Donna Kastner, Del Mar Fellow with The Dayton Foundation will share workforce trends that underscore the need for multigenerational collaboration. She will also introduce Silver Is Gold a revolutionary program in Dayton that eases labor gaps by connecting retired professionals with firms seeking their wisdom and expertise.

This Happened Last Monday...

Rotary President Shaun Yu called the meeting to order. It was a full meeting and we were once again at capacity with our seating. Shaun turned the meeting over to Bill Nance who shared with us through prose how the often subtle inconveniences that we experience daily in life are in reality a true reflection of the blessings of life that we often take for granted such as shelter, food, clothing, and the loved ones we have about us. Bill led us in a prayer of Thanksgiving, the Four Way Test, the Pledge, and news of the day.

Rick Thie introduced us to the club's guests for the day and then turned the podium over to Secretary, Linda Groover. Linda reminded the group that the Social Committee had secured 40 tickets to the Muse Machine's performance of The Addams Family on January 14, 2022 at 8:00 p.m. at the Victoria Theatre. We wished happy birthdays to Tom Holton, Bear Monita, Jena Pado, Jason Hillard, Natalie Dunlevy and Michelle Ann Feltz. Linda then opened the floor up to Day 10s and other foundation donations. Fran Rickenbach did a Day \$10 for attending in person and also a Club \$125, Carolyn Rice did a Day \$100 with \$50 towards holiday meals and \$50 towards her Paul Harris Fellowship, John Lyman did a day \$80 and rounded it up to \$100 for introducing Lisa Henderson and being a graduate of WSU School of Medicine, Gerry Chadwick did a Day \$40 for his wedding anniversary on Halloween and a Day \$85 for the penalty of not having acknowledge that sooner, Paul Gruner did a Day \$71 for the University of Cincinnati Bearcats victory over SMU, Nicole Sturk gave a Day \$30 in honor of the upcoming Giving Tuesday on November 30, Zoom and Mediocre Pet Portraits again this year. Via ZOOM Chuck Vella gave Day \$100 donation on behalf of grandson's second birthday, Mary Bane did a Club \$125. Rick Wegmann did a Day \$10 for the Bearcats victory, Steve Naas did a Day \$20 to announce the Peace Committee's Meal distribution where they will deliver 300 meals to households in need in Northwest Dayton and Will Coutts did a Day \$100 for being able to be back in person.

Nick Warrington made an announcement on behalf of the Social Committee about the Addams Family performance pre-show reception. Dayton Live is going to allow Dayton Rotary to use the donor lounge at the Schuster Center for the reception two hours prior to the performance more details to follow soon.

Linda invited Frank Scott to the podium to present information on the Holiday Sweepstakes event to be held on December 13, 2021 where funds raised support the Rotary Club of Dayton Foundation. Frank shared that beneficiaries of the Rotary Club of Dayton Foundation's recent grants which the sweepstakes helps fund have included Goodwill Easter Seals, Ronald McDonald House, St. Vincent DePaul, Learning Tree Farm, Dayton Society of Natural History, Friends at Levitt Pavilion, Big Brothers Big Sisters, Dayton Council on World Affairs, the match for the coats program and Retreat. Frank encouraged us to bring a \$20 unwrapped gift for a fellow Rotarian and also announced that a 50/50 raffle will be held that day just for the benefit of the Rotary Club of Dayton Foundation.

The podium was then turned back over to President Yu who welcomed Carolyn Rice to the podium where upon Carolyn introduced Donna Kastner as a new member to the club. Donna is a Del Mar Encore Fellow with the Dayton Foundation. Her fellowship is focused on launching Silver Is Gold. A program that facilitates connections between businesses with immediate needs and retired professionals with the wisdom and expertise to address these needs. Donna, a Paul Harris Fellow, is a former member of the Rotary Club of Hudson outside of Cleveland Ohio and in 2020 was named Rotarian of the Year.

President Yu then called upon Sarah Hippensteel Hall via Zoom where Sarah introduced Lucy Dennis to the podium to share her recent RYLA experience at Camp Kern. Lucy, a Rotary Leadership Award winner, shared with the club the many activities and group interactions designed to further develop her and her team member's leadership skills. Lucy shared that one of the key areas of interest to her was the discussion around What Does Change Do to Inspire Us and how each of the experiences and the people that she met helped her in advancing Rotary's motto of Service Above Self.

President Yu then turned the podium over to the Chair of the Day, Nick Warrington, to introduce the program speaker, Valerie Weber, Dean of Wright State University School of Medicine. Dr. Weber is the eighth Dean of the Boonshoft School of Medicine (BSOM).

Dr. Weber's topic was the Boonshoft School of Medicine - Past, Present and Future. She spoke to the unique quality for our city to have a medical school in the region and to the transformational aspects of having a steady flow of physicians that are educated in the area and that remain in the area. Dr. Weber further paid tribute to the visionaries of the 1970s and to the early students whom we owe a debt of gratitude. The Boonshoft School of Medicine is a community-based school and part of the collection of 156 schools of medicine that exist across the country. Dr. Weber provided insight as to the need for a larger physician workforce due to the explosion of the baby boomer generation and the complexities of the COVID pandemic. She further shared that there has not been a consistent expansion of medical schools in the US and that a gap existed from the 1980s into the 2000s with no new medical schools being instituted. However, since then there has been some expansion from 126 medical schools, which were in existence for several decades, to the current number in the 150s to address the demand for medical care.

Dr. Weber informed the group that there are many talented young people that want to serve and that have the academic capabilities to do so than there are spots in medical schools. In the past year there were over 53,000 applications to medical schools nationally and only 22,000 student applicants actually matriculated. BSOM experienced 9,000 applications for 128 open spots last year. During the pandemic the nation saw an increase in applications to medical school of around 18 percent. Dr. Weber feels that it is very encouraging to see this rise in application rates in light of the challenges with the COVID pandemic and that people want to serve and see it as their calling. She found most encouraging that 104 BSOM students are Ohio residents and 35 are from our region. BSOM embraces diversity, equity and inclusion and has a 20 percent rate of under-represented in medicine and more women than men going into medical schools.

Dr. Weber shared with us the challenges medical schools faced in the current COVID environment with all medical schools working in unison to maintain the obligation of providing a first-class medical education while keeping everyone safe. That there were a lot of unknowns and they had to develop ways to craft learning experiences for their students where they could be instructed safely in person with 100% masking and 100% vaccinations. BSOM has experienced no COVID outbreaks.

In terms of what's new for BSOM, Dr. Weber explained that in the middle of a pandemic and even before the pandemic a call went out for from the AAMC to all medical schools to increase their numbers of enrollment to address the current and impending physician workforce shortage. BSOM has modestly increased its size over the years but now aims to increase enrollment over the next 3 to five years to 150 students. She said that nationally the number of spots increased in medical schools by 31%.

In closing Dr. Weber shared BSOM's aspirations to be recognized as best in class within the community based medical schools, to be a national model of excellence and a force for good in our community.

BSOM wants to advance the health of the entire region specifically by contributing solutions in the areas of maternal infant mortality and the opioid epidemic taking place in our region. Dr. Weber then took several questions from the audience.


