#### THE CONCEPT OF VOCATIONAL SERVICE


The concept of vocational service is rooted in the second object of Rotary, which calls on Rotarians to encourage and foster:

- VOCATIONAL TRAINING TEAMS

A vocational training team (VTT) offers a hands-on approach to vocational service. In VTTs, groups of professionals travel either to learn more about their vocation or to teach local professionals about a particular field. A VTT helps create sustainable change by strengthening the knowledge and skills of individuals and communities, thereby improving their capacity to serve. In addition to experiencing a new culture and fostering global connections, Rotarians participating in a vocational training team have the opportunity to make an impact long after their travels end.

Teams can qualify for a global grant through The Rotary Foundation so long as they address one of Rotary six areas of focus and follow certain specific guidelines for scope, sustainability, and measurability. Funded teams must consist of at least one Rotarian team leader with general Rotary knowledge, leadership skills, international experience, and expertise in the area of focus; and at least two other participants (Rotarians or non-Rotarians) with two years of work experience in the area of focus. District Rotarians,

The **2020 District 6670 Conference** will include a service project for Rotarians and their family members as well as District Rotaract and Interact members. Rotary District 6670 is partnering with Sleep in Heavenly Peace to build bunk beds for children who do not have beds. Sleep in Heavenly Peace is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization with the mission that "No Kid Sleeps On The Floor In Our Town." Our goal for the 2020 District Conference is to have the BIGGEST Bunk Bed Build Day in Southwestern Ohio but we need your support! Beds built on the morning of **April 25**th will be delivered to children in need in Butler, Clinton and Warren Counties on another day after this event.

#### **Financial Commitment**

Our goal is to build 150 beds (75 bunk beds) in just a few short hours. In order to reach our goal we are asking each Rotary Club in District 6670 to donate a minimum of \$500 to Sleep in Heavenly Peace. Funds are used to purchase lumber and materials to build beds on April 25<sup>th</sup> in addition to purchasing the mattresses, sheets, comforters and pillows prior to delivering each bed. In addition to the Rotary Club donation we encourage each club to host a SHP Bedding Drive prior to the event. Encourage members to donate new twin bedding: sheets, comforters, bed sets or pillows.

#### **Service Commitment**

Over 150 volunteers are needed to help build beds from **8 AM- 12 PM** on the campus of Wilmington College. No experience is necessary however volunteers must be age 13 years old or older. There is a job for everyone no matter the skill level. Unable to help all four hours? Split your Rotary Club into two shifts. Over 50 Wilmington College students will also be joining us a part of their Service Day on campus. We will measure and cut wood as well as sand, drill, and stain. Let's roll up our sleeves together and demonstrate the Rotary mission of providing service to others during our 2020 District Conference!

In the beginning Farmersville had a keen interest in community service and demonstrated extensive involvement and dedication to the Youth Exchange Program.

Current Club President, Beth Kuhn, organized the December 13 event for members and guests with dinner and a PowerPoint presentation of over 200 photos featuring a "Look

Back at the History of Their Club." Member, Greg Garner researched club secretary notes from throughout the years and highlighted personalities, amusing tales, projects, and the many accomplishments of this active club. Although it is a small, rural club, the Farmersville members continue their commitment to service in local and international communities. The club has had two District Governors lead the District, Orville Bantz in 2002-03 and Susan Bantz in 2006-07. A summary of some of the current Farmersville projects include: support with the District 6670 Youth Exchange Program, Boy Scout Troop 127, Food programs - CAMP food pantry, Sonshine-in-a-Bag - weekend food for students, annual \$6,000 Eleanor Miller High School Scholarship, Valley View High School Interact Club, RYLA Leadership Camp, Four-Way Speech Contest for high school students, Four-Way Essay Contest for 5th graders, STEM Fair, Determined to Develop - non-profit in Malawi, and District 6670 Dictionary Project for 3rd graders. Annual fundraisers include; Pancake Brunch, Fish Fry, and Twisted Pretzel Bicycle Tour concession.

At the conclusion of the dinner, a group photo was taken with the congratulatory plaque signed by Rotary International President, Mark Maloney. Bob Ammerman represented the chartering Germantown Rotary Club and District 6670 was represented by Assistant Governor, Wendy Kis*se*l.

## **Cincinnati Rotary's Jefferson Awards**

The Jefferson Awards have been called the Nobel Prizes for community service, and the next winner could be in Greater Cincinnati's back yard! Nominations are being accepted from the public from December 6, 2019 through January 17, 2020. Applications are available at



https://smblocalig.formstack.com/forms/2020\_iefferson\_award\_nomination\_form.Rotarian\_Bill\_Shula chairs the Jefferson Award Committee that will choose a local winner to compete for the national award. In the past 15 years, eight local winners have gone on to receive the national award! In 2019, Tim Arnold of Northside, who founded Lawn Life to give jobs and a second chance to at-risk young people, won the national award. Other recent national winners were Nancy Eigel-Miller of Mariemont, honored in 2018 for suicide prevention work, and Suzy DeYoung of Milford, honored in 2017, for creating a non-profit that enlists restaurant owners to help feed low income families. The Jefferson Awards is a program of the national non-profit Multiplying Good, which promotes community service and presents the national Jefferson Awards honoring outstanding service in more than a dozen categories, from service by public officials and professional sports figures to service by private citizens, students and corporations. The local nomination process is for the Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis Award for Outstanding Public Service Benefiting Local Communities, part of the overall Jefferson Awards. Winners are chosen through community nomination programs in more than 90 communities throughout the country. The Rotary Club of Cincinnati administers the nomination program in Greater Cincinnati, with local partners The Cincinnati Enquirer and WKRC-TV Local 12. Nominees do not have to be Rotary members. Bob Herzog of Local 12 will honor three local finalists and present the local Jefferson Award at the weekly Rotary luncheon February 27, 2020, at the Hilton Cincinnati Netherland Plaza Hotel. The winning nominee becomes one of 90 national finalists. Typically, five national winners are honored in a ceremony in Washington, D.C. in June. The Jefferson Awards program was created in 1972 by Cincinnati native, then-U.S. Senator Robert Taft, and former first lady Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis. The Rotary Club of Cincinnati has coordinated the local nomination and award program since 2005. The award honors community volunteers who provide special services to organizations or have created programs that serve unmet needs. Nominees exemplify the Rotary motto: Service above self.

### **Farmersville and Germantown Clubs Distribute Dictionaries**
