





"If You Can Read This, You're Too Close!"

We've all seen this bumper sticker intended to tell tailgaters to BACK OFF! While I have never displayed such a sticker on my bumper, I certainly have experienced being irritated by a rude driver. I've even spoken a not-so-nice message aloud (within my Prius), like, "Are you #@*%-ing kidding me?" to the driver who thinks it's so important to get wherever they are going that they need to drive dangerously close behind me (don't they know I get a better eco-score by accelerating slowly when the light turns green!). Now that I'm DG, my reactions have changed, because now, I see everything through "Rotary-colored" glasses (by the way, the color is PURPLE!). So, when I saw that same bumper sticker recently, "If You Can Read This, You're Too Close," I thought, "What about people who have never learned to read?"



Rotary has a theme for each month of the year, and September's theme is "Basic Education and Literacy." It's a month when we should especially confront the fact that over 775 million people worldwide over the age of 15 are illiterate - that's 17% of the world's adult population. In the United States, 21% of adults are illiterate today, and 54% of adults have a literacy level below the 6th grade. There are many reasons why this is not OK. One is that low levels of literacy cost the U.S. up to \$2.2 trillion per year. In our state of Ohio, 63% of 4th grade students are not reading proficiently, and 80% of lower income 4th grade students are not reading proficiently! (This is not just a socio-economic issue, as 48% of higher income 4th grade students are not proficient.) These are staggering statistics! Let's say it together, "Are you #@*%-ing kidding me?"

Rotary clubs throughout District 6690 are taking steps to improve literacy rates in our communities. Each year, several of our clubs give third and fourth grade students their very own dictionary and education-related resources such as backpacks. Rotary members volunteer their time to tutor and read to elementary school children in their communities. Rotary clubs are changing the lives of young people by providing scholarships. We can be proud of

the impact we are making in "Supporting Education," one of Rotary's Seven Areas of Focus. In fact, of all the applications for grants from "District Designated Funds" that have been submitted by clubs for the current Rotary year, more than half are directed at basic education and literacy.*

We know that higher literacy rates reduce economic stress, and that opening schools, teaching adults to read, making schools healthy, and enhancing educational systems help to break the cycle of poverty and social imbalance. Literacy is also important to one of Rotary's other Areas of Focus - "Promoting Peace." I found a great overview of the importance of education in promoting peace on the website for the <u>Central Asia Institute</u>, which supports education in remote, impoverished areas of Afghanistan, Pakistan and Tajikistan. The institute lists 10 ways that education promotes peace:

- Boosting confidence and hope
- Promoting independent thinking
- Inspiring problem-solving skills
- Building communication skills
- Opening doors for career advancement
- Reducing poverty

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- Increasing political involvement
- Reducing support of terrorism and militancy
- Building empathy and tolerance
- Cultivating respect

Our very own District 6690 Peace Committee is emphasizing the connection between education and peace. This committee, chaired by <u>Tom Carlisi</u> (Rotary Club of Columbus), is focusing the fall session of its <u>Peace Symposium Series</u> on "Basic Education and Literacy." I strongly encourage you to join us on Saturday, September 10th starting at 10am (Click <u>HERE</u> to register).

This Committee has developed a partnership with the Ohio Chapter of "Dolly Parton's Imagination Library," a program that sends a book every month to any child under five - free of charge - regardless of socio-economic status. This project will be featured in the upcoming peace symposium. Dolly recently visited Columbus to promote this program, and several of our Rotary clubs have already started projects in their communities. Ohio First Lady Fran DeWine has announced a goal of adding 17,000 kids across Ohio to this wonderful program by the end of 2022. IMAGINE how many children might sign up to receive books if our clubs help spread the word!

As your District Governor, I see firsthand all of the amazing dedication of our clubs and Rotary members in making an impact on education. Thank you for being as excited as I am about these programs.

And, remember - STOP TAILGATING! [If you can read this, thank a Rotarian.]

Project Update: Polio Plus

Rotary statement on recent polio detections in U.S., Europe

The recent detection of the vaccine-derived poliovirus type 2 case in New York, USA, and isolated in several environmental samples collected in London are stark reminders that as long as polio exists anywhere, it is a threat everywhere. As noted by Rotary International, "the best things countries can do to protect themselves from polio until the disease is eradicated from the world are to: maintain high vaccination coverage and robust disease surveillance and be ready to respond in the event of an outbreak to minimize the risk and consequences of polio re-introduction or re-emergence anywhere."

