BCP'S **EMERGENCY** NEED

For the last 20+ years, we have been fortunate



not to incur any major medical expense other than for those services we obtained through Shriner's Hospital or the volunteer services of Rotarian Dr. Enrique Farinas. Unfortunately, on March 18, 2016, our good fortune hit a bump.

Four weeks after his

surgery at Shriners Hospital to correct his Pseudoarthrosis of his left tibia, Josiah became ill with a fever and welted rash. He was in constant pain, crying continually, he stopped eating and could not sleep.

After trying everything over-the-counter to get Josiah over this mysterious illness, his host father, Rotarian Ryan Brown, called our Program Director. The decision was made to take him to St. Elizabeth's urgent care facility, which was the closest facility to their home. After a brief visit to the urgent care facility, Josiah was referred to St. Louis Children's Hospital - Emergency Room.

Josiah was tested for everything the doctors could think of. His cast was removed to make sure his surgical wound was not infected. There were X-rays, CT scans, MRI's, blood work, and three days of hospitalization for a very sick little boy. He had round-the-clock caregivers with him through the efforts of his host family and BCP volunteers. He turned the corner, late Monday, and was released back to his host family.

Unfortunately, Josiah's 65 -hour illness resulted in medical expenses of over \$18,000. This has been negotiated down with Children's, Washington University Physicians, and St. Elizabeth's Urgi-Care to approximately \$12,000. As a result of these bills, our budget has been greatly impacted. We currently have four more patients in the pipeline to provide services to finish out our 2015-2016 schedule. (Note: we are in need of host families for three of the four patients that are in process!)

So, our GREAT NEED is that we ask that your clubs dig a little deeper and commit a little more, this year, to help our budget situation so that the BCP can continue helping 15 - 20 patients per year. And, please reach out to your family and friends to help us find loving families for our patients.


A message from Ore Ojewuyi our Outbound Rotary Youth Exchange Student to France this year:

Greg Yank at the Rotary COL (Council on Legislation) in Chicago April 10-15. Greg was District 6510's delegate to the Council.

Many Rotarians, especially the newer members, are not aware that the Council on Legislation (COL) exists and is the only body that can change RI's Constitution, RI's By-Laws and the Standard Club Constitution. The Council is made up of one representative from every District in the world (currently 534). The COL convenes every three years to discuss and vote on proposed enactments from the individual Rotary clubs, Districts and/or the RI Board.



This past April the Council met in Chicago for a week with PDG Greg Yank representing District 6510. Hailed as the most progressive Council ever held, legislation was passed to allow clubs more flexibility in meetings, attendance, classifications and memberships. Virtually the only requirement is that clubs meet at least twice per month. And, classifications can be discarded for a more liberal definition of finding prospective members who have integrity, demonstrate leadership ability and professionalism, and are willing to serve. I believe we have an excellent

opportunity to increase our membership numbers! The specific legislation was sent to each club president at the end of April with the intent they share it with their members. It can also be viewed on RI's web site.

District 6510 Rotarians Attend District Assembly

On April 23, 2016, 78 District Rotarians met at John A. Logan College in Carterville for the District 6510 Assembly. DGE Dave Matthews presented his district budget for 2016-17 which was approved by the attendees. He also presented his goals for the year. His main objective is to introduce all the clubs to the Children Advocacy Centers located within our district. There are six centers which serve about 2,000 abused children a year. The main service is forensic interviewing for children who have allegedly been abused. Advocacy through any court proceedings may also be provided. During the coming year he would like to see all our clubs explore potential projects or involvement with these six agencies.

DGE Dave Matthews also stated that these agencies will be at his district conference November 4-5, 2016 in Mt. Vernon. Proceeds from sponsorships for the conference will be disbursed to these centers. Also at the conference on November 4 will be a service project that repeats DG Tom Guebert's project of last year. At 1:00 p.m. on that date we will gather at the United Methodist Children's Home in Mt. Vernon and package 20,000 meals for Stop Hunger Now. A light lunch will be provided there and can be purchased when registering for the conference. A goal has been set for \$4 per member per club to pay for this service project.

Another goal set by DGE Dave is for the donations to the Annual Program Fund to be at least equal to \$26.50 per member for each and every club. This was the total amount given in 1917 by the Rotary Club of Kansas City as the first donation to The Rotary Foundation started earlier that year by Arch Klumph. A celebration of the 100th anniversary of The Rotary Foundation will be held at Cedarhurst in Mt. Vernon on April 29, 2017.

Training included Public Relations, DACdb, Membership, and Youth Protection. Presenters were Gina Blankenship, Jill Pietrusinski, Tom Ripperda, Deb Frey, and Ed True. Status reports on the Foundation, Belize, and Polio Plus were also presented by Lanny Lenker, Tim Gutknecht, and Mike Nowobilski.

The District Foundation and Membership Seminar is planned for July 23, 2016 at John A.

Logan College. Please plan to attend.



Mt. Vernon Rotary Clubs Honor STRIVE Students

Fifty-nine seniors from Mt. Vernon Township High School were honored at this week's Rotary Club of Mt. Vernon meeting for their participation in the STRIVE program.

STRIVE, an acronym for Start Small, Think Tall, Reach Out, Invest All, Visualize Finish and Expect the Best, is a collaborative effort between the two Mt. Vernon Rotary clubs, Mt. Vernon Township High School and the Rend Lake College Foundation which coordinates monthly meetings for high school seniors to learn job and life skills and receive business mentoring. Subjects discussed during the sessions included finance and credit, employment opportunities, workforce requirements and college admissions and scholarship application.

The Rotary banquet was the culmination of a year-long commitment from the students. Several students were recognized for their achievements. Kelsey Vasquez and KaMiyah Hawthorne were awarded \$250 scholarship grants, while Jasper Klein and Haley Chelf were awarded one-year scholarships to Rend Lake College valued at over \$3,000. Rotarian and STRIVE coordinator Dennis McEnaney, who also served as master of ceremonies, gave special thanks to Mt. Vernon High School principal Rowdy Fatheree and counselors Lindsey Moore and Gina Allen and Rend Lake College Foundation CEO Shawna Bullard for their contributions along with thanking both Rotary clubs for their support.






