It's hard to believe that we are only a few days away from the 2022 District Assembly and Conference. The committee is feverishly putting the final touches together and it is shaping up nicely! I have been getting a few emails requesting a schedule of events. So, I thought I would share with you just a few of the many highlights...

Registration opens at 7:30 AM Friday, April 8th with the Assembly beginning at 9:00. DGE Price will have breakout sessions from 9:45 until about 2:15 that will be focusing on Rotary's Strategic Priorities and Objectives. There will be presentations and panel discussions around Increasing Our Impact, Expanding Our Reach, Enhancing Participant Engagement and Increasing Our Ability to Adapt. There will be tracts for seasoned members, new members and club leadership. Lunch and a morning snack will be provided.

From about 2:30 to 4:00 we will be participating in a hands-on service project with Mid-Ohio Habitat for Humanity. Not only will we be helping this

organization prep playhouses but we will have a DJ playing music to keep things lively and fun.

Starting at 5:30, there will be social time to network, visit the House of Friendship and bid on the silent auction items. The District Conference portion will begin at 6:30 with the Parade of Presidents. We have an amazing keynote on the agenda, Deep Willingham, who will share her story and the work she is doing around bringing those who have been trafficked back into society. Dinner and the keynote should be complete around 8:30. We will then have a dance party until about 10:00 to cap off the evening.

Saturday's activities will begin at 7:00 AM with a gentle meditation and yoga practice (all levels welcome!). Breakfast will be served from 7:30 to 8:30 with the conference general session starting at 8:30. There will be keynote speakers and Rotarians all sharing their Rotary stories. There will be three breakouts, one featuring Peacebuilding, one on Empowering Girls and one focusing on the Environment.

Lunch will be served at noon with another wonderful keynote, MelRo Potter. She will share her story about growing up in the foster care system and how that experience led to her passion today. There will be awards and recognitions, a few more Rotary stories from Rotarians and then we will close the session around 3:00 PM.



1000 Youth Program

John Martin, from Cambridge Rotary, is working with our District Leadership and the District Peace Building Committee, led by Tom Carlisi, on an exciting project, called 1000 Youth. This program is a modification of a very successful initiative to build entrepreneurship by the North Raleigh Rotary Club in 2017. To date, over 400 entrepreneurs and small business owners have been assisted by Rotarians in NC. 1000 Youth will be building upon this success by bringing Appalachian Ohio leaders and Rotarians together to enhance the startup efforts of local Southeastern Ohio businesses."

A dedicated team of servant leaders that are on a

mission to assist 1000 Appalachian individuals aged 18-45, to lift themselves out of generational poverty. This will be accomplished through providing professional development training, coaching, and mentoring, plus entrepreneurship skills.

An individual's environment creates a significant view of their world, both as it is today, along with their future vision. Our collective goal will be to create an exciting, unlimited, boundless world of infinite possibilities for youth and prospective adult entrepreneurs in your area now living in poverty. They will be trained to embrace an entrepreneurial mindset.

Clubs from across the District have the opportunity to:



- 1. Increase their member engagement by asking for 2 individuals to mentor a 1000 Youth student. This can be accomplished via virtual meetings or in person.
- 2. Help their community by identifying prospective entrepreneurs from 18-45 to enroll as candidates to enroll in classes that will greatly increase their probability of having a successful business. Existing businesses that are struggling are eligible also. The classes are free and developed by talented entrepreneurs.

Rotary Youth Exchange students and their parents met Saturday March 4th in Newark at Wilson Middle School. (Thank you to the Circleville Club for providing the delicious lunch!) Students were measured for blazers, got their "ask me



about youth exchange" student t-shirts, and were trained on safety, contacts, and hosting students. Long term students worked on learning Bosnian, Czech, Chinese, Italian and Spanish using the online platform iTalki, for which Rotary provided each student a \$100 gift card. Students log 1 hour per week on the program, monitored by outbound chair Drake Lundstrom. Students also do short research papers throughout the spring to prepare them for their year abroad.

Their next meeting will be at the district conference April 8-9th at Cherry Valley Lodge, where they will get to interact with Rotarians, work with RYLA and other Rotary youth groups, and participate in the service project. Be sure to look for these young people at the event and engage them in conversation about their Rotary Youth Exchange experience and goals for their year abroad!
