IRS Annual Filing Requirement for all Rotary Clubs in the U.S.

This note from your Club and District Support (CDS) team at Rotary International is to remind you of the IRS annual filing requirement for all Rotary clubs in the U.S. and U.S. territories.

Whether your club is a subordinate under Rotary International's 501(c)(4) group exemption or is independently tax-exempt, the IRS requires that all Rotary clubs in the U.S. and its territories file an annual information return. For those clubs whose tax year follows the Rotary

year, the deadline to file is 15 November. The form a club must file is dependent upon its gross receipts for the year. For more information, please see Frequently asked questions about annual reporting requirements for exempt organizations at www.irs.gov. Click here to read more.

We had to take naps every afternoon since it was thought to help minimize our exposure to the virus. Hard enough for my 4 year old brother, but at ages 7 and 10, for us it was almost impossible!

When the first vaccine became available, it was hailed as "a medical miracle" and every family rejoiced!

The Meaning of "Motion"

The "motion" is a group's first step toward making a decision. A "main motion" brings business before the group suggesting the group take some action. Only one main motion may be considered or debated by the group at any one time. Main motions may be changed by "secondary motions" during debate of the original main motion. Some secondary motions can interrupt debate without changing the motion under debate. For example, a secondary motion to "Amend" might change the original



main motion; however, a secondary motion to "Recess" might only postpone further discussion.
