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#### Carl Wilkens, Author "I'm Not Leaving" and Co-Founder / Director of "World Outside My Shoes"

Last Friday Carl Wilkens spoke to the Rotary Club of Peoria. Wilkens said, his wife and their three small children moved to Rwanda in 1990. At the time, he worked as head of the Adventist Development and Relief Agency International there and was involved in various humanitarian projects. Their children went to school and played with local Rwandans and it was impossible to distinguish between members of the Tutsi and Hutu population, as all seemed to be one happy family, he said. But that soon changed.

When the genocide began in April 1994, outsiders mistakenly believe the ensuing genocide was a result of a history of tribal conflict between the two groups, he said. Rather, the origins of the mass murder had to do with a political power struggle. Killings were organized by certain Hutu leaders. The soldiers, police, and militia then initiated the execution of Tutsis and moderate Hutus.

As violence escalated, all U.S. embassy personnel were evacuated and Americans living in Rwanda were told to evacuate as well. Wilkens' family was relocated to Nairobi, Kenya and Carl refused to leave. By staying behind he knew his life would be in constant jeopardy as he worked to stop the violence and protect those, he knew from being murdered. Venturing out each day he continued to work to bring food, water, and medicine to groups of orphans trapped around the city.

The family's housekeeper Anita was the catalyst initially for the decision to stay, referring to the family's housekeeper. Wilkens said "The four years she had been in our home, she made a positive impression. Over the years we got to know her heart and how special and kind she was, especially to our children. It felt like she became part of our family. There was never the thought that "we should get out while we still can."

In the three months Wilkens remained in Kigali, he said he saw atrocities, which are too horrible to describe. But even among the worst, he saw glimpses of humanity. For example, a local named Gasigwa, who had been called on to aid the killers, had 40 people in his tiny home seeking protection, mostly children. When the killers would come, Gasigwa would say "I know your kids are hungry. Here, take these chickens," he said. They would then accept the gifts and leave.

On July 4th, 1994, Tutsi rebels seized Kigali. That is when United States troops finally arrived. After the genocide, many of the killers were imprisoned. Wilkens returned to Rwanda years later and visited one of the prison camps, where inmates were working the fields with what were once weapons used in the massacres' and baking bricks for building schools.

Wilkens described the camps as being rehabilitative and not punitive in nature. In a way, he said, he felt some anger that the killers were being rehabilitated. But in another way, he said, he admired the Rwandans' compassion after such an atrocity and said ordinary citizens wanted to get on with their lives and live together in harmony once more for the sake of their children and future generations. Wilkens also mentioned his former housekeeper is alive and married. She and her husband, a Hutu, have two children.
