

There are 468,556 Interactors who are members of 20,372 Interact Clubs within 159 countries. Youth are encouraged to connect with leaders in your community and around the world to:

- Take action to make a difference in your school and community
- · Discover new cultures and promote international understanding
- Become a leader in your school and community
- · Have fun and make new friends from around the world

### rotaract

Rotaract clubs bring together people ages 18-30 to exchange ideas with leaders in the community, develop leadership and professional skills, and have fun through service.

There are 250,792 Rotaractors who are members of 10,904 Rotaract Clubs within 184 countries.

### rotary youth leadership awards

RYLA is a leadership development program for young people who want to learn new skills, build their confidence, and have fun. Events range from one-day seminars to weeklong camps.

RYLA events are organized locally by Rotary clubs and districts for participants ages 14-30. Depending on community needs, RYLA may take the form of a one-day seminar, a three-day retreat, or a weeklong camp. ### An Update From Your District Leaders Regarding COVID-19

On May 1<sup>st</sup>, we communicated to the District the Rotary International guidance for in-person meetings, which strongly recommended that Districts and Clubs refrain from in-person Rotary meetings and events through 12/31/2020. We advised the District will follow RI s guidance and asked that each Club do the same. Several of our District s Rotarians challenged the recommendation and asked for reconsideration. Virtual meetings were held with the Past District Governors, Assistant Governors, Directors of District Committees, current Club Presidents, and Presidents-Elect seeking feedback. Rotary International Director Floyd Lancia attended these meetings to share RI s position. Based on the feedback, the District s revised guidance is that all Clubs refrain from all in-person meetings or gatherings through July 1, 2020. The District is monitoring Ohio Governor DeWine s and Director of Public Health Amy Acton s guidance on social distancing requirements, face masks and limitations on size of group gatherings. As you are aware, even though Ohio businesses are starting to reopen, we are asked to stay home as much as possible through May 29, 2020. The month of June will allow time to thoughfully and carefully plan with regard to virtual meetings, in-person meetings/events/gatherings or combination thereof.

A Club s decision whether to follow the District s guidance rests with the Club s leadership. In making this decision , all Clubs are reminded of Rotary International requirements as follows:

- The health and safety of all participants in Rotary programs, meetings, and events is of paramount importance
- No in-person meeting or event shall be mandatory for any Rotary participant who may feel uncomfortable attending because of the pandemic
- All conveners and organizers of Rotary meetings are strongly encouraged to consider all health concerns in deciding whether to hold in-person meetings
- All conveners and organizers of Rotary meetings shall fully comply with all health and safety rules in effect in that location.

While it may legally possible to meet or gather, please keep in mind that one of Rotary s area of focus is disease prevention. As Rotarians, we are called upon to aid in reducing the spread of COVID-19.

In light of all of these developments, I am asking Clubs consider the following:

To assist clubs in their ability to hold virtual meetings, the District will reimburse each club not to exceed \$128 for the purchase of Zoom or other virtual meeting software. \$128 is the cost for one annual license of Zoom Pro purchased through Rotary Global Rewards

August 15th Rotary Night at the Dayton Dragons (https://my.rotary.org/en/member-center/rotary-global-rewards/offers#/offers/featured). Clubs may take a credit against the July 1, 2020 District dues billing invoice by providing a receipt of purchase. This includes a virtual meeting software purchase the club has made since March 14, 2020, the date the State implemented COVID-19 protocols. District Trainer and Public Image Chair Heidi Schiller will assist any club needing Zoom implementation and training assistance necessary to help deploy this useful tool.

Until there is a vaccine, very few places in the world will be coronavirus-free. However, in order to resume in person Club meetings, we need to be coronavirus-safe. We should all be working within the guidelines developed by Governor DeWine and the Ohio Department of Public Health, to assure the safety and well-being of our members.

It goes without saying that no one could have adequately predicted the extent to which a virus would disrupt the normal routines that we all have developed in our lives. However, you continue to impress me with the quality of virtual meetings and service projects you managed to master while keeping the safety and well-being of your members in the forefront.

As things change and if more guidance is needed, we will continue to be in touch. Remember that we are here to assist you navigate these rough COVID-19 waters.

