President Kim Bramlage then came to podium and thanked us all for the support. She welcomed Jim Steen back who joined us on Zoom. We are excited that Caryl Segalewitz and Alan Lee had their red ribbons removed and are now full-fledged Rotarians. Congratulations!

Kim reminded us that Strategic Planning is coming up and encouraged all those with interest to get involved. Rotary will be going to the production of Cabaret at WSU on November 9 at 8 pm. Tickets are limited and please talk to Laura about availability.

Chuck Vella was called upon to introduce the speaker of the day, Kevin Riley who is a longtime Cox Enterprises employee with a background in investigative journalism. Kevin got his start at the DDN in 1983 while a student at UD. He was editor at the DDN from 2007 to 2011. His career then took him to the Atlanta Journal-Constitution, where he has served as Editor starting in 2011. He has had a storied career in investigative journalism and the paper won many awards under his leadership, including 2 Emmy Awards, and an Edward R. Murrow award. He has served as a judge to award the Pulitzer Prize, and testified before the US House Judiciary Committee's Subcommittee on Antitrust, Commercial and Administrative Law in 2019 on the importance of local journalism, and the impact that social media and large tech companies are having on it. He is now a member of Dayton Literary Peace Prize, Atlanta Rotary, and a graduate of Leadership Dayton, Leadership Atlanta and Leadership Dekalb, with 3 kids and married to Tracy. Chuck met Kevin at DDN and enjoyed "trying to golf"!

The theme of Kevin's talk was "You never really leave Dayton" but maybe it should be titled "Dayton never really leaves you". All his children went to UD, so he had plenty of reasons to come back to Dayton. He explained his connection to the DDN and how those connections to it and Cox changed and influenced his life. An article he wrote was published on the day he graduated from UD. He shared his heartbreak of the cancellation of the 2020 NCAA basketball tournament-he had mixed feelings about it because he invited 16 people to stay at his house if UD made it to the Final Four.

A tough story that he covered while Editor at the DDN was NCR's departure from Dayton. That departure had a deep impact on the community and Bill Nuti, the CEO of NCR, took some heat from the paper for his actions, his lack of transparency and the company's departure. After NCR moved to Atlanta and while Kevin was at the Atlanta Constitution, he had the opportunity to interview Mr. Nuti again. Nuti seemed to express some remorse for how he dealt with the press in Dayton and that he was not as involved with the Dayton community as he could have been.

To the contrary, Brian Gregory, former UD basketball coach, was very invested in the Dayton community. He left UD and went to coach at Georgia Tech. Always an admirer of Coach Gregory, Kevin met with Gregory often while they were both in Atlanta. One story about Coach Gregory impressed Kevin. Brian took it upon himself, and unknown to Kevin, to give Kevin's son, who was struggling with the move to Atlanta at the time, a confidence-building pep talk. That impressed Kevin greatly because Brian was always giving of his time.

His work on the Board of Trustees for the Davton Literary Peace Prize brought him back to Davton. He believes in the project, and he thanked all who support it. He is working on making it bigger than the Pulitzer Prize. He encouraged all of us to realize what we have here in Dayton.

He shared a moving quote from a column he wrote when he left Dayton. It is:

"Now I realize that Dayton was the perfect place to build a life... along with my wife, whom I met here, and my 3 children, I leave behind the place that would always be my home".

Kevin then entertained questions. When he comes to Dayton, he likes to go to DLM and, when time permits, he goes to the Pine Club. He weighed in on preserving Dayton's history through its architecture, how AI may affect journalism, and how smart journalists will always be needed. He advised young journalists to look beyond companies' social media accounts to hone their craft. Kevin reflected on his first meeting with President Carter, which took place when he first moved to Atlanta at the Presidential Library. President Carter mentioned that he read the AJC every morning and then seemingly called the AJC out about not running an Op-Ed about dealings in the Middle East. Kevin was later invited, along with some of the AJC's editors, to dinner with President and Mrs. Carter at the Presidential Library. He and President Carter discussed if it was an impossible job to be President. Carter said it probably wasn't then, but it may be now!

Sarah then did the drawing for the Queen of Hearts pot (\$3000) but there was no winner. The speaker at next

week's meeting is Jason Woodard, a local Developer in Dayton.

Norm Miozzi led us in the 4 Way Test, and the meeting was then adjourned.

2023 Coats+ Project Kicks Off

The **Coats+ Committee** is getting an early start on this year's project so we can get coats on the backs of children **BEFORE** cold weather sets in. We know we are right on the heels of completing the Crayons to Classrooms School Supply Drive and hope you understand the need for urgency.

We kicked off the campaign with a **\$5,000 goal** this past Monday and plan for it to run through October 27th.
