
How Rotary makes help happen

SUSTAINABLE PROGRAMS

Rotary programs improve women's access to skilled health personnel: doctors, nurses, midwives, or community health care workers.

Rotary members distribute clean birth kits and train health workers in safe delivery of babies.

Rotary makes amazing things happen, like:

Mobile prenatal clinics

Haiti has the highest maternal and infant mortality rate of any country in the western hemisphere. [Rotary provided a fully equipped medical Jeep](#) to volunteers and midwives to reach mothers and children in remote areas.

Cancer screening

Rotarians provided a mobile cancer screening unit and awareness trainings around Chennai, India, where there is a high mortality rate of women with breast and cervical cancer due to late diagnosis.

Preventing injuries and deaths

Rotary members launched a \$3 million, five-year pilot to [save lives of mothers and children](#) during home deliveries in Nigeria. Since 2005, they also repaired 1,500 obstetric fistulas — 500 more than their initial goal — restoring dignity and hope to vulnerable mothers.

Many clubs and members in our District have experiences and implemented initiatives as it relates to Water and Sanitation, but we need to tell our story. Please submit articles regarding your contribution to this month's theme while thinking of articles to submit for May as it is Youth Service Month.

COVID 19 Support Grant Requests

The District is asking for all COVID 19 support Grant Requests to be submitted by Wednesday, April 22, 2020. An informal request was sent by the District Rotary Foundation Chair and your District Leadership has formalized the submission with a deadline date. We have a small contingency of funds available at this time and we are seeking other funding sources to supplement this contingency. We are maintaining the District Match requirement so District will fund up to 50% of the requested funds. Our District Grant Sub-Committee is actively reviewing Grants as they come in. We will inform clubs as soon as possible about the results of our deliberations.

District Leadership would also like to confirm the deadline date of May 10, 2020 for the new Rotary year District Grants. We will inform clubs about Grants for the new year very quickly as well. Funding for those Grants will likely be in August, 2020.

District 6670's Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE) Program

District 6670's Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE) 2019-2020 program kicked off with another strong start, sending a group of bright, excited young people to spend the school year in countries in Europe, South America, and Asia, and taking a similar group from around the world to spend their school year with us in southwest Ohio. It's coming to an end, however, as the cloud of the COVID-19 virus wraps around the planet. Strange times!



We recruited 11 local high school students, ages from 15 to 18, for our long term exchange program. After training, orientations, and a lot of hard work last spring and summer, they boarded their flights in late August for France, Poland, Finland, Brazil, Spain, Turkey, Italy, The Czech Republic, and Slovakia. Once there, they settled in with their first host families and got to know their new schools and communities, immersing themselves in completely different cultures.

Our inbound students followed much the same path. This year, District 6670 hosted 9 RYE students, from Turkey, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Spain, Thailand, Italy, Germany, South Korea, France, and Brazil. They moved in with volunteer host families, practicing their language skills and exploring Ohio and the United States.

A normal exchange year became something different as the pandemic emerged and worsened in late January and early February. As the Corona virus took hold in Europe, the two countries most impacted were Italy and Spain, both exchange partners with us this year. All of our partners, just like the U.S.A., eventually started to feel the impact.

Across the world, the advice was similar to what we received here; practice social distancing and shelter at home. As time went on, however, the combination of a much limited exchange experience and the desire to be with their families started to pull our outbound students home. In one case, it was the overseas Rotary district, and not our student, who decided to end the exchange early. As of now all have returned, with the exception of two who are in Finland.

Our inbound students faced similar pressures. One student had decided to go home early prior to the pandemic, and three more have returned since then. We currently have five left. I expect most of them to stick it until the end of the exchange in June.

So what about the 2020-2021 RYE year? Well, things are up in the air right now. We've already recruited a group of outbound students, and have agreed to accept inbound students as well. This was all before the virus showed up, though. District 6670 is part of the O/E (formerly Ohio/Erie) multi-district, an administrative group set up to more efficiently facilitate RYE across a wider area. The O/E executive board is wrestling with the issue as I write.

My assessment? Well, 2020-2021 could go three different ways. We could attempt to mount a normal exchange year (unlikely). We could try for an abbreviated version (possible). Or we could do what a number of districts have already done and suspend the program while the world heals up, with a relaunch in 2021-2022 (probable). We'll let everyone know more when we know more.

