A MESSAGE FROM THE ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT

The people who know me best — my family — know that my passion

for Rotary is boundless. They also know that I don't expect them to get involved in Rotary the way I have. It's a choice that's up to them. But I must admit, I can't help smiling when I see them making the right choice. At the end of the Toronto convention last year, my 12-year-old granddaughter turned to me and said, "I'm inspired to do something. What can I do?" Naturally, I did what any other Rotarian grandfather worth his salt would do: I asked her if there was an Interact club in her school. When she discovered there wasn't, she attempted to set one up. Unfortunately, her principal had other ideas, but we should not be deterred from helping Rotary youth programs whenever we can, because their value is beyond question.

Take Rotary Youth Leadership Awards as one example. It transforms young people into more confident, focused individuals with a better understanding of the world around them — changes I was pleased to see in my 16-year-old grandson after he participated. My family is just the beginning. Everywhere I go, I meet people of all ages whose lives have been changed by our youth programs. They tell me how, five or 15 or 25 years ago, Rotary Youth Exchange taught them a new language or introduced them to a new culture. Their eyes light up when they talk about how New Generations Service Exchange helped them advance in their career, or about how membership in Rotaract first ignited their passion for giving back to the community. Rotary's programs for young leaders extend our ideals of service, friendship, and leadership development beyond the doors of our clubs to hundreds of thousands of young people each year. 

## Rotarian Spotlight: Fran Veverka



Fran Veverka never shrinks from a big challenge - even when it comes to confronting rats (more on that later). Currently serving as District 6690 Executive Secretary, Fran joined Rotary in the 1980's. "As soon as they allowed women into the club, I signed up," she recalls. "As a public health professional, I just knew I wanted to become part of an organization committed to eradicating Polio."

Fran's Rotary moment came as soon as she attended her first Rotary International Convention in Indianapolis, "I felt I had become a Rotarian as soon as I saw that parade of flags from all over the world and felt the commitment of this organization to promoting peace, improving living conditions, increasing literacy, and preventing disease." Fran's commitment to Rotary has never wavered. In addition to Executive Secretary, Fran has served as Delaware Ohio Club President and District 6690 Assistant Governor. She and her Rotarian husband Joe Evans have also hosted four international group exchange representatives and have attended a total of nine international conferences together. Traveling and experiencing new cultures is a passion

Fran and Joe share – especially now that Fran has retired from the Delaware Health Department where she served for over 31 years as County Health Commissioner. "I enjoyed a career in public health that spanned a total of 42 years," explains Fran. "It all started with a BGSU college internship as a sanitarian in public health. It was a non-traditional role for women back then. But the work is important – to protect the public supply of food and water. I liked that idea – even though I saw a news clip when I was in college of sanitarians shooting rats at a dump site." Undeterred, Fran took the job and even learned to shoot trap! Over time, she did find her talents more suited for public health education and training.

Fran completed her BA and BGSU and her Master's degree from the University of Michigan. She returned to Ohio and worked first for Lucas County, then Ohio Department of Health and then as a tri-county health commissioner before becoming Commissioner for Delaware County. During her career, Fran campaigned for 19 health levies in three counties and established important clinical services for the community. Fran and Joe continue to reside in Delaware with their lowland sheepdogs Doodles and Bentley – until the travel bug sets in. Then you just may catch them heading out of town in their camper van with a big "Rotary 6690" painted on the side – on to her next challenge.

#### **Four Way Test Contest Winners**



Herbert J. Taylor, who was President of the Club Aluminum Products Company, authored the Test in 1932 and adopted it as a succinct code of business ethics for his company. Rotary adopted the Four-Way Test in the 1940s.