The wild poliovirus remains endemic in two countries: Afghanistan (1 case in 2022) and Pakistan (14 cases in 2022).

Polio vaccination requires several doses to create full protection, and once that occurs, children are protected against both wild-type and vaccine-derived versions of the virus."

Westerville Sunrise Rotary- Peacebuilder Project-2021-2022

Goal- To establish mini-libraries in the homes of 60 families of Westerville Preschool in which there is a lack of literacy materials are not readily available.

Rationale- In the homes of many of our preschool students, books and literacy materials are not available due to economic conditions, especially in immigrant homes and where staff have identified cognitive delays in their students. In an effort to enhance success of these students as they enter kindergarten, our committee proposed to provide a summer reading program for students with the stated goal to increase readiness for kindergarten in the Westerville City Schools.



Research- There is a significant body of research that early intervention with literacy skills with young students enhances their confidence, promotes self-esteem, and promotes readiness for a successful experience in kindergarten and throughout the elementary years and beyond. Because many of our preschool students are from immigrant families, we want to utilize texts that represent their cultures and heritage while these young people interact and learn within a multicultural environment representing their backgrounds.

Resources Utilized-We involved literacy experts, including Westerville Public Library staff, Westerville Preschool staff, Ohio Literacy Council, etc. In addition, we want our families to register for Dolly Parton's "Imagination Library," supported by First Lady of Ohio Fran DeWine in which students from birth to five are sent books monthly (free of charge) to encourage a love of literature and enhance reading skills- a key to success in the academic setting.

Funding of this project- It was estimated that a budget of \$10,000.00 was needed to accomplish the goal of providing 60 families with mini-libraries for summer enrichment and skill-building. We were able to secure grants through District 6690, the Westerville Sunrise Rotary, and sponsorships of families through the Sunrise and Noon Rotaries at a cost of \$25,00/family.

Identification of Literacy Materials- A subcommittee of Peacebuilders secured recommendations from the Public Library and the Westerville Preschool staff as well as the Ohio Literacy Council. The emphasis was to share literacy materials that model multicultural individuals that demonstrate diversity, inclusion and highlight students of all colors and backgrounds being successful in academic settings.

Identification of Participating Families- We requested recommendations from the preschool staff and its director-Suzanne Kile. We sent a letter to parents/guardians asking them to establish a daily schedule to read and discuss literacy materials throughout the summer. Sixty families were identified and each provided a mini-library.

Examples of titles selected- "My First Library," "I am Enough," "Love Makes a Family," "Whose Knees are These," "What Color is My

Hijab," "It's Okay to be Different"

Donations-Drawstring Book Bags were donated by Chase Bank, State Farm Insurance, and Morgan Stanley

Assembly- Members of the Peacebuilder Committee assembled bags at the Preschool on Eastwind Dr. They were distributed to students during the final week of the school year. A list of Parent Tips for Reading, a personal note from committee members, and a letter from the chairperson was included.



Evaluation of this project-Within the mini-library bookbags was an evaluation that will be analyzed at the end of the summer in order to determine success, a need for changes and a discussion with kindergarten teachers regarding suggestions for future projects.



Sock-tober Service Project

As fall brings chilly weather, District 6690 invites our 3,100+ members to participate in a new district-wide service project – **Sock-tober**.

"Sock-tober is our first district-wide service project this Rotary year that will make a positive impact in our community," explained District Governor Price Finley. "We are challenging each other to help the homeless in our respective communities by donating new men's and women's athletic socks to various non-profit organizations to help keep those in need warm this winter."

The BHAG (Big Hairy Audacious Goal) for Sock-tober is to **collect at least 3,200 pairs of socks – one for each Rotarian** in our district. The Sock-tober service project runs Oct. 1 – 31. Clubs are asked to go to the link https://forms.gle/VsmuD3PKEy4U57oz6 to record the total number of sock pairs collected by Nov. 11. Along with bragging rights, the three clubs that collect the most pairs of new socks (per club member) during the month will be announced by District Governor Price via email. Winners also will be featured in the District 6690 newsletter in December.

During September, club service project leaders are encouraged to contact homeless shelters in their community to develop plans for donating the socks. Organizations in the Columbus metropolitan area that may need sock donations include:
