Dr Steve Johnson, President of Sinclair who gave a presentation on the current state of Sinclair enrollment, it's history, numbers of majors, and overall success of the College over the years. He reminded everyone that Levy B is up for renewal. It will not raise your taxes, but it will raise 9 million in funds for the College. It is a 1-mill renewal. They have had Levies at the College for 56 years, and the Dayton Community continues to support this fine Institution. The campaign co-chairs were highlighted, and the local endorsements continue to come in, almost daily.

Walt introduced the Chair of the Day, Paul Gruner who introduced the speaker, John Cunningham, Athletic Director from the University of Cincinnati. John's presentation was entitled" *University of Cincinnati Athletic Update & Collegiate Changing Landscape"*. John launched a 100 million Day One Ready Campaign Initiative and led the movement to join the Big 12 Conference.

John shared his personal and professional life journey. He also shared that there are 450 Student Athletes in the University of Cincinnati program, in which about 20 or so local Dayton Student Athletes who are currently enrolled. Some of which he named. John continued to share his successes at The University of Cincinnati, and shared with everyone the positive momentum that is palpable on campus, and within the student body. John presented a promotional video entitled, *Where the Heart Lies*, in which he narrated. The video highlighted the Bearcat football highlights, and also demonstrated the amazing student athletes and various other student groups and organizations on the beautiful University of Cincinnati campus.

John went on to further highlight the importance of capturing the moment and building upon the success of the program. He also shared future plans for additional athletic facilities on the UC campus. The plan is to continue to grow the athletics program and to also integrate nutrition into the lives of the student athletes.

John took questions about the future rivalry that may arise between UC and the University of West Virginia. Annie Foos asked John about the NILL and the business of investing in student athletes. John's response was thoughtful and insightful. Lastly, Rotarian Bob Hoopes thanked John for what he has been able to do during his time at UC.

Walt Presented John with the Coasters from the Rotary and encouraged John to pull the winning ticket from the hat. Walt Hibner was the winning ticket holder. He did not draw the queen of Hearts.



Joe Fig: Art About Art

An admirer of art production and viewing, Fig (American, born 1968) is an author and artist who explores artists' studios and museum galleries as sources of inspiration and the subjects of his art. From the paint-splattered barn of Jackson Pollock to the minimalist studio of Barnett Newman, Fig explores the process of making art, the working lives of artists, and the spaces where they work, what has been called the "preprovenance" of art. He recreates or imagines the artists at work, comparing the studios with the pristine museum environments where works are shown. His work is enjoyable on many levels, both serious and playful, all made in painstaking realism on a diminutive scale.

American Myth & Memory: David Levinthal Photographs

American Myth & Memory probes the recesses of America's collective memory and imagination. Through his use of toys, Levinthal looks at the quintessential American subjects and mass media's role in mythologizing familiar cultural touchstones. Levinthal spent his childhood engaging with classic American myths and legends through televised Westerns and plastic playthings and his art has never strayed far from these formative influences: he has dedicated his 40-year career photographing toys in meaningful and playful vignettes that challenge our perceptions of photographic authenticity. Through his color photographs, Levinthal's work is populated with cowboys and cavalry, Barbie dolls and baseball figurines. Although the photographs project an illusion of innocence, Levinthal's toys are stand-ins for society. They allow him a way to explore what it means to be strong, beautiful, masculine, feminine and, ultimately, American.
