Welcome, Don & Melinda!

Melinda, who spent her first 14 years in Terre Haute before moving to the Golden State, parlayed her early love of photography and graphic design into her first jobs as a newspaper photographer and photo studio manager.

In California Don was a master automotive technician, specializing in German cars. After they met and married, Don and Melinda worked full time during the day and attended college at night. Don had a double major in math and computer science at Cal State Sacramento. Melinda earned a bachelor's degree in environmental studies.

After accepting a scholarship and teaching assistant position at IU, Don found that he preferred solving problems in days rather than in decades. He missed getting to know his customers in the automotive world. In 1995, Don and Melinda opened World Wide Automotive Service in Bloomington. In 2009, they built the greenest automotive building in the region, winning local and state level environmental awards as well as the Chamber of Commerce Small Business of the Year. (They still own the building but recently sold the business to general manager Paul Miller.)

Melinda handled the business plan for World Wide Automotive Service and led the company's marketing and community outreach. The first years of the company's community outreach were dedicated to helping start WonderLab Museum.

As daughters Aubrey and Kate became involved in theater, Melinda began the construction minion phase of her community outreach, with building, catering, and marketing for BPP and Cardinal Stage. In 2023, Melinda and Aubrey co-founded Off Night Productions (<u>offnightproductions.org</u>), a local, woman-led nonprofit whose goal is to provide theater "For Everyone, Every Night." Aubrey was our Rotary District's 2018-19 Global Scholar, landing a \$40,000 grant to earn a master's degree in arts and culture administration from King's College London.

Don has served on many automotive advisory boards, mentored shops within the 20 groups he has belonged to, and assisted a wide variety of local nonprofits, including BHSS Sounds of South, Bloomington Playwrights Project, and Thriving Connections.
