If you've ever had a toddler, you know that they ask "Why?" a lot! Why do I have to take a nap? - Why

is a frog green? - Why does a dog bark?



Our son Rees once asked a question that completely stumped Alice and me - "Why can't I go to the North Pole and become one of Santa's elves?" That's when we admitted that we didn't have all the answers. Rees gradually stopped asking so many questions.

At some point along the way, we all seem to stop asking "why?" and we just go along. However, I believe it is time to reclaim our "why?" Noted author and speaker, Simon Sinek, who has one of the most popular TED Talks of all time (How Great Leaders Inspire Action), argues that the most important question that we should ask ourselves is "Why?"

Every single person, every single organization on the planet knows what they do, 100 percent. Some know how they do it, whether you call it your differentiated value proposition or your proprietary process or your USP ["unique selling point"]. But very, very few people or organizations know why they do what they do... By "why," I mean: What's your

purpose? What's your cause? What's your belief? Why does your organization exist? Why do you get out of bed in the morning? And why should anyone care? -Simon Sinek

If we can find our "why," then everything else starts to fall into place.

It was during my recent trip to Guatemala, that I was overcome with emotion and rediscovered my Rotary Foundation "why?" Her name is Ana Florinda. She is one of about twenty young moms who graduated from the Natün Guatemala trade school program the day we visited. With a baby wrapped tightly in a cloth sling and nestled closely to her chest, Ana Florinda received her certificate of completion. With her limited education, she has only learned to speak a little bit of Spanish (the Mayan people in this region speak the indigenous language, Kaqchikel), so it was impossible for me to understand her words. However, even with the language barrier, I felt the strength and hope in her voice and saw a proud twinkle in her dark eyes as she held her head up high and celebrated her achievement. As I write this, I can still feel the emotions filling my heart and tears filling my eyes as I realized why I was there and why I wanted to help make a difference.

I will likely never know if Ana Florinda's business is successful or if her baby will receive a good education and have access to clean water or health care. But the determination and love on Ana Florinda's face that day leads me to believe that the opportunities that she has been provided will make a

difference for this mother and child and others like them.

Ana Florinda's opportunity in this program was possible because of The Rotary Foundation. In 2013, the Upper

Arlington Rotary Club applied for and received a Rotary Foundation Global Grant of over \$75,000 to build a trade school to teach carpentry, computer and sewing skills to adults who have aged out of Guatemala's education system - most participants have a first or second grade education, are illiterate, and wouldn't otherwise be able to provide a means of support for their families.

The Rotary Foundation truly is one of the top charitable foundations in the world. For 14 consecutive years, The Rotary Foundation has received the highest rating — four stars — from **Charity Navigator**, an independent evaluator of charities in the U.S. The Rotary Foundation has earned this recognition by adhering to sector best practices and executing its mission in a financially efficient way, demonstrating both strong financial health and commitment to accountability and transparency. Only one percent of the organizations Charity Navigator evaluates have received 14 consecutive 4-star evaluations.

- All-time contributions to The Rotary Foundation's Annual Fund (the fund from which local and international projects are funded through district and global grants) and the PolioPlus Fund (the fund supporting Rotary's effort to eradicate polio) have totaled \$4.9 billion.





The District 6690 Nominations Committee is seeking applicants for our **2025-2026 District Governor**. One of the most important decisions we make as a District is choosing our future leaders. We are seeking the most qualified person for the position of District Governor. If you have a demonstrated history of leadership and collaboration as a Rotarian and are willing to share your passion and talents as our District Governor, please seriously consider this opportunity.

A Governor Candidate must:

1. Be a member in good standing of a functioning Rotary Club in District 6690;



- 2. Be a member of a club in District 6690 that has no indebtedness to RI or the District;
- 3. Have served a full term as president of a Rotary Club;
- 4. Demonstrate willingness, commitment and ability to fulfill the duties and responsibilities of Governor;
- 5. Demonstrate knowledge of the qualifications, duties and responsibilities of Governor as prescribed in the bylaws; and
- 6. Submit to RI a statement that the Rotarian understands those qualifications, duties and responsibilities, is qualified for the office of governor, and is willing and able to assume and faithfully perform those duties and responsibilities.

(Complete Duties of a Governor can be viewed at Rotary International Bylaws–article 16.030) Log in to MyRotary, select Learning and Reference, Policies and Procedures, Governance Documents.

The District Nominations procedures and application form are also listed on the District website, <u>District nominations</u> page.

Please note that the nomination/application form is attached and must be approved by the nominee's Club Board and the form signed by the Club Secretary.

Notice of intent to apply should be sent to me by **Nov. 5**, followed by a formal application by US Mail and postmarked no later than **November 18**, **2022**. As a courtesy, I would also ask that you send me an email with the nomination/application form attached no later than November 18, 2022. Please note that the form requires your Club Secretary to attest that the club is aware of and endorses your application. Please also include a cover letter stating why you are interested in serving as District Governor.

 Mentor young professionals in 1000 Youth Program to successfully enhance careers in Sales/Marketing/Entrepreneurship.