So what's next for RYE in District 6670? Well, we're going to move forward with our recruitment effort for 2021-2022. Our target is to help at least 20 bright, well-spoken and enthusiastic high schoolers experience this life changing opportunity, and to accept a similar number of inbound students. There are over 200 (!) high schools in the district, so it's going to be a question of engaging all our clubs in the recruitment and support efforts. I'll be reaching out to the current club presidents and president-elects to get the ball rolling.

Some thanks are in order. First, we have a great district RYE team ♦ Steve Naas, Outbound Chair (Dayton); Nikki Larson, Inbound Chair (Fairborn); Mac Hickman, Compliance Chair (Batavia); Katie Neubert, Procurement Chair (Centerville); and Arnie Biondo, Pinch Hitter (Centerville). They turn the wheels that make things work.

Thanks are also deserved by the clubs who sponsored or hosted an exchange student, or who otherwise were involved in RYE this year. Those clubs are Batavia, Beavercreek, Bellefontaine, Dayton, Fairborn, Kettering, Lebanon, London, Mason-Deerfield, Miamisburg, Oakwood, Piqua, and Troy. We couldn't do this without you.

We continue to send out our weekly email newsletter to all member (ERays)

Pres. Dave Carlin will host our first virtual Club meeting this Thursday, April 2

We held a Club Board meeting via Zoom on March 18. A key outcome of this Board meeting was that

our Club made a donation of \$50,000 to St Vincent De Paul's Homelessness Prevention Program Fund to help those in Cincinnati who are in immediate danger of losing their home. Linda Muth, our Exec Dir, submitted an article to Laura Arbaugh last week for the District Newsletter

- The Club Board also approved a plan to support the 35 employees who serve us weekly at our meeting location (the Hilton Netherlands), but who have been furloughed. This will be a more than a \$22,000 donation which comes from Club members' monies from our cancelled weekly lunches they're willing to donate (plus other Rotarian's donations) all matched one-for-one by our Rotary Club's funds, resulting in us giving each of the 35 employee \$650 in Kroger gift cards.



- We held a Rotary Foundation of Cincinnati Board of Trustees meeting via Zoom on March 26 which resulted in a decision to:
 - **Support the families of health care workers and first responders** by partnering with the YMCA of Greater Cincinnati, which has been given special authority by the State of Ohio to provide daycare for their children. **Our Club will be donating up to \$92,000** to supply almost 7000 dinners to 113 families at 8 area YMCAs for 4 weeks. Our local restaurant industry, which is under substantial pressure, will also be supported through this effort.
- One of our members, Sam Schutte, **set up a Virtual Tip Jar** (you may have seen it in news reports). This is a way for people to go on-line and give tips to servers at bars and restaurants who have lost their main source of income due to no dining in. Middletown Rotary Club

We are looking to purchase food and deliver it to three of the local food pantries and also to purchase hand sanitizer for daycares, beginning with one for medical personnel's children, and shelters.

Springfield Rotary Club

Below is what Springfield Rotary is doing to stay connected, and to support our community.

Food Bank: donated \$5,000 to support the food needs of Clark County residents

Volunteers: reached out to Rotarians that are under 60 to assist with packing kid lunches and getting them ready for delivery

Rotary Buddy Program: All Springfield Rotary board members have 2-3 older club members that they are assigned as their **rotary buddy**. They were given their phone numbers and are expected to reach out to them weekly to make sure they are doing ok.

Quarterly Lunch Fee: Our club charges Rotarians \$150.00 per quarter for weekly lunch. For the April-June fee, we have waived that cost, but are encouraging members to still pay the bill and all proceeds will go to the food bank. This could generate up to an additional \$18,000 for our local food bank.

We have been conducting virtual meetings via ZOOM. In terms of community projects, we provided a large monetary donation to our Food Pantry and helped pay to have 2000 masks made and distributed them. We also, delivered lunch to a senior center for their staff and will be delivering food next week to feed EMT crews.

Farmersville Rotary Club

Gearing up to make cloth face masks for local seniors and area nursing homes. Besides Rotarians we have volunteers from the Twentieth Century Club and Farmersville United Methodist Church. We plan to continue this project until the Need is over.

