This Happened Last Monday...

The Rotary Club was taken around the world by the guest speaker on Monday! President Shaun Yu led the meeting and reported how successful the Tour de Gem bike was on Sunday and thanked all participants and volunteers for the event, Mr. Nance led us in prayer, the 4 way test and news of the day. Iris Juergens then introduced us to guests and visitors and Linda reminded us of the Coat Project and the Fireside Chat coming up. The group then offered their Day 10s in honor of birthdays, the Tour de Gem, the meeting♦s guests, midwives now being permitted to deliver babies and Girl♦s International service work.

Kelly Lehman, our Chair of the day introduced us to our featured speaker, Heather H., a vivacious young person who has traveled the world as part of her Rotary and Girl Scouts involvement. Her talk focused on how Rotary influenced the trajectory of her life. Originally from Milwaukee, WI she was part of a military family and was no stranger to travel. She knew early on in life that she wanted to see the world. Her family hosted a foreign exchange student who further sparked the desire to travel, and at the young age of 15, her parents allowed her to participate in a short student exchange program. In 2005 she stayed with a Rotarian host family in the Ukraine. Even though she was not around a tremendous number of people, she was able to learn the about the region sh shistory and politics.

In 2006, her Rotary connections led her to connect with the Girl Scouts and was chosen to participate in the International Jamboree in London. She took the time to backpack across Europe. Because of what was going on in the world at the time, she became interested in National Security. Heather described a situation in which she was on one of the planes that was part of an international terror plot.

In 2008-2008, Heather once again was part of the Rotary Youth Exchange program that led her to Pune, India. There she took several cultural classes, tried to immerse herself in the many languages spoken in India and did volunteer work administering polio vaccinations. There too she was exposed to the politics. She met Narendra Modi, the current prime minister of India. He along with Heather and a group of other Rotarians went *qlamping*!

All of the above happened in Heather si life before she graduated high school. She completed one year of college at Seton Hall in NJ where she was instrumental in starting the Rotaract Club. That clubs pet project was the Purple Pinkie Project to promote the fight to eradicate polio. Heather is proud that the project continues to this day at Seton Hall. While she enjoyed her time there, Seton Hall proved to be too small to contain Heather s adventurous spirit and she took off again.

This time she went to Germany and Italy through Girl Scouts where she worked at a summer camp on property bought by the US military. She was relieved that the camp was doing so much good for so many because she learned later that the property once was a former Nazi base. One of her fondest memories is teaching kids to sail in the Mediterranean. After that she became a resident of Panama after learning that Panamanians were offered free education by a Florida university. While there she became a volunteer with the WFP and worked in Haiti after it suffered a massive earthquake. When at the university she took astronomy classes where she met a foreign exchange student though Rotary of Japan.

Heather spent time in Albania through her work with the Peace Corps. She did youth development work, tourism projects and community and organizational development. She started Girls Leading Our World (GLOW) while in Albania. Again, there were Rotary connections in Albania and, through those connections, she met with woman leaders and business owners and worked on a model UN team.

From Milwaukee to Albania, with many points in between Heather returned to the US and now resides in Los Angeles where she works with the US Department of Homeland Security. She has also served as a Rotary tour quide for foreign exchange students in Southern California. She in engaged to a Brazilian who was also an exchange program. Sending a student on an outbound exchange opens up their world and you never know where they are going to end up
