"Avoiding Legal Troubles as a Board Member of a Non-Profit Organization"

Things Still Go Bump in the Night

Walt Hibner highlighted the Rotary Foundation's \$50 million raised for polio eradication. He asked club members to keep the effort in their thoughts as a polio case was found in New York. He then invited Cindy Garner, Penny Wolff and Dick Hattershire to the podium to introduce new members.

Cindy Garner introduced new club member, Mike Rogers. Mike is a native of Dayton, having recently moved back to the area to be closer to family, graduated from the University of Dayton. Mike is currently the Chief Development Officer at Dayton Live. A seasoned fundraising professional, Mike has also worked at the American Cancer Society, American Red Cross and Keep America Beautiful.

Penny Wolff and Dick Hattershire introduced new club member, Christine (Chris) Corba. Chris has lived in the Dayton area for 35 years. She is a graduate of the Indiana University of Pennsylvania and is currently the Executive Director at the League of Women Voters of the Greater Dayton area where she supports over 300 League members to carry out the mission of the League. Chris and her husband live in Beavercreek and have two adult children.

Cassie Barlow introduced today's speaker by translating Air Force lingo into Navy lingo. Rear Admiral John Spencer is the Commander of Submarine Group Ten, overseeing 5000 people and 8 submarines. He is a graduate of Fairborn High School, the Naval Academy and the Naval Academy War College.

Rear Admiral John Spencer talked about "Maintaining America's Advantage at Sea". He specifically talked about three areas:

1. Ohio's connections to the Navy – there are approximately 10,000 active-duty individuals in the Navy from Ohio, including Randy Kritz who is the Lead Budget Officer from Lima, OH and Commander of the USS West Virginia, Ereka Kasse of Bellbrook, OH. In addition, the legendary WWII Fleet Admiral King was born in Loraine, Ohio.
2. What the Navy Provides – the US Navy provides worldwide "freedom of the seas", ensuring all ships can sail and the free flow of goods and commerce, including the \$55 billion of goods shipped from Ohio.
3. What the Navy does on any given day – the US has a large navy, including 12 Aircraft carriers, 70 submarines and 280 ships (100 are at sea at any given time). Examples of activities include preventing piracy in the Mediterranean Sea, supporting allies like Japan and Australia and strategic deterrence of our adversaries.

Rear Admiral John Spencer is in Dayton as part of "Navy Week". More information on "Navy Week" can be found here: <https://outreach.navy.mil/>.

David Williamson, Susan Hayes, Penny Wolf, Bob Hoopes, Darlene Nelson, Patty Caruso and Jim Deuser all had engaging questions and/or comments for our guests. Jim Gallagher was also remembered as a "Navy Guy".

Rear Admiral John Spencer drew the Queen of Hearts winner – the current pot is \$2500; Tom Budde was the winner, but drew the 10 of Hearts, so close! Tom also won tickets to the CenterPoint Energy Dayton Air Show presented by Kroger. A second Queen of Hearts ticket was drawn, Darlene Nelson also won tickets to the Air Show, where the Navy Blue Angels will perform.

Rotary Book Club





Christine Corba (Chris) is originally from Edinboro, Pennsylvania, and has lived in the Dayton area for 35 years. She earned her BA in Psychology from Indiana University of Pennsylvania and has worked with nonprofits for most of her professional career. At Family Service Association, as Manager of Family Education and Volunteer Services, she instituted the agency's first formal volunteer program and oversaw parenting education efforts. After the birth of her children, she began working remotely before working remotely was "cool." She contracted with the Ohio Community Service Council (now Serve Ohio) and managed the process of drafting Ohio's Unified State Plan to increase volunteerism throughout Ohio, which was a requirement of the Corporation for National and Community Service. She also oversaw regional grants that helped to expand volunteerism in underserved areas. She worked with the Friends of the Dayton Metro Library where she designed and coordinated the library's first volunteer program and managed 42 Friends' book sales. Over the years, these sales raised over a million dollars to support programs and purchases outside of the library's regular budget. During that time, her kids knew every children's librarian in the system! Chris contracted with We Care Arts from 2003 to 2017 helping with their development efforts, served as Director of Community Engagement at Epilepsy Foundation Ohio and Development Director at United Rehabilitation Services. In her current role at the League of Women Voters of the Greater Dayton Area, Chris is responsible for supporting over 300 League members who carry out the mission of the League; to encourage informed and active participation in government, increase understanding of public policy issues and to influence public policy through education and advocacy. She and her husband, Curt, reside in Beavercreek and have two adult children: Nick and Colleen.