Oakwood Rotary Club

We had our first Club meeting last Friday via ZOOM and we plan to continue until the restriction and ban is lifted.

Friday March 13th was a very busy day for the Mason-Deerfield Rotary Club. In addition to hearing about the District's new policy on meeting we hosted our 25th Charter Dinner. Dayton Rotary Club

The Dayton Rotary Club has continued their mentoring program with Dayton Public Schools high school students. In lieu of face-to-face meetings which were occurring prior to the CoronaVirus pandemic, 10 Rotarian volunteers are meeting virtually or on the phone to continue their support of the students. Many Rotarian volunteers have dropped off care packages on students porches to help keep their spirits up during the pandemic. Maintaining flexibility is key!

During the pandemic, Dayton Public Schools continues to deliver breakfast and lunch to poverty-level students who are now at home. When we asked if assistance was needed, school administrators explained that there are federal programs that provide food. However, the school district has a very heavy printing cost for parent and student communications of syllabus and other school information for the student households that would not be necessary if students were able to be taught in classrooms. The latest bill for printing of these vital communications was \$7,500. Dayton Rotary is working with available resources to help the schools offset this cost.



On March 30 we conducted our first on-line ZOOM weekly meeting of the Rotary Club of Dayton, thanks to the generous donation of Rotarian Frank Scott who provided the software. 45 members attended the first meeting and almost 70 attended yesterday's meeting. We have asked our members to volunteer programs and our options are exceptional! Folks have so much to share!! It has been good to see several Rotarians who have been unable to attend regular meetings and to know that we have provided them an outlet to stay connected.

Our Board members are personally reaching out to each member born prior to 1950, and the Dayton Club boasts 70 such members! Staying connected during these challenging times is vital and has been very much appreciated.

There are many small and simple tasks that we can do individually to help others affected by the pandemic: Provide restaurant gift cards to first responders, help with a neighbor's lawn care, donate blood, encourage our employees to be aware and conduct random acts of kindness, donate to local food pantries, work with our church groups. Rotary Club of Cincinnati Gives \$50,000 To help Stressed Families in Covid-19 Crisis

As businesses, restaurants and organizations close their doors in response to the Covid-19 virus, the Rotary Club of Cincinnati has opened its wallet - announcing the club is donating \$50,000 to help provide rent and utility assistance for families in need. The donation to the St. Vincent de Paul Homelessness Prevention Program comes at a particularly critical time, said Mike Dunn, executive director of the Society of St. Vincent



DePaul in Greater Cincinnati.

◆St Vincent de Paul is the leading provider of what we call homelessness prevention services, which is largely rent and utility support,◆ said Dunn. ◆In the past calendar year we provided \$1.6 million in assistance. That ongoing need is exacerbated by this current crisis.◆

In response to the health crisis, St. Vincent de Paul closed all of its Thrift Stores, which were a major economic engine that helped fund the rent and utility assistance.

◆The timing of this donation could not have been better,◆ said Dunn.
◆These dollars from the Rotary will, literally, keep people in their homes.◆

Rotary Club of Cincinnati President Dave Carlin said he called an on-line meeting of the Rotary Club◆s Board on March 18 to find a way to help in this community crisis.

◆We know there are people in the restaurant and service industries, people in hourly jobs, who are hurting and need help now. We wanted to make a swift, targeted impact to help those in need, particularly in the inner-city,◆ said Carlin.

◆We don◆t have the infrastructure to directly help. If we had to do it ourselves, it would take weeks or months to perfect it. We wanted to partner with someone who was already out there meeting the needs.◆

The St. Vincent de Paul Homelessness Prevention Program works with individuals to assess needs. The program provides funds directly to landlords or utility companies.

◆Our average rent assistance for a neighbor is about \$350,◆ said Dunn. ◆In an eviction situation, where a notice has been served, is it over \$600.◆

Besides providing immediate financial assistance, the program helps individuals work toward long-term solutions with financial literacy, budget counseling, job readiness and other resources.

◆Once someone loses their home, the cost to the system in community services and resources is \$4000,◆ said Dunn. ◆The economics of prevention make sense. But more importantly is the trauma to the family and the kids involved that homelessness can cause.◆

One of the Rotary◆s missions is to serve children in need. ◆This donation will keep children in their homes,◆ said Carlin.
