RYLA Speaker Lineup; Volunteers Needed!

The 2025 RYLA committee has three outstanding young women speaking at RYLA this year! These young people are sure to motivate and impress the RYLA students! A fun, exciting, and inspiring program from Illinois Wesleyan University, has been lined up, and now it's up to you and your club to find students to attend! RYLA is the fastest and easiest way for your club to change young lives in your community. Please contact your local high school teachers, principals, church youth groups, homeschooled students, parents and other family members for high school juniors, sophomores, and seniors to attend. Students are looking for opportunities and RYLA is not to be missed! Any Rotarian in District 6490 can pass along the information. RYLA organizers Saturday Morning: will work on the particulars. Don't forget to contact your students from last year and make sure your RYE student has signed up. An email has gone out to them, but a reminder from you could be the encouragement they need to sign up.

RYLA needs volunteers. Four male overnight counselors are needed to stay in heated cabins with male students. Overnight counselors need to be present at a minimum from dinner through breakfast. Also needed are several Rotarians to participate in mock interviews with the juniors from 1 to 5:30 p.m. Saturday, April 5. To a lesser extent, two people need to be present from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. to check in the students as they arrive on Friday, April 4.

As of Tuesday, Feb. 25, there were 20 students signed up for RYLA. The RYLA committee is hoping for 80 students so that the camp will break even. Looking back on RYLA's history, there were 129 students in 2016. There is no excuse for us not to have that many again! Analyzing the data further, the small clubs are doing an outstanding job in finding students. Arthur leads the pack with a total of eight students signed up; Monticello has four students; Decatur has two; Charleston two; Tuscola, Arcola, Effingham, and Bloomington-Normal each have one. Some of these students are RYE. The camp is mandatory for them. If your club only sends a RYE student, the club will pay for that student's camp fee. If the same club sends two students, the RYE student is paid for by the district. What a bargain! D6490 Rotarians' Annual Service Trip to Mexico

This past February, Rotarians from three clubs in District 6490 participated in a weeklong service trip in communities located in and around Guadalajara, Mexico.

This annual trip, commonly referred to as the Rotary International Service Trip, brings together Rotarians interested in volunteering from throughout the United States who work side-byside with Rotarians from Mexico's District 4140 to provide essential health services through basic medical clinics, dental, and vision exams.

While the clinics are being conducted, a construction team is at work making needed improvements and repairs to the school hosting the clinics.

The 2025 Service Trip team included 28 Rotarians from 15 clubs representing five districts in the United States.

They were joined by more than 25 Rotarians and volunteers in Guadalajara for four days at four different schools with more than 2,700 students.

Not only were the families of the students invited to visit the medical, vision, and dental clinics, but so were local community members.

Members from District 6490 included DG Mike Martin (Mattoon) who checked-in individuals visiting the medical clinic; IPDG Janet Ellis-Nelson (Champaign) who was part of the vision clinic team and tested individuals for glasses; District International Service Committee Chair, Andréa Fain (Champaign) who managed the pharmacy and assisted with the overall team logistics; President Doug Nelson, (Champaign) and ADG Kenton Elmore, (Champaign West) who were part of the construction team.

While four days of service to communities in Guadalajara have an exceptional impact for the short timeframe involved, statistics cannot reflect how much the experience of being part of this annual trip has on each Rotarian.

At the end of each day, stories are shared that provide the reasons why this service trip has become an annual event for many team members. The lives touched; the smiles and hugs that are received; the friendships that are made are only a few of the reasons why one week each year is now reserved on many Rotarians' calendars for the 'Rotary International Service Trip'.

Buckets of Living Water! – When DG Mike Martin visited D6490 clubs this past year, he mentioned this annual Service Trip and how having access to clean drinking water is challenging for some residents in the Guadalajara region, an area nestled between two mountain ranges, Sierra Madre Occidental and Sierra Madre del Sur.

For some, especially residents living in the higher altitude remote villages of these mountain ranges, a Sawyer water filter attached to a 5-gallon bucket can efficiently purify water that would otherwise be dangerous to drink because of the bacterial contaminants.

Knowing how water filtration is a main issue for the residents of Guadalajara region, DG Martin highlighted their need while on D6490 2024-2025 club visits and collected enough donations from D6490 Rotarians and clubs that 100 Sawyer water filters, 100 5-gallon buckets, and 8 in-line water filters for schools were purchased and handed out during the week-long Service Trip.

Thank you to all who contributed to the water filter project when DG Martin visited your club!
