"The State of Bail Reform"



Speaker: Judge Steven Dankof

Presently, the United States incarcerates more of its citizens than any other country in the world. Every evening, 500,000 people languish in jail convicted of precisely nothing and presumed innocent as they await trial. Greatly contributing to this mass incarceration is the use of cash or money bail. Individuals presumed innocent stay in jail because they cannot afford to purchase their pretrial freedom. The Columbus Dispatch has likened our bail system to debtor s jail.

Judge Steven Dankof has begun a cashless bail program for pretrial defendants assigned to his docket for nonviolent low-level felonies. Judge Dankof has been on the forefront of the statewide effort toward bail reform, which has resulted in new Ohio Supreme Court rules expanding bail reform. Judge Dankof will talk about the problems the courts still face and his innovative approaches to finding solutions. Judge Dankof was appointed to the Montgomery County Common Pleas Court General Division in 2010 and was re-elected in 2014 and again in 2020.

President Yu was also the Chair of the Day, and he delighted in introducing a fellow member and speaker for the day, Rick Schwartz, Chairman of the Board for Winsupply. Rick graduated from Oakwood High in 1967, and married his high school sweetheart, Jane. He started at Primus, Inc after serving in the Air Force and later retiring from the Air Force Reserves as a Lt. Col. His first office was in the basement of Dick Schiewetz's father's home in Oakwood behind the home on Dixon Avenue where

Rick Schwartz thanked President Yu for the introduction and John Lyman for inviting him to speak. He explained that Winsupply was a unique constructional company selling to contractors and suppliers in 620 locations and 45 states. Last year the company made \$4.2 billion, and this year is projected to make over \$5 billion. Each company has a board of directors. There are two levels of shareholders: the presidents and key staff and traditional long-term shareholders from the '50s and '60s. Winsupply is a private, stock-controlled company and will not go public. They have six banking partners.

The company is an Entrepreneurial model based on three principles of Sharing, Trusting, and Helping. They have over 1200 Entrepreneurs and have never had a year when the parent company lost money. They have 7,200 employees, with 500 in Dayton,

Rick authored The Spirit of Opportunity, which was discussed at our Dayton Rotary book club in April 2021. He introduced his next generation of leaders and goal to have over 100 new presidents by 2024. They currently have five distribution centers across the country and are building one in Oklahoma, scheduled to open in 2022. There are plans for an additional two more after that. There were two questions: how they got their name Winsupply and are they having difficulties with the supply chain. Originally their first company was the N O Nelson company, and they changed to something more positive, WinSupply. They have great relationships with their suppliers and manage their petrol chemical-based products to provide a high quality of service. Rick invited the audience to pick up a free brochure given to new employees called The Keys to our collective success.

President Yu gave Rick the traditional Rotary coasters and thanked him for the presentation. There were 60 people present and 32 members on Zoom for the meeting.

Our next meeting on August 30 is Judge Steve Dankof, Montgomery County Common Pleas Court, called "The State of Bail Reform." The meeting adjourned at 1:10 pm.






