gesture, and choice of words.
- ✓ Know enough about the subject to sound knowledgeable
- ✓ Announce the speech title as described by the speaker

Ryan added that there have been problems communicating Club information to guests. "Guests and speakers have shown up for what they thought was a scheduled meeting only to find the meeting room empty" - they had been given the wrong time or the wrong day.

In the Trenches

Addressing the slump in Rotary membership, **Tom Gump**, immediate past president of District 5950, told *Rotary Voices* that we can't just wait for people to walk in the door. "If you don't tell them about Rotary AND ask them to join, most people won't. More than 85% of new members found out about their clubs because a Rotary member personally invited them."

Geoff emphasized that "(Rotarians) have to invite that neighbor, that colleague, that friend," that corporate executive you may know." No easy task in an environment of declining interest in community service



generally, as Geoff and Membership Co-Chairman **Tom Miers** will attest. "We've reached out to Edward Hospital...tried multiple times to get someone from North Central College to participate in our Club," Geoff said. "We're trying to get someone

from the City of Naperville, the Naperville Park District, and some of the other organizations in town. So, if you know someone in a leadership role in a corporation, see what you can do about encouraging them to send a representative to one of our meetings...have them reach out to Tom or myself."

Our Board of Directors needs an infusion of new talent, said President Ryan. "We need leadership on the Board (and) barring a surge in membership, we'll need people who have been officers bCefore to consider returning to the Board." Ryan said those who are interesting should contact him or **Stephanie**, who Ryan said "will need all the help she can get."
