This Happened Last Monday...

President Walt Hibner called the meeting to order and welcomed Bill Nance to the podium who led us in prayer, the Pledge, the Four Way Test and news of the day. Molly Hauser was called to the podium to introduce members with guests. Rick Thie introduced his guest Michelle Collier from Good Neighbor House; Rhonda Stargill brought Cindy McCurdy from GSWO; Heath MacAlpine introduced us to Jocelyn Rhynard who is serving her second term on the Dayton's School Board; Cindy Garner brought Laura Hart who is the Education and Outreach Program Director for Clothes That Work; Paul Gruner's guest was Johanna Hartley, the Regional Development Director for Messer Construction; Sue Taylor introduced us to her husband, Ken-both are former band directors; Adam Horseman's guest was Josh Copeland, the Director of Learn to Cope; and Annie Foos brought Terress Monroe from Edison.

Linda Groover reminded us that those responsible for mass shootings are also in need of our prayers. We learned that the Queen of Hearts drawing is down to 6 cards and the pot is over \$5,200. Birthdays to celebrate include Alan Moscowitz, Randy Clark, Chris Corba, Kathleen Carlson, John Lyman and Terry Rogers. Happy birthday to all of them! There were no other announcements.

Day 10's and other foundation gifts were announced. Chas Woodhull gave a Day 100 in thanks for being with extended family for the holiday and for his one-year anniversary as a Rotarian. Nancy Farkas gave a Day 100 to honor Dick Hattershire and Lorna Dawes for introducing her to Rotary and in honor of all her friends with Dayton Public Radio, Dayton Opera and the Dayton Bach Society. Jacquie Powell with a Day 100 to recognize Dayton Public Schools and their collaboration with WGI to make it a successful event. Finally, Gerry Chadwick gave a Day 100 to praise many businesses represented in the Tour De Gem Event whose contributions to non-profit organizations totaled over \$100,000. These included Winsupply, Insignia, Key Ads and Brady Ware.

President Walt then returned to the podium and congratulated Rotary on a successful Tour de Gem. He then introduced Shaun Yu who reminded us of the upcoming Holiday Sweepstakes and encouraged us to attend the 12/12/22 meeting so we could participate in that and the club's election. Walt then invited Randy Domigan up to introduce us to new member, Jay Maier who is with Brady Ware Capital. Welcome Jay!

Bill Nance then interviewed Nicole Sturk as part of the Vocational Profile series. Nicole is the Resource and Innovation Coordinator for SICSA. She thanked Rotary for is \$3000 grant which was used to support community veterinary care. She explained Safe Pets, a SICSA program that provides temporary housing for pets of folks in catastrophic circumstances. Pets can be temporarily housed (up to 6 months) with foster families. SICSA will be participating in Giving Tuesday through its Mediocre Pet Portrait

Walt Hibner then asked the Chair of the Day, Brian Martin, to introduce us to the speaker for the day. Dr. Elizabeth Lolli, Superintendent of Dayton Public Schools ("DPS"), has her MA and PhD from Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. She has been in education for 45 years and has served as Superintendent for 15 years and, most recently was chosen as 2023's Superintendent of the Year for Ohio! Dr. Lolli showed several slides with lots of data including that there are currently 11,800 students enrolled in DPS. DPS consists of 16 elementary schools, 3 stand-alone middle schools, 2 Gr. 7-12 buildings; 2 Gr 9-12 buildings; 2 Career Tech Centers and 24 CTE pathways. DPS employs 2400 people, has 1750 ESL students which has a fibre and effect enrolled in DPS. DPS has been and the product of the standard effect enrolled in the product with diversity in the product enrolled in the product of the standard effect enrolled in the product of the standard effect enrolled effect. increased after Trump left office, and serves 2000 students with disabilities. Dr. Lolli expects the graduation rate to increase from 75% to 85% in the next two years. K-3 literacy scores and grade school math scores are trending in the right direction.

