September is the "Basic Education and Literacy Month" in the Rotary world. How appropriate with schools starting up for the new school year. There are many different approaches your club can take to support education and literacy. My home club of Springboro gives every third grader in the Springboro and Waynesville school districts the RI dictionary (which is more like a mini encyclopedia). The teachers have told us they utilize the dictionary throughout the year's lesson plans. Some say giving a dictionary is "old fashioned" due to Google, but you would be amazed by how many children say this is their only book they own. Speaking of books, your club can support literacy by giving your local school district summer reading bags of books that can be distributed to the identified weaker readers as they graduate from Kindergarten. Children that have received the bag of books have shown marked improvement in reading skills upon arriving for first grade.

On a global scale, literacy is a major issue, significant portions of humanity are illiterate. Many current and former global grants have been directed towards education and literacy. The Dayton Club has for

many years worked to build and maintain a school in Africa. I am sure they would be willing to give your club a "how to" information discussion.


You can also donate to Polio Eradication individually and this is a great time of year to do so.

2023-24 presidential initiatives

Rotary International President R. Gordon R. McInally is passionate about mental health and helping remove the stigma that sometimes prevents people from getting quality care. During this year, Gordon will focus on three initiatives that Create Hope in the World: prioritizing mental health, building peace through virtual exchanges, and empowering girls.

- Prioritizing Mental Health. Rotary has long been involved in mental health and wellness initiatives. Our culture of Service Above Self builds community and promotes acts of kindness, two proven methods to build and maintain mental wellness. Gordon is asking clubs and districts to expand on our culture of care by erasing the stigma associated with emotional well-being, raising awareness of mental health needs, and improving access to quality preventive care and interventions. He also encourages members to work with the Rotary Action Group on Mental Health Initiatives, a global community with expertise in helping people improve their mental health. Other action groups specialize in related topics, such as addiction prevention. Watch a message from Gordon about prioritizing mental health.
- Peacebuilding Through Virtual Exchanges. Rotary has a long history of working for peace
 through personal connections. Inspired by what we've learned during the COVID-19 pandemic,
 Gordon is encouraging districts to incorporate virtual components into more programs, events, and
 activities especially Rotary Youth Exchanges and Rotary Friendship Exchanges. This will give
 people new ways to experience other cultures, make participation more accessible, and build
 understanding.
- Empowering Girls. Gordon is continuing this initiative that focuses on elevating the voices and unlocking the power of girls and women around the world. He is encouraging members to keep finding ways to improve girls' health, well-being, education, economic security, and self-determination. Empowered girls become empowered women who can change the world.

Each Rotary District has a District Membership Committee comprising of a District Membership Chair and other Rotarians that have expressed an interest in developing a Membership Action Plan for the District, under the guidance of the District Governor. Our 2023-2024 District Governor Doug Buchy (Springboro) invited past District Governor Carol Hughes (Springboro) to fulfil the role of District Membership Chair (DMC) for the next three years.

Rotary International challenges the District Membership Committee each year with a few goals:

1. Assist Club Membership Committee Chairs in carrying out their responsibilities of attracting new members and engaging existing members.

- 2. Manage prospective members that come to Rotary looking for a club to join through the RI Manage Leads system on RI's website
- 3. Assist in organizing, establishing and supporting new and different types of clubs in our District, either where Rotary is not present, or in existing areas where Rotary is already active
- Communicate the Committee progress , challenges, and opportunities with our Rotary Zone Coordinator and District Governor regularly

District Governor Doug Buchy stated his personal membership goals for the committee at the beginning of July:

- 1. Increase membership numbers
- 2. Reconstitute Interact Clubs where they existed Pre-COVID
- 3. Add Rotaract (University based) Clubs at every University/College in our District
- 4. Reach out to past Rotarians (Pre-COVID) and invite them back
- 5. Look into new ways to do Rotary

Our initial meeting of our District Membership Committee was held on July 27, with 6 people in attendance, including District Governor Elect Dottie Meade (Fairborn) and District Governor Nominee Heidi Schiller (Oxford). Also on the call were Adam Horseman (Dayton), Ted Ramirez (Kettering) and April Walker (Springboro) and DMC Carol Hughes (Springboro).

We talked through the above goals and the roles of membership committee members.
