
POLIO PLUS

quite special. But let me tell you, there's nothing so warm as the welcomes that have been rolled out for me by Rotaractors. These are young people who are committed to Rotary ideals, who are pouring their hearts into service, and who, in the process, don't forget to have fun.

One of the highlights of my recent travels was a trip to Ghana, where I visited a district that boasts some 60 Rotaract clubs. They aren't satisfied with that number, though — in fact, they're excited about a plan to double it. They'll do it, too.

Rotaractors are vaccinating children against polio. They're donating blood where the supply is dangerously low. They're providing handwashing facilities to schools where children previously had no way to get clean. In short, they're all about transformational service: carrying out projects that make a real difference in their communities.


In Nakivale, Uganda, one special Rotaract club is making a difference in its community – which happens to be a refugee settlement. These young leaders are turning what others might see as disadvantages into opportunities for service, building community and opening up new possibilities to those who are most in need of them.

In Turkey, Rotaractors are visiting children in the hospital every Wednesday to lift their spirits by playing games with them. They also are mentoring new students at their university and teaching them leadership skills. Rotaractors are blazing the path for Rotary to be more relevant in this new century of service. And World Rotaract Week, which we're celebrating 11-17 March, is the perfect opportunity to get to know your local Rotaractors and talk to them about how your clubs can work together. If your Rotary club doesn't already sponsor a Rotaract club, know that you don't need to be near a college or university to do it: Community-based Rotaract clubs are a great option. And remember that Rotaractors are part of the Rotary family.

When Rotaractors are ready to leave their Rotaract club, we don't want them to leave that Rotary family behind. I'm asking all Rotarians to help them make the transition into a Rotary club or to start a new one: I'm happy to charter as many new clubs as we need to give everyone a place where they feel at home while making the world a little better. Service should be fun, it should be inspirational, and it should be open to all.

If there's one thing Rotary has always excelled at, it's diversity. In the past, that often meant diversity of profession, nationality, and outlook. We've made great strides when it comes to diversity of age and gender, and as we welcome more Rotaractors into our organization, we'll become even stronger.

Rotary is powerful. Together with Rotaract, it is unstoppable. Working side by side, we have the potential to Be the Inspiration in every part of society, to every person we meet.

As a first act, Becky fills a big role at the Athens County Prosecutor's Office as Director of Community Justice. After work she is usually out and about in the community on behalf of Rotary or other causes near and dear to her heart. Most recently, Becky even took center stage for the Athens Sunrise Rotary annual Murder Mystery, The Curse of King Tut.

Becky was first introduced to Rotary after seeing Rotarian friends Jenny Stotts and Liesl Crites post pictures of fun activities on social media. "I was looking for a way to give back to my community, so I approached Jenny who was President Elect at the time and she invited me to a meeting. Right away, I knew these were my people," she exclaims. Later, when traveling to my first district event I became more fully aware of all that Rotary does locally and internationally and the endless possibilities really hooked me."

At her first Rotary International Convention in Toronto this past year, Becky and the Athens Sunrise Rotarians attracted the attention of 25,000 Rotarians - getting everyone up and dancing before Rotary International President, lan Riseley took the stage. "It was a great memory to walk away with from the convention," says Becky.

Becky grew up in the Athens, Ohio area where she stayed to attend and graduate from Ohio University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Sociology Criminology. In addition to Rotary, Becky is a Board Member of the Athens County Child Advocacy Center and often volunteers for the Athens County Court Appointed Special Advocates program.

When not taking a starring role in community activities, Becky and her friends love outdoor exploring. From camping and kayaking in Kentucky to a dream trip to Lake Superior around the Pictured Rocks.






Rotary Dedicates Well in Rafiki, Kenya

One of the most dramatic moments related to the dedication of the well in Rafiki. The original plan had been for the 3 day process of drilling the well to be completed in time for the dedication - allowing water to be drawn from it at the ceremony. Gary Vaughan, from the Short North Rotary Club had moved mountains to make the plan happen. When the drilling equipment broke down, it looked like the ceremony would have to proceed with a plaque and some sort of well symbol. Replacement equipment was on the way, but it seemed

unlikely to reach us by day of the ceremony. As it turned out, just 30 minutes before the dedication ceremony, up the dirt road lumbered the huge drill rig and supporting trucks, making a grand entry onto the farm site. Spontaneous singing broke out around the truck as it approached the designated site. While the ceremony proceeded, the drilling crew assembled the massive equipment, and we were all treated with the site of the tip of the drill actually entering the ground. It could not have been better had we planned it that way!

IT'S HERE! ONLINE DISTRICT GRANT TRAINING!

We've listened and now it's here!

We're pleased to roll out the District 6690 Online Grant Management Seminar – District Grants. We have spent the past six months developing this online District Grants training seminar to replace the annual in-person training. For District Grant applications for 2019-20, at least one member of your club must complete the District Grant Management Seminar before submitting a District Grant application, and one of those club members completing the seminar must be a Club Rotary Foundation Chair or Club Grants Coordinator. If you need help designating a member of your club as Foundation Chair or Grants Coordinator for 2019-20, please consult your Assistant Governor.

The Grant Management Seminar is located at https:// my.rotary.org/en under the Learning Center. After signing in, if this is your first time on the Learning Center, you will need to agree to the Privacy Policy and take the "Getting Started with the Learning Center" tutorial before accessing the Grant Management Seminar.

If you have previously accessed the Learning Center, you can go directly to the Grant Management Seminar after signing in with your MyRotary credentials.

To find a course or Learning Plan you have been enrolled in, 1) Click on the menu icon ? at the top left corner, 2) Select My Dashboard and 3) Access the course from My Courses and Learning Plans.

So, let's get started! The Online Grant Training for Global Grants will be available soon!


