By then, we'll have enjoyed some new year's eve snacks like fancy cheese and crackers mixed in with some tail-gating necessities such as wings and nachos. I can't wait - "O-H!"

I realize it's possible that you aren't as big of a football fan as I am. Perhaps you have another sport that gets you fired up. Our world offers many excellent opportunities for extreme fanaticism - March Madness, World Series, World Cup, Frozen Four, etc. Whatever it is, I'm sure you can relate to how exciting it is to connect with others and watch great teamwork at its highest level.

Speaking of teams, I know we all share a fanaticism for our Rotary team! So, let's use this opportunity to take lessons from one of my favorite things - football - and put those lessons into action with another of my favorite things - Rotary!

The questions I'm asking are: "What characteristics of a winning team should Rotary clubs in District 6690 emulate from football?" And, "How can watching football make us better Rotarians?"

Here are a few characteristics of high performance football teams that stand out to me and are rationale for Rotarians to watch more football:

- 1. Goals: High-performing football teams have clear, shared goals. Members of the team agree collectively on what the team is trying to accomplish. They are committed to working hard because they have all been part of setting team goals and priorities. We do the same thing in our Rotary clubs by gaining consensus on club goals and keeping our eyes on the ball, focusing on the most important issues in the club and not being distracted by small ones.
- 2. Roles: Every football player on a team has an important role to play. A team full of quarterbacks won't be as successful as one with kickers, linebackers, coaches and trainers. Each member of your Rotary club brings unique gifts. As they find positions they are best suited for, your club becomes more successful. We have strong and enthusiastic members who go into our communities and rake leaves for seniors in our communities or build a park for all of our residents to share. We also have members who contribute their treasure to The Rotary Foundation to fuel our "Rotary bus." We have members who are willing to take on club leadership roles. All are important and need to be nurtured.

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- 3. Shared vision: One way that coaches help their football teams work effectively together is by creating a shared sense of what is ahead, what the challenges may be and preparing for these challenges. If you haven't gone through a club visioning process recently, let me know and our District leadership will help.
- 4. Trust in the team and cooperation of the members: Each member of a successful football team recognizes that the power of the team as a whole is greater than the individual strengths of athletes. While this is an obvious ingredient to team success, it is also a very difficult one to cultivate. Good coaches stress trust and cultivate cooperation throughout the season. In Rotary, trust increases when members reflect on the activities they do at every meeting. Do our meetings intentionally build a sense of belonging and collaboration? Should we consider planning events designed to build a solid foundation of trust? Perhaps we should plan a club assembly during a regular meeting that could include relationship and trust building exercises.
- 5. Collective Belief: Call it swagger, confidence or "buy-in." Effective football teams believe they are capable of big things. This sense of confidence in the team translates into a winning attitude that becomes self-fulfilling. Our Rotary clubs do a great job of building group buy-in with shared understanding of concepts like the Five Avenues of Service, the Four-Way Test, and our motto of Service Above Self.

Rotary is one of my favorite teams. We have team colors (blue and gold - not maize), a team founder and mascot (Paul Harris), a team logo (the Rotary wheel), and even a team cheer song (R-O-T-A-R-Y!). We also have our own living legend in T.D. Griley, our District's sole living past RI Director, Rotary Foundation Board of Trustees member and aide to two RI Presidents! If you haven't already met T.D., attend a Newark Rotary meeting on just about any Tuesday and make a point to get to know him!

Through teamwork, we further our motto, "Service Above Self." And, one of the great things about Rotary as opposed to football is that when our team wins, everyone wins - "across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves!"

The District Nominating Committee has selected **Sandra Knoesel** to fill the District Governor position for the Rotary year 2025-2026.

Sandy Knoesel joined the Columbus Rotary Club in 1992 shortly after beginning her career at the State Teachers Retirement System of Ohio as director of Communication Services. She was promoted to deputy executive director of Member Benefits in 1999 and retired from STRS Ohio with 25 years of service. Sandy also was a member of the Rotary Club of Newark.

Sandy first volunteered for District 6690 in 2016 when she was asked to be district grants chair. She enjoys working with the club grant coordinators and helping them through the grant process. From July 2017 – June 2020, Sandy served as assistant governor to the Clintonville, Granville, Newark-Heath and Zanesville Daybreak clubs. When the pandemic hit, she was asked to coordinate the district-wide fundraising project to provide donations to three food banks in District 6690. Through the generosity of our members and clubs, Rotarians donated \$100,000 to the food banks plus another \$25,000 was contributed through a grant by the Rotary Foundation.

