RI President Shekhar Mehta challenged us all as Rotarians to help Grow Rotary during the 2021-2022 year to 1.3 million members worldwide. I would like to share with you our progress as a District. The increase needed to reach Shekhar \$\&\rightarrow\$ s 8.3% net increase goal in our District is to add net 229 new members. We currently sit at a net growth of 24, or 1% net growth, so we still have a long way to go. I did want to give a shout out to the 20 clubs in our District that are showing a net growth since July 1. *Please note, these numbers are as of* 10/31/2021.

He spends a lot of time talking about literacy, and how two-thirds of the world \$\displays 795 million illiterate population is female, setting them up for a life lacking in education, and keeping them in a life of poverty. Shekhar challenges us all to look at ways to improve the lives of girls and young women in our communities. As I have visited your clubs, and also had conversations with other District Governors in the mid-west, I have heard about some really good projects that clubs are undertaking. Here is a sample of some of them:

Recognize Female Business Owners in your community Offer a program for girls whose parent(s) are in jail Develop a Girl Scout Badge

Hold a health screening day for teenage girls and young women

World Polio Day - Purple Pinkie Donuts

For more than 35 years, Rotary International - a founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative - has been working diligently to eradicate polio. Rotary's contributions, total more than \$US 2.16 Billion, making it the second-largest private sector and non-governmental donor globally.

Progress has been incredible! Polio cases have been reduced by more than 99.9 percent, and polio is now endemic in only two countries, Pakistan and Afghanistan.

To celebrate World Polio Day, the Rotary Club of Cincinnati partnered with the Wyoming Pastry Shop to host a fundraising event for End Polio Now! The Purple Pinkie Donuts project raised money to help put a stop to Polio. Every box contained 12 stick donuts – each topped with a dab of purple icing – symbolizing the way children's left pinkie nail is painted when they receive the polio vaccine. It is important to stay vigilant in order to keep countries polio free, and we are doing our part.



Fruit Bowl Project

Club 17's "Fruit Bowl" project provides fresh fruits and vegetables to students and their families at St. Joseph Catholic Church School. Because of your

Miamisburg Rotary Veterans Day Program

The Miamisburg Rotary Club s 10 November 2021 meeting featured a special program in commemoration of Veterans Day. We were privileged to welcome Mr. Kevin Rusnak, Chief Historian of the Air Force Life Cycle Management Center (AFLCMC) History Office, located at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, in Dayton, Ohio.

Kevin s enthralling presentation entitled The Road to the Unknown: 100th Anniversary of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier was immensely enjoyed by the 45 Rotarians and guests in attendance.

Mr. Rusnak explained that in early American wars it was not difficult to identify soldiers who were killed in battle. Generally, they were identifiable by townspeople or other soldiers and accounted for.

During the Civil War, many unidentified soldiers were buried in mass graves (Confederate soldiers who were killed in the North and Union soldiers who were killed in the South). Some were later identified but thousands remained unknown. Many were honored in a mass grave at Arlington Cemetery.

During WWI, the destruction and death increased with the new wartime weapons and technologies of �modern� warfare.

Many foreign and US soldier (out of four unknown casualties to be honored at the Tomb of the Unknown Solider. The remains were sent to Washington DC and received full military honors, including lying in state from November 9�November 11, 2021 (a very rare honor normally reserved for Presidents.).

The Tomb was officially dedicated 100 years ago, on the 3rd anniversary of the end of WWI (Armistice Day) on November 11, 2021.

Throughout his presentation , Mr. Rusnak highlighted several Dayton and Miamisburg connections to the war efforts, including aviation manufacturing at the current Fuyao site and at a former carriage factory in Miamisburg located on Pearl and Sixth Streets.

In October 1921, four of the bodies of unidentified U.S. military personnel



were exhumed from different American military cemeteries in France. The caskets were placed on a shipping case other than the one in which it had arrived. An Army Sergeant was chosen to select one of the Unknown by placing a spray of white roses on one of the caskets. The selection was to be delivered to Arlington National Cemetery so new Memorial Amphitheater to be interred in the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

The World War I "Unknown" is a recipient of the Medal of Honor, the Victoria Cross, and several other foreign nations' highest service awards. The other U.S. Unknowns who were interred are also recipients of the Medal of Honor, presented U.S. Presidents who presided over their funerals. The monument has no officially designated name.