DPS is excited to have purchased Mound Street Academy, a former charter school, to serve as a drop-out prevention high school that also offers mental health services. Dr. Lolli explained the challenges faced by DPS in the transportation arena. DPS is responsible to get all students to charter and non-public schools. Even though those costs are reimbursed, they are reimbursed for less than half of what is spent (\$22M spent and only \$9M reimbursed). To complicate matters, if DPS cannot get students to the schools within a certain time before their classes start, DPS is fined.

DPS's total budget \$562.3 M. Before she came to Dayton, DPS was being threatened to be taken over by the state. A short one and one half years after she came to Dayton, she became superintendent. Dr. Lolli explained that test scores and drop-out rates are showing positive trends. This has been due to a team effort among and between herself, teachers, tutors, and the Board of Education.

Recent initiatives include staffing grades 1-3 with 2 teachers per classroom and use of the double teaching method. This method pulled scores up for 3rd grade testing. Continued good results will ensure more funding for that program. In grades 4-6, DPS is using high dosage tutoring and partnered with UD which provide 30 student tutors who engage in small group instruction. DPS now has required reading classes for grades 7-10. When Dr. Lolli arrived in Dayton, students were scoring 4 years behind in reading.

DPS offers additional supports for its students including the Office of cultural engagement with groups New Females of Color and Males of Color. The partnership with Dayton Children's Hospital allows DPS to offer counseling services which are managed by Dayton Children's. The hospital hires and trains the therapists and provides an outreach coordinator who works with parents. The future is bright for DPS. It will be partnering with major employers in the area and offer more College Credit plus opportunities, as well as restarting the STEM program at Thurgood Marshall High School.

Dr. Lolli then entertained guestions. We learned that DPS already partners with 5/3 Bank which offers high school and elementary school students access to a program to assist with financial literacy, such as keeping a bank account, a checkbook etc. She agreed that DPS should start tracking what causes students to drop out. Those numbers are sometimes skewed because students move out of the district. We learned the ways we can follow DPS's progress through its social media outlets and website. Strong schools is one of the key factors in Dayton's successful growth. Dr. Lolli was then thanked by the Dayton Chamber of Commerce for its amazing work.

Walt Hibner had some closing remarks how important it is to have quality people involved early on in students' education and thanked DPS for ensuring that. Dr. Lolli then drew John Capobianco's number to pick a card in the Queen of Hearts drawing. John drew 6 of Clubs. And then there were 5-cards remaining! The meeting was adjourned.

Jay Maier was born at the turn of the century, and was fortunate to grow up in a small suburb of Cincinnati known as Glendale. A small, tight-knit community afforded him some of lasting and most fulfilling relationships. Through their mother's dedication, Jay and his sister got involved in the parish community as well as service groups, such as the interfaith hospitality network (IHŇ), which helps house recently homeless families. Without a thought, he enrolled at Saint Xavier high school, the natural progression for the men in my family. This again afforded him opportunities for leadership, development, and service. During his senior year, he led the canned food drive, totaling around 100,000 pounds of food and related necessities. Jay won the national merit finalist scholarship, redeemable at most state schools, providing free tuition. Jay attended the University of Oklahoma, studying physics and finance. In addition to joining and starting the requisite clubs for an aspiring finance professional, as well as the physics society, he got involved with Habitat for Humanity, initially as a boots on ground builder, and eventually in a fundraising capacity, raising \$5K in two weeks. Jay then decided to transfer to The Ohio State University, where he switched to physics and a minor in psychology. Being back close to home near his friends and family was helpful, as well as joining communities such as the OSU rugby club and the Big Data and Analytics association. Looking forward, he has some inclinations towards finance and politics. For the near future, he is excited to continue growing at Brady Ware Capital, with superiors who have been beyond helpful mentoring and helping me develop. Jay looks forward to seeing how he can contribute as a Dayton Rotary Member.