Sandy is co-chair of the new district Community Service Projects Committee that recently organized the Sock-tober initiative. More than 10,670 pairs of socks were

donated by 26 clubs to 20 different charities who help unhoused people in need. Sandy also serves on the district's Rotary Foundation and Multi-year Planning committees. In 2021, she coordinated the district's annual Awards Celebration that recognizes outstanding achievements by our clubs.

Sandy served as president of the Columbus Rotary Club in 2010-11. She also was chair of the Columbus Rotary Foundation twice, most recently in 2019-2020. She currently is co-chair of the Career Path Awards Committee that provides \$2,500 awards to selected graduating seniors from Columbus City Schools who are pursuing a career in the technical trades or other careers that do not require a four-year college degree.

Sandy is a member of the District 6690 125 Club and the Paul Harris Society. She earned a bachelor's degree in journalism from the University of Missouri and an MBA from Ohio University.

Sandy lives in New Albany along with her husband, Dr. Bob Kamps, who is a retired physician. They have four grown children and three grandchildren.



# **Progress toward District 6690's Foundation Giving Goals**

### **Shark Tank! Awards for Two Innovative Service Projects**

In early December, Clubs were invited to pitch service project ideas to a District 6690 review panel.

The purpose behind this program was to encourage new thinking about service projects:

- Increase knowledge of and alignment to Rotary areas of focus.
- Provide funding to valuable projects that may otherwise have resource issues.
- Provoke deeper thinking about where to find resources, partnerships, and expertise.
- Critical thinking about project goals, scope & planning.
- Opportunity to invite guests to experience Rotary Build membership by getting more community involvement.

Club presidents and grant chairs were invited to pitch projects, considering the following criteria:

- Define what you're going to do, with:
  - Strong participation from your club (and other clubs!)
  - Community engagement as volunteers, sponsors, consultants
  - And at least one **partner** organization
- How does it reflect RI's areas of focus?
- **Quantify** what will be improved as a result. Who does it help? How many? Where? Does it create lasting change?
- **Tell the story** to your community How can telling the story provide added energy for the project and give it more strength?

#### Two projects were awarded district grant funds to execute their project ideas:

- 1. Congratulations to the Rotary Clubs of Circleville Sunrise and Circleville Noon Rotary! The two clubs partnered on their pitch and have been awarded the first place, \$5000 grant to carry out their project.
- 2. Clintonville Rotary received the runner-up award of \$3000 for their project. (More about their project next month.)

Circleville Sunrise and Circleville Noon Rotary Clubs - Pitch Summary:

The Miryante Community Centre in Uganda provides certified foster care placement by licensed social workers.

Children rely on this program as a source of security. The children come together at this facility to grow food for the families they reside with, raise food and animals to assist the families they are placed with. They are taught life skills, provided with opportunities to receive clothing, haircuts, and all of their basic needs.

The program has been in existence since 2009. Laura Corcoran, a Chillicothe native, founded the Miryante Community Centre while serving in the Peace Corps. The program currently serves over 100 foster children in the Mubende District of Uganda.



### This project will build a new and much-needed community center facility.

On site, there is currently a hand dug well, fencing, and a playground which have all been sponsored by Rotaries in our district, 6690. But the center lacks a building to provide shelter, meals, and administrative space.



#### The new facility will provide:

- 2 respite rooms, one for multiple boys and one for multiple girls
- An office for caseworker intakes rather than under a tree, in an open field, or in the elements of the rainy season (as they do today.)
- A kitchen to provide a location to feed children that are dropped off and waiting placement.

#### Partners:

- First Capital Rotary (Chillicothe)
- Zanesville Daybreak Rotary
- Root Cause Uganda (nonprofit)



#### Aligns with Rotary Areas of Focus:

- Economic and community development
- Maternal and child health
- Disease prevention and treatment

#### **Budget:**

The clubs have raised \$6,000 and with a grant of \$5,000 we will be able to build the four room facility. This project can all be finished in the next six months.

We look forward to seeing updates about the project: the people and impact to Miryante, the Rotarians, the partners, and their local community's response!

### **Circleville Rotaries and Inspiration Station**

The two Rotary clubs of Circleville recently presented a check for \$25,000 to Inspiration Station, a 9,000 square-foot children's museum and event space being built in the community. This unique project complements the mission of Rotary and will offer hands-on learning activities to enhance the physical, mental, and emotional growth of young visitors. The space is set to open in early 2024.
