President Kim Bramlage's Remarks:

- · Red Ribbon Member Rachel Jessup welcomed new member Terra Fox Williams! Terra is the CEO of the YWCA Dayton.
- Bill Nance interviewed Susan Hayes for a member spotlight. Susan, a native of Detroit but long-time resident of Dayton, is a retiree from the health care industry, a Wright State alum, and avid knitter. Susan also organizes the Dayton Rotary Book Club.
- Kim shared some highlights on World Polio Day Polio has been eradicated in all but 2 countries. Rotary continues to play a key role in working to completely eradicate this disease. She encouraged everyone to contribute something to the cause as each dose of polio vaccine costs just .60 cents and three doses are needed to provide immunity.

Frank Scott introduced our speaker, Valerie Beerbower, GS10KSP Program Manager at Sinclair Community College. Valerie provided an overview of the Goldman Sachs 10,000 Small Business program facilitated at Sinclar Community College. The program provides a 14-week business education to local small businesses, including workshops on pathways to capital and business support services. Locally, there are 53 small business owners who have participated in the program, which is delivered at no cost to the business owners. The average revenue of these small business is over \$1 million. Graduates leave with a 5-year strategy plan and a passion to increase their revenue and create jobs in the region.



Our next book is The Night Fire by Michael Connelly. Georgie Woessner has graciously agreed to host us at their




lovely home on Tuesday, December 12, 2023, from 6:30 -8:00.
