





Summary: Council on Legislation 2025

Every three years, representatives from Rotary districts around the world meet at the Council on Legislation (COL) to review and vote on proposed changes to Rotary's constitutional documents (the RI Constitution, the RI By-Laws, and the Standard Club Constitution). They consider enactments proposed by clubs, districts, and the RI Board. (Resolutions are currently voted on by the Council delegates electronically on an annual basis).

This year's Council was held April 13-17 in Chicago and considered 86 proposed enactments and adopted 31, 11 were withdrawn, 37 failed, four were referred to the RI Board, and three postponed indefinitely. The changes made become effective July 1, 2025.

Among the noteworthy changes:

- An annual district conference is no longer required; it is optional.
- The number of members needed to charter a new Rotary club decreased from 20 to 15.
- The names of the presidents-elect training seminar and district training assembly are amended (the word "training" is replaced by the word "learning").
- After lengthy discussion, an increase in per capita dues of \$3.50 per year in 2026-27 and \$3.75 per year in the following years was approved. The previous Council set dues for 2025-26 at \$41.00 per half year, and they will not change.

With the approved increase, the dues that clubs pay to RI per member will increase to \$42.75 per half year in 2026-27, \$44.63 per half year in 2027-28, and \$46.50 per half year in 2028-29 and thereafter. The dues will not be raised again until a future Council votes to change it.

- The nonpolitical nature of Rotary International was reinforced with specific guidelines.
- Council representatives are to be elected in the year of the Council and begin their terms in the year of the Council. (Implementation of this change to be determined by the Board.)

Changes to the Standard Club Constitution:

- The deadline for the club midyear financial report was extended from Dec. 31 to Jan. 31.
- The word "community" was added to the purposes of Rotary clubs.
- The RI Board may instruct a club to terminate the membership of a member or Rotaractor.
- The "diversity of membership clause" was amended to read "including age, sex, gender and ethnic diversity."




Council on Legislation changes:

- The deadline for submitting enactments is extended from Dec. 31 to March 31 in the year before the Council.
- The percentage requirement to place an item on the consent agenda at the COL is 70 percent instead of 80 percent.
- Within six months of the conclusion of the Council of Resolutions, the RI Board must inform on status of adopted resolutions.
- The Board is to provide Council representatives with relevant materials during the appeal of a Board decision.

Legislation Council Cont.

- Disputes must be appealed to the Council on Legislation to exhaust all remedies in the constitutional documents before seeking intervention of any non-Rotary agency or system.
- Online participation in the Council on Legislation with Board approval only under exceptional circumstances and • for compelling reasons.

Other key changes:

- The duties of a governor were amended to include encouraging promotion of the RI strategic plan, encouraging participation in grant programs, and providing support to assistant governors.
- A club or Rotaract club may be terminated for misuse of TRF funds.
- The 5-year forecast at Rotary Institutes to include updates on specific process improvements and cost reduction measures taken by RI.

- 4. Download the app by clicking the "Get" or "Install" button.


Sign in to the IGNITE App:
