Ms. Briggs is the CEO of Kettering Medical Center who started in the hospital system in CA in a clerical position. She stressed that it is important for KHN and PHP to maintain a healthy competition in our community so that quality health care for all is guaranteed. She stressed that KMC encourages staff and patients to pray. Her passion is clinical psychology, and she is a Dayton fan! She also warned that Covid cases are rising.

Lisa Grigsby, on behalf of the Dayton Rotary Foundation, made a check presentation of \$3,000 to Cindy Garner and Clothes that Work. Cindy thanked the club for the generous donation and it will help tremendously with the mobile unit that will launch in October.

President Shaun then brought Andrea Wall, the Chair of the Day, to the podium. She introduced Dr. Dan Zehringer, WSU School of Fine and Performing Arts. Currently, he is Chair of the School of Music at WSU. He will be the inaugural Chair of this new program at WSU. He is a very accomplished trumpet player and has put on Master classes all over the world. He was also a professor at Wittenberg and Xavier Universities. He released a critically acclaimed album in 2016.

Before his time at WSU, Dr. Zehringer performed for 14 years with orchestras in Dayton, Cincinnati and Springfield. He chose teaching for the opportunities in diversity including travels worldwide. He often takes students with him on these trips that provide opportunities otherwise not available to the students. Many of the young people are first generation college students. He is an Ohio native and one of 14 children. He is the youngest and all siblings played a musical instrument. Some of his sibs were in a band named New Horizons. He has somewhat famous first cousin(s)—Rick and Randy Zahringer of the The McCoys who wrote "Hang on Sloopy".

He believes in the success of WSU—a place where students get world class education at an affordable and sustainable price. WSU is ahead of the curve. The newly formed School of the Fine and Performing Arts is made up of the Department of Art and Art History; the School of Dance and Motion Picture and, the School of Music. Each of these three schools has its own Chair and staff. As of August 1, the 3 schools will become one and he will be Chair of it. He will have associate chairs and a combined staff that will share resources. The students and faculty will all have an elevated experience because the 3 schools will get to know each another and interdisciplinary ideas will be taught. There will be an emphasis in the curriculum related to the business aspects of a career in the arts. The community at large will benefit as there will be one website where the public can see events from all factions of the new school on one calendar. The entire School of Liberal Arts at WSU will also undergo changes.

Dr. Zehringer is definitely proud of the history and accomplishments of students from the arts programs at WSU. WSU boasts a 95% placement rate for its students. He encouraged all of us to attend and/or support the Arts Gala that is put on yearly. A strong arts community is important for downtown Dayton and the entire community. He shared with us that WSU graduates are performing on Broadway and in productions of Jersey Boys and Dear Evan Hansen; have works of art displayed in Dayton, Brooklyn and NYC; are participating in operas and performing as classical musicians; are members of Military bands in the US and across the world; serving as organist for the Dayton Dragons; are dancing in productions such as Moulin Rouge and as a Rockette; Academy award winners for Black Panther and American Factory; and are Tony Awards nominees.
