Tim Dangel died in 2001 at age 33 from cystic fibrosis (CF), an incurable disease. He graduated from LaSalle High School in 1986, then earned a degree in architectural engineering from UC's OCAS campus. Tim worked as an architect in Cincinnati and Celina. Local school jobs on which he worked include Oak Hills, Williamsburg and Springboro

Ritch Dangel also suffered from a milder case of CF and died April 8, 2006 at age 36 from a rare liver disorder. Ritch graduated from St. Martin of Tours School and LaSalle High School. He earned a Bachelor's Degree in Construction Management from the UC Ohio College of Applied Science. In 1993 he joined Messer Construction Company. He worked many large construction sites in the region. At the time of his death, Ritch was the senior project manager for Messer in Dayton, Ohio working on 'The Green'. Ritch loved boating and water sports. He was accomplished at 'barefoot' water skiing. Like his brother Tim, who died in 2001 while waiting for a lung transplant, Ritch never let cystic fibrosis keep him from living his life to the fullest.
