Rotary so monthly theme for September 2020 is Basic Education and Literacy. I suspect that many of have taken for granted our wonderful local education systems. For the 2020-2021 District Grant cycle, 13 of our District so clubs reported they will be delivering \$32,550 worth of educational materials with the District providing \$17,000 of this amount in matching grants. This does not include projects outside

the grant process where you provide dictionaries, books, school supplies and backpacks. You read to our children in the schools and provide meals to hungry students. Fairborn Rotary Club even arranges vision screening for all Fairborn City School kindergarten students because what good is a book if the child cannot see it? Clubs, with Interact Clubs, you too are providing education to students by affording them the opportunity to learn about the values offered in the Rotary Four-Way Test. Thank you, Rotarians, for your efforts!

By the time this newsletter arrives, I will have made my official District Governor visit with thirteen clubs. I am asking that every club president to attend and to invite four of your club members to attend with you. District Membership Chair Shannon Graham will be discussing ways to retain and even attract members during the COVID-19 period. Public Image Chair Heidi Schiller will teach us ways to better utilize social media and the Rotary International so branding rules and guidelines. Frank Scott will share an overview of The Rotary Foundation, Polio Plus, District Grants and Global Grants. New members, this evening is a great primer to learn more about Rotary.

Please also mark our calendars for World Polio Day on Saturday October 24, 2020. I respectfully request that every club have a Polio theme for your meeting in the week leading up to this Day. Rotary International asks that each and every club worldwide donate at least \$1,500 to PolioPlus during Rotary year 2020-2021. If each of our 47 clubs made this commitment, we will have generated \$70,500 in Polio contributions. But it doesn there! The Gates Foundation 2:1 match means we will have actually raised \$211,500! This would be a new record for our District. Consider having a purple pinky day. Invite members to contribute and have their pinky painted with purple nail polish. You may know that during national immunizations, vaccine recipients have their pinky painted purple to signify their vaccination. Better yet maybe some Rotarians will offer nice contributions to avoid having their nails painted! ??

Global Grant Initiative for Providing a Permanent Source of Clean Water in Malawi, Africa

Hello District 6670 Rotarians,

My name is Ron Hollenbeck. I am a member of the Centerville Rotary club, where I served as President during the 2016-2017 Rotary year. I am now in my second year as an Assistant Governor.

During the summer of 2018, I accompanied Design Outreach to NW Haiti where we installed a Life Pump. It is a **hand-cranked water pump** that can bring water to the surface from depths of 500 feet. It was exciting to see the beneficiaries reaction to having a local, reliable source of clean drinking water. Subsequent to my trip, clubs from District 6670 made pledges to fund three (3) additional Life Pumps which are scheduled to be installed in Haiti in the very near future.

Rotary clubs in District 6670 are partnering with Rotary clubs in District 6690 to provide permanent clean water to twenty (20) locations in the country of Malawi which is located in SW Africa. In Malawi, 40% of the existing hand pumps are non-functional at any given time. In addition to these broken pumps, research shows another 14,000 communities have water systems that are non-functional during the peak dry season month of October when the water table is low.

The scope of the global grant is as follows:

- Provide each community with a LifePump and LifePumpLink.
- Replace defunct Afridev pumps in ten communities.
- Drill new wells in ten communities.
- Educate each community on life-saving WASH (water, sanitation, & hygiene) training to reduce the threat from waterborne diseases and COVID-19. Reduce underlying conditions that cause lethal complications when infected with COVID-19 by reducing chronic illnesses and neonatal disorders, caused by bacteria, viruses and parasites in contaminated surface water, and malnutrition related to a lack of water to grow fruits and vegetables for a varied diet.
- ? Empower community leaders with a platform of authority that will allow them to protect their families amidst the global COVID-19 pandemic and serve as regarded health ambassadors within the community with an impact that organically transcends community boundaries
- ? Provide women with training and resources to manufacture and market face masks that can be sold to neighboring communities, bolstering the ability of women to be wage earners for their households.

The Life pump has proven its superiority over other pumps through both its reliability, as well as its ability to bring a reliable source of clean drinking water to the surface from depths of 500. One of the first pumps Design Outreach installed in Malawi seven (7) years ago has been running continuously without any breakdowns. As a result, the Malawi Ministry of Water has mandated that the Life Pump must be used if water is below 45 meters (~150 feet) in depth. All twenty (20)

communities selected meet that requirement. The average depth at the selected locations is 60 meters (~200 feet).

There is a strong collaboration with the Bwaila Rotary Club of Lilongwe, Malawi. The project lead is Dr. Beatrice Chisenga, who is both a Rotarian and the Design Outreach Africa Field Director. The attached flyer provides some additional information.

Please let me know if your club is interested in making a pledge to this important initiative that will bring a local, reliable source of clean drinking water to thousands in need. **The deadline for making a pledge is November 1, 2020.** I am happy to make a presentation to your club or meet with your Club Foundation Committee.

PROVIDE PERMANENT CLEAN WATER

HYGIENE AND SANITATION TRAINING, AND SUPPLIES FOR 20,000 PEOPLE IN MALAWI



ZERO DAYS WITHOUT WATER

For far too long, communities in Malawi see days, weeks, or even months without safe water. Women and children commonly walk miles for contaminated water and its often not enough to meet basic needs. This means not enough water for crops, animals, hospitals, and no water to drink.

You can help give hope and a future by providing clean water, hygiene and sanitation training, and COVID-19 preventing supplies to 20 rural Malawian communities. This grant would allow us to provide each community with a LifePump and LifePumpLink to replace defunct Afridev pumps and drill new wells. This is to serve communities where the water is too deep for the traditional Afridev hand pump.

LIFEPUMP & LIFEPUMPLINK

LifePump is a hand pump that reaches deeper in the ground than any other hand pump and lasts for years before needing maintenance. This ensures year-round safe water supply and helps transform communities. Unlike traditional hand pumps, LifePump is designed to wear slowly over time—after years of operation—in order to prevent catastrophic failure that would leave entire communities suddenly without water. LifePump is endorsed by the Malawian ministry of water.

The LifePumpLink is a satellite-based remote monitoring system that allows us to measure and analyze the performance of LifePump, no matter the location. We are able to download the data and check the performance of LifePumps on a daily basis.

BUDGET & PROJECT DETAILS

The project budget is \$310,000 (including district and global grant matches) and it will take 12 months to complete.

Rotarian Beatrice Chisenga, Ph.D, will lead the project. The implementation will be a collaboration with the Bwaila Rotary Club of Lilongwe, Malawi, the Malawian Ministry of Water, Design Outreach, and Doxa Well Holdings.
