This Happened Last Monday...

President Walt Hibner called the meeting to order at 12:10 and called on Bill Nance to give the Invocation, and lead in the 4-Way Test, Pledge to the Flag, and News of the Day. There have been at least 80 deaths from hurricane Ian and the toll is expected to climb. Recovery efforts will run into the tens of billions of dollars for residents of Florida and the Carolinas. Meanwhile today, President Biden will visit Puerto Rico to announce a 60 million plan for recovery efforts there from hurricane Fiona. The Rotary Club of Saratoga, California has been a continuing presence at Marth's Soup Kitchen in San Jose where members prepare food once a month. The club coordinated the 95-thousand-dollar purchase of a refrigerated box truck to help. And the Rotary Club of Bangalore West, India has given 30 thousand dollars to help feed the people in the San Jose region. Two New Jersey lawmakers have introduced bills that would require retail membership clubs in the garden state to permit anyone to buy gasoline at their pumps, not just paid members. Costco, in July, ended an 18-year deal that allowed everyone in the state to buy gas at their low prices. The bills, if passed, would again require places like Costco and Sam's Club to offer their gas to everyone. It is not known if the trend will spread to other states. Complimenting a stranger on the street is the top thing adults would most like to do in public, but don't have the nerve, according to a poll from the U.K. 40 percent of two thousand adults surveyed consciously limit themselves in life because they fear of being criticized. The study by one poll revealed that going to the movies alone, singing aloud and walking barefoot are other unconventional activities people are too embarrassed to indulge in. A first-time visitor to Indonesia was traveling on a bus when she felt a tug at the back of her head. The guy sitting behind her had cut off 16 inches of her hair. During President's Time Walt Hibner reminded the group we were down to 13 cards in the deck. That the club is getting back to somewhat of a normal status after Covid shut us down and we had to pivot to Zoom. The Social committee is now up and going strong. The Peace committee is still going strong and we are restarting Rotary Reads continuing with Coats Plus. We are holding another Bring a Guest Day and the meetings have come back with full tables. Past President Shaun Yu announced the nominating committee and that they would be soliciting names of Rotarians interested in serving in Club Leadership positions. He reminded those that just because you have served in past, doesn't mean can't serve again. He also reminded the group that this Sunday is Tour de Gem. We are manning 1 of the stops. 9 am – 1 pm, could use a couple more people. Please volunteer.

President Walt then called on Chair of the Day, Karla Garrett Harshaw to introduce our speaker, Tamika Williams-Jeter back to her hometown as the Head Coach of the University of Dayton Women's Basketball Coach. Coach Williams-Jeter has been exceptional at every level of basketball as a player and a coach, and yes, she REALLY is from Dayton. She grew up in Jefferson Twp and most recently, she was head coach at Wittenburg University in Springfield. She is a wife, a mother, and extremely accomplished at what she does. Dayton Daily News reported captured much of her extraordinary background. She started receiving college recruiting letters in 6th grade in her home in Jefferson Township. At Chaminade Julienne high School she became the #1 ranked recruit in the nation. She scored 2015 points, and won Ohio Miss Basketball honors at the age 17. She appeared in a 7 page sports illustrated spread. She was wooed by college recruiters. She chose the University of Connecticut where she became National Freshman of the year, scored 1,402 career points, won two national titles, and ended up in the Huskies Ring of Honor. She was a first round draft pick of the Minnesota Lynx, where she made the WNBA's All Rookie Team and played seven seasons. She finished with over 1,400 points and 1,100 rebounds in her career and set a WNBA single season field goal accuracy record in 2003 at 66.8% and that still stands today.

After the WNBA she began her coaching career at Ohio State, Kansas, Kentucky, and Penn State. Last year she served as head coach at Wittenburg where a 10-game winning streak led to a tournament championship, at the NCAA Division III. She has just finished her first week of practice as Head Women's Basketball Coach for the Flyers. Please welcome Tamika Williams-Jeter, a true Dayton Gem!

Speaker Tamika Williams-Jeter, "What it means to come home"

How does it feel to come back? It was amazing to go away, to learn and grow and gain experiences. It means everything to be back. It is magical to show people how big their world can be. Coach Williams-Jeter spoke about all the experiences she had through the years, from playing basketball to coaching basketball. She had some amazing experiences.

When she was 18, she never thought she would come back to Dayton. Not that its bad, but just because. But she said it was awesome to come back, but she was grateful for the experiences she had along the way. When she got to University of Connecticut it was a big adjustment. She would say Hi to everyone on Campus and on the East Coast they would just stare at people. Her Coach wrote at end of first semester to her parents that she was doing well academically, and he was trying to find 2 people she hadn't introduced herself too. She met wonderful people and took her to the WNBA. Her jobs were in Life, Health property casual insurance license at 18, a tanning salon, a Mexican restaurant and an Italian restaurant, where she served as a hostess for both. Painted inside of off-campus apartments. She was a poor student athlete, with a full ride. In the Pros she got extra benefits if doing community service. Laura Bush called and wanted to bring Tamika in to speak to tough at a book festival in front of the White House. She asked her to do it every year. Tamika was the child of 2 parents who were educators. President Bush instituted a program with 60 athletes that are professionals and Tamika was one of them to go and speak to youth. She traveled to Africa 5x's. She mostly spoke with women on the importance of sports and empowerment. In these places she traveled there were clearing the haves and have nots, and the government controls everything. In South India for 3 months she coached national team. In 2013 she traveled to Ukraine and went to the Embassy and Russia took the Ukrainian president. They had them travel closer and closer to Russia, and talk to high-powered people and ask them to go into a room together. She also traveled to Sri Lanka it was a similar situation but this was due to a religious situation. She worked as a sports analyst for ESPN and then at a Nationwide insurance agency which closed in 2020. Her Dad became sick and to be closer to home, she went to UK for year. After her Dad passed she then went to Penn State. Then the Ohio State with 2 young boys. During Covid, her mom began experiencing severe early dementia. At Wittenberg, she took over as athletic director.

Tamika stated that people matter and nothing is accomplished without great people. How to start at the bottom and get a group of people to believe in something they shouldn't. Coming home means everything to her as she was just a kid from Jefferson Township Ohio who got to experience all these things. Now she is able to give back, and young people can see what can be accomplished. It means everything to be home. Dayton is great. She took the coaching job with UD without seeing new facility. The arena she remembered used to smell like old feet and hot dogs she said. Neil with UD recruited her and they met privately at the UD President's house for a conversation. She didn't have an agent or portfolio, didn't think about applying for the head coach job. They went to her in Columbus to speak again and just 3 days after the other coach quit they offered her the job. They showed her who her staff was and what her budget was. She told them she wouldn't make decisions based on money that she needed to pray on it. She talked with family, prayed over it with family and said no. Her Boss at the time said your kids need to see you, and your mom needs you. So she decided to say yes. She is in the greatest situation and loves going to work every day. She loves seeing her mom progressing in whatever way possible. She goes to the VA cemetery on dark days and her dad gives her wisdom. It is magical to show people how big their world can be. Believe in yourself, you can do anything.

Q&A

Where do you see UD women's basketball in 5 years? Winning the A-10 is standard. A sweet 16, Elite 8, Final 4 is what she wants.

What do you see happening with sports and naming rights? Women's sports are different than men's. It is going to take some time.

President Walt presented her with a set of coasters, skyline of Dayton. Tamika drew the winning ticket held by Matt Jessup and he pulled the 7 of hearts. It wasn't a winner. Only 12 cards left now

President Walt announced that next week's speaker is Mayor Jeffrey Mims and he then adjourned the meeting.