### District 6670 Clubs to Provide a Reliable Source of Clean Drinking Water to Thousands in Haiti



In late May/early June of 2018, Ron Hollenbeck (past President of the Centerville Rotary club) traveled to Haiti with Dr. Greg Bixler [Co-founder/CEO of Design Outreach (DO)] to install a water pump in a remote part of NW Haiti. A water source had been identified at the location, but the 400 deep borehole remained dormant for several years because there was no way to extract the water. This was DOOs first attempt to install their Life Pump at such a depth. The installation was a success, and it was the first location anywhere in the world where a handcranked water pump was used

to bring water to the surface from a depth of 400. No power source such as electricity or solar panels was required. Not only can the Life Pump bring water to the surface from depths that other pumps cannot, it has proven itself to be more reliable, and can be monitored remotely. DO has installed over 100 Life Pumps in eight countries. These countries include Haiti, and seven (7) countries in Africa. As a testimony to the Life Pump's reliability, one of the first Life Pumps installed in Malawi has been running non-stop for almost seven (7) years with no breakdowns.

Before Ron left Haiti, he and Greg met with representatives from the Rotary Club in Port-au-Prince, Water-for-Life Haiti, and Global Outreach-Haiti Mission. There was discussion on progressing a Rotary International (RI) Global Grant, where they hoped to secure matching funds from both District 6670 and RI. If they were successful in that endeavor, they would be able to install a significant number of water pumps in remote or mountainous regions on Haiti.

Upon Ron s return, he made presentations to eleven (11) Rotary clubs about his trip to Haiti, and explained the initiative of developing the global grant. The response was fantastic. The following Rotary clubs made a total of \$33,625 in pledges:

Centerville, Fairborn, Huber Heights, Kettering, London, Miamisburg, New Carlisle, NE Cincinnati, Northmont, Springboro, Trotwood

With the help and guidance of Frank Scott, a global grant request was initiated with RI. If the requirements of the global



grant were able to be met, and matching funds were able to be received from both the District and RI, there would be sufficient



funding to install ten (10) Life Pumps. However, that was not to be. After 18 months of sustained efforts, necessary information (ex: Community Assessment Reports) was unable to be obtained from Haiti to progress the global grant. A big factor which prevented the information from being gathered was the ongoing severe unrest taking place on Haiti. A decision was taken at the beginning of this year to terminate the global grant efforts and to collect the pledges from the clubs. The pledges have

been collected and sent to Design Outreach. Their goal is to get the Life Pumps installed as early in this summer as possible, as Haitians are already experiencing big challenges in obtaining water. Greg indicated to Ron that the three (3) communities that will be the recipients of the Life Pump will be truly blessed, and will forever be thankful for what Rotary has provided them the a reliable, local source of clean drinking water. Each Life Pump will provide water for 1500-2000 community members. Once the Life Pumps are installed, Ron will receive installation reports from each location that he will share with the Rotary clubs who made pledges.

Finally from Ron **O** I just want to give a heartfelt thanks to all the clubs who made pledges to this important initiative. It truly reflects Rotary s motto **SERVICE ABOVE SELF**.

### District 6670 Special Grants for COVID 19 Support

The support required to fight COVID 19 is significant. People are hungry. People are ill. First responders and healthcare workers are over worked caring for themselves and their families and those who are sick with this virus.

During the month of April your District 6670 Leaders sought ideas from Rotary Clubs just for COVID 19 support. We had about a dozen different Grant Requests that included food support, personal protective equipment, support of first responders and healthcare professionals and other support.

When we looked at the support needs the total came to \$32,500. However, this amount was to be matched by Clubs and in total provided \$150,000 in COVID 19 support.

Your District Leaders came together to fund this need with \$25,000 from the District Reserves. The District Reserves are not used to fund District Grants. They are in place to make sure that District 6670 can fund operations into the future. The District Leaders reviewed the current financial position of the District and the anticipated future needs. After careful deliberation your District Leaders approved the use of \$25,000 from the District Reserve. The balance of \$7500 came from the contingency fund still available from The Rotary Foundation District Grant award for 2019-2020.

The Grant Requests were reviewed and approved and checks were issued. The clubs were notified the day of the review and the checks were sent out within 48 hours. Clubs have acknowledged receipt of the checks and implemented their projects. Some are still underway.
