When they first moved back in 2020 during the pandemic they did so as Andrew lost his job due to covid and they needed extra support from their family. Andrew started baking bread and selling to neighbors in the St. Annes Hill neighborhood where they live.

Andrew wasn't always a baker. He started off as a journalism major at OU and lasted 3 quarters and came home and started working in restaurants in fact, he worked in restaurants while at OU which is where he first encountered Shagbark Seed & Mill Company whom he still gets his grain from now to make his breads. He moved to Columbus following his then fiance and got his first encounter with baking bread. From there his love of baking bread grew.

When he first came back to Dayton and started baking bread it was like a dozen loaves a week where now it is 300 loaves a week, 250 soft pretzels among other items he bakes and sells at the 2nd Street Market 3 days a week.

He is very much a proponent of sourdough - which is how the bread rises. He got his "starter" that he got from his old boss and so on so it has a lineage and a history. Feed the sourdough starter flour and water. The flour is Ohio grown Red Fife wheat. He get about 200 lbs of the flour a month from Shagbark.

He then gave a description of his process of making his bread and why he thinks his bread is better. His method of bread making rising is low and slow. His method of baking bread makes it easier to digest than commercial rising yeasts. He goes out of his way to find Ohio grown grains. Some places he gets the grain from mill it other times he mills it himself in his own small mill.

He talked about Celiac disease (gluten intolerant) being more common today. Lots of theories as to why. How we harvest any flour grains. Grains used to be milled in whole. But these days the commercial mills the germ is filtered out because it is high in fatty acids, which makes it spoil faster. To have a shelf stable flour for a year or more it must be filtered out. The problem with that is that the germ is the most nutritious and tastiest part of the kernel.

Mass-produced flour has a very long list of ingredients of nutrients that they have had to add back in because they were stripped with the removal of the germ and bran. Bromate is an ingredient that is controversial is that it is a carcinogen. But if all flour is cooked through the bromate is then considered inert.

The ingredients in the bread that he brought to sample only had three ingredients: flour, water and salt. We then went through a tasting of the bread and he pointed out the tastes that you might go through while eating his bread. First the salt then a little sour then a little nutty flavor. This was a sample of his Country Loaf.

He said Wonder Bread to him was like velveeta was to Annie in her cheese world. He went through all the ingredients in wonder bread. The list was very long.

Andrew then took questions from the group which included answers on how stone milling works and why it is better for the grain than the modern rolling milling process. He was questioned on if he would ever have a bread baking class or if he sold the flour to others. Right now he doesn't have space to do a class as he is still baking at home. But would be open to holding a class at another location. Andrew has a goal of being out of his home and into a commercial space by the end of 2022. He was also asked how is bread is preserved - due to the natural fermentation of the sourdough his bread lasts for a week. You can freeze his country loaf - he suggests in foil and then pop it into the oven into the oven with the foil on. He was asked about his hours at the 2nd Street Market. He is there Friday, Saturday and Sunday but said if you want the full spread then you need to visit him on Saturdays.
