

ANNUAL FUND SHARE IMPORTANCE

The Annual Fund-SHARE of The Rotary Foundation (TRF) is the largest of annual contributions by Rotarians. The money from it is retained 3-years at TRF and then **50% is returned to the districts** in what is called District Designated Funds (DDF). The remainder, after any necessary expenses, is placed in the World Fund of TRF.

Up to 50% of the DDF that the district receives is used for the matching grants for certified clubs' projects through District Matching Grants.



The other 50% of the DDF is used for <u>Global Grants Scholars</u>, Global humanitarian grants in the six areas of focus, district PolioPlus contributions and Vocational Training Teams. The money in the World Fund mentioned above is used in a matching system for these projects and for the <u>Peace Fellows program</u>.

The district goal is to have all Rotarians contribute \$100 average per Rotarian to the Annual Fund SHARE. Last year we averaged \$94.74.

Of the seventeen, seven were first-time Paul Harris Fellows and ten were plus. Each additional \$1,000 is recognized with a "plus" PHF pin. After a total of \$10,000 a Rotarian becomes a Major Donor Level 1. LIST Attached.
