
A Message from Your District Governor - September

My home Club is Springboro, and like so many Clubs around our District we purchase Student Dictionaries to hand to third grade students each year. We also do a second literacy project each year in Springboro Schools. One of our buildings houses Kindergarten and First grade students. As we all know, some Kindergarten students arrive ready to read, and some do not. The schools identify the 100 students each year that are struggling the most with reading by the end of the school year, and we fund a bag of books that those students can take home for the summer. Our hope is that the students continue to read or be read to through the summer months and make progress. The feedback we receive each year is that this project really makes a difference for those children.

Did you know that two thirds of illiterate people in the world are women? Young women are challenged to stay in school in some parts of the world due to lack of bathroom facilities in their schools. We are looking to do something in our District and local clubs to recognize this day and make a difference in the lives of girls and young women.

Hello Rotarian Leaders:

As you know, our world needs peacebuilders today more than ever. Many of the world s most recognized peace leaders and scholars have pointed to the potential of young people, aged 14-18, as peacebuilders. Rotarians, especially those in Zones 33 & 34, agree with this assessment and are launching the Youth & Peace in Action initiative later this month. While Zones 33 & 34 are piloting the initiative to the east of us, we feel very privileged that our own Ohio s District #6670 will be participating this first year, as well.

On April 23, 2022, the Dayton International Peace Museum will host up to 100 students from our 47 different clubs at the inaugural Youth Peace Advocacy & Leadership Service Day. Leading up to that event, from October 2021 through March 2022, students will have an opportunity to participate in monthly ZOOM •Conversations on Peace while also following the online courses called •My Peacebuilding Foundation, which will culminate in receiving Peacebuilder certification from NewGen Peacebuilders upon completion.

Rotarians in Zones 33 & 34 raised \$500,000 to develop this program and all related training materials, including an online course for Rotarian mentors called Guiding Peacebuilders. Our district has been offered the special opportunity for our students and interested adults to participate in the pilot of this program for the minimal cost of \$30 per person.

Past Rotary Club of Dayton President Sue Taylor is co-chairing the District 6670 initiative with the Rotarian Kelly Lehman, who will be visiting your club in the next few weeks to share more information and answer questions you may have. We have a unique opportunity to contribute to equipping young people to be at the center of building and sustaining a culture of peace. We hope your club will consider joining us!

Fairborn Rotary Celebrates 90th Anniversary



The Fairborn Rotary Club celebrated its 90th anniversary on September 4th with a gala affair hosted at Young's Event Center in nearby Yellow Springs. The fun-filled event featured historical remembrances presented around dinner with a special number of special presentations. Current President Chuck Shonkwiler greeted Rotarians and their guests, which included a number of past presidents, as they entered the celebration site.

Past President Paul Newman Jr. served as emcee of the night's festivities which were highlighted by the presentation of 30 Paul Harris Fellows, thought to be a district single event all-time high of PHF awards. District Governor Carol Hughes gave a special plaque to the club and presented Paul Harris Fellows to the recipients. Fairborn Rotarians have generously contributed over \$200,000 through Paul Harris Fellows to the Rotary International Foundation.

Fairborn Mayor Paul Keller presented a special proclamation declaring September 4th as the club's "90th Anniversary Celebration Day". Additionally a congratulatory resolution was presented by the Greene County Commissioners, an Ohio House of Representatives citation was given by Representative Brian Lampton and commendation from the Ohio Senate was awarded by State Senator Bob Hackett.

Over the years the Club has involved itself with numerous community initiatives which include providing eye exams for every Fairborn schools kindergarten student, \$70,000 in scholarships to Fairborn High School seniors, a copy to every second grader of the club's Andy and Elmer children's book, a literacy project created to promote the four-way test, a copy of the dictionary to every third-grade

student, sponsorship of the city's renowned Fourth of July Parade and funds for global projects such as water wells, children's beds, earthquakes and a host of other worldwide emergencies.

Rotarian Marilyn McCauley chaired the celebration committee comprised of Dottie Meade, Christi Cox, Paul Newman Jr. and Paul Newman Sr. Club member Erik Tritsch compiled a video presentation enjoyed by all in attendance prior to the formal program.



As World Polio Day approaches, the Rotary community is getting ready to amplify our message about eradicating polio to protect the world $\mbox{\ensuremath{\spadesuit}}$ s children from this devastating disease.

Together, we ve made tremendous progress. Now it stime to intensify our fight to make polio the second human disease ever to be eradicated. Last year, the World Health Organization s African region was certified free of wild poliovirus, showing that eradication is possible even in very difficult circumstances. The wild poliovirus remains endemic in just two countries: Afghanistan and Pakistan. We can use World Polio Day to advocate for the support we need to end polio in countries where it still paralyzes children.

Inspire action

Take action for World Polio Day by promoting the importance of polio eradication, raising funds, and planning events. Let so engage our communities in the fight against polio because as long as polio exists anywhere, it remains a threat everywhere.
