President Bramlage then announced a Red Ribbon removal - Alexis Larsen completed the requirements to tear off her Red Ribbon, an honor performed by John Capobianco. President Bramlage then turned it over to Bill Nance for a Rotary Spotlight segment featuring Jeremy Turner of Apply Pressure Power Washing. Jeremy served in the Army for eight years, eventually feeling stuck because he couldn't deploy. When his contract expired, he left the Army to pursue business. He founded Apply Pressure in March 2021 and grew the company to employ a team of four. His mission is "To remind people of their value. To improve Dayton's character through cleanliness. To inspire discipline and trust in our dreamers that they can succeed and contribute by doing what they love." In the winter, his business shifts to hanging Christmas lights for commercial and residential clients. He has been a member of Dayton Rotary for a few months now. When not busy with his day job, Jeremy enjoys keeping busy as an amateur boxer and a former professional power lifter.

Kim Bramlage returned to the podium to suggest one of Jeremy's boxing matches as a possible social event to social committee chair Dona Vella (not present), and to share some more announcements. It's time for Rotarians to select their committees for the year. Committee lists and signups were available at each table and will be emailed out imminently. There are lots of opportunities to serve – including some open chair positions – so please sign up for a committee. There is also a sign-up sheet to volunteer at Crayons 2 Classrooms. We need twelve (12) Rotarians to volunteer on Friday, August 18 from 9:00am – 11:00am to help package supplies for local teachers. There is a sign-up sheet at the entrance table or email Kim.

Frank Scott took the podium to share some announcements and present two Paul Harris Fellowships. Frank thanked the club for its generosity, noting that unrestricted donations produced a total of \$37,000 last year - including Queen of Hearts, Christmas Sweepstakes, and DayTen funds The Dayton Foundation has a total of \$825,000 in endowment funds, of which the club receives 4% to dispense annually. Our contribution to Rotary International Annual Fund came to \$14,700 - exceeding our \$12,500 goal. Frank noted only two countries continue to suffer from endemic polio -Pakistan and Afghanistan. Rotary aims to eradicate the endemic, with all 7000 Rotary Clubs striving to raise \$1500 each toward the cause. Our club

Frank recognized Greg Birkemeyer, former District Governor, former Dayton Club President, for his 8th Paul Harris Fellowship, noted by two rubies. Kim Bramlage received her 3rd Paul Harris Fellowship, noted by two blue stones. Frank then reminded members of the Point System in operation and the availability of points to members. Frank is also Chair of the Day, so he returned to the podium to introduce today's speaker, former club member Denise Swick of Downsize Allies, a specialist in senior downsizing.

For the past eight or so years, Denise's business has naturally evolved to focus on downsizing. Nearly ten thousand people per day will reach the age of 65 through at least 2030. Many of these individuals own a home by themselves with much more space than they need. Few prepare for death or try to downsize before it's too late. Downsize Allies help remove the barriers. First, it's important to know when it's time to downsize. There are 6 main reasons:

- 1. Financial reasons too expensive
- 2. No longer able or willing to maintain
- 3. No longer fits your needs size, accessibility
- Neighbors all moved on
- 5. Convert home equity to income
- 6. Closer to family

Benefits of downsizing:

- Reduce mortgage & property taxes
- 2. More time and money to enjoy life
- Enjoy a cozier atmosphere
- Makes you declutter
- 5. You'll sell unnecessary stuff

Tips for the hard conversation – 5 points for smooth interaction when convincing a loved one to downsize:

- 1. Be emotionally prepared
- 2. Highlight the practical
- 3. Frame it as an opportunity
- 4. Be compassionate
- 5. Respect your loved one's dignity and independence

Tips for the harder conversation - telling your adult children you want to downsize:

- 1. How to approach the kids honesty, empathy, and understanding
- 2. Keep focused on the goal
- 3. Let the kids in!
- 4. Remind them of the benefits of downsizing

Denise opened it up to questions and provided thoughtful answers to specific scenarios. President Bramlage thanked Denise for speaking, announced a donation in her honor to Polio Plus of Rotary International, and asked Denise to draw the Queen of Hearts ticket. Alexis Larsen won the drawing, but did not select the Queen of Hearts. Next week, Kane Stratton from Ceasars Ford Theater will speak. Secretary Hippensteel Hall led members in the Four Way Test before President Bramlage adjourned the meeting by ringing the bell at 1:12pm.
