McEnaney, former manager of the local Ameren Power Company, is a Mt. Vernon City Councilman. He is well respected in the business community and active in the Jefferson

Adopt a STRIVE Program

Four Rotary Clubs within the District, Mt. Vernon, Mt. Vernon West, Flora, and Sparta, sponsor a STRIVE program at their local high schools. STRIVE is an acronym for Start Small, Think Tall, Reach Out, Invest All, Visualize Finish, and Expect the Best.

STRIVE is a scholarship program that recognizes and rewards students who achieve the greatest improvement in grades along with good attendance during their senior year. While all seniors are eligible, this program is geared for the bottom half of the class who would otherwise have no chance of earning scholarships.

STRIVE is an individual student-oriented program to aide and honor high school seniors challenged to work and study hard. Rotary members serve as mentors to provide guidance and encourage participants to:

- 1.) Be regular in attendance;
- Work and study to the best of their ability;
- 3.) Display a positive attitude; and
- 4.) Practice the Rotary 4-Way Test.

Regular monthly meetings are held with mentors and cover topics such as resume preparation, job interviews, credit issues, college opportunities and other related topics. The importance of educational performance improvement and attendance is stressed at each meeting.

Clubs interested in sponsoring a STRIVE program can contact one of the above clubs for more information and should contact the local community college for partnering.

Below is a letter from our Youth Exchange Student, Jenessa Peinado, in Japan

"February was a bit busy but not any more than usual. I went on a Rotary ski trip at the beginning of this month, and it was lots of fun. It was a wonderful opportunity for all of the exchange



students to get together and just grow closer with one another. Originally this would've been the first time that I would have gone

skiing if it had not been for my previous host family. I'm extremely grateful that they took me skiing before because when I went with the exchange students I was able to keep up with them. That certainly made it a lot easier. Our district ended up gaining another person, and it was great for her to be a part of the ski trip. It was a wonderful way for all of us to just relax and have fun together.

I was also busy with my Rotary club for the past 2-3 weeks helping them prepare to celebrate their 30th anniversary. I assisted by making favors and gift bags that went to a conjoining club from Korea . My club made a PowerPoint presentation which included pictures from the past five years since they celebrate their anniversary every five years. I was honored to actually be a part of their celebration ceremony by presenting the gift bags to our visitors. Thankfully I didn't trip.

My club also joined with two other clubs to present a lecture which lasted about four hours. The good news was that Jacob and Janik, two of my Rotary District Inbound friends, attended the lecture with me. The bad news was the lecture was really long, and it was very hard for us to focus. The speakers' speed made it especially difficult. They were also using quite a number of words we had never heard before. Unfortunately, we couldn't understand most of the lecture which I'm sure is a shame because it happened to be about life goals and such. After the lecture there was a dinner where

we were able to socialize with college exchange students and also members from each other's Rotary clubs. This proved to be a fun way to practice the Japanese language skills we have learned so far.

Finally, this month my district conducted an origami lecture which included all of the exchange students. I thought this lecture was much more interesting because it was interactive. While the person was teaching how to make origami, we were able to sit down and practice it as well. I ended up knowing how to do part of it because for my school we had to make 20 origami paper cranes to have a total of 1000 to wish for peace. The cranes were one of the main things we focused on at the Rotary activity. We had to make 50 in a four day period for our upcoming trip to Hiroshima .

With all of these highlights from the month of February, looking back on it I think it actually was a pretty packed month for just 29 days.
