A record 50 of our District's 55 clubs have attended one of the Grant Management Seminars this year, in order to qualify to submit applications for District Grants in Rotary Year 2018-2019. Only 17, however, have actually completed the process!

In addition to attending a seminar, clubs must sign and submit the Memorand Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) that was discussed during the seminar. The document simply says that the club understands its responsibilities to the District and the Rotary Foundation and will comply

with them. It must be signed by the 2018-19 President and President-Elect, unless an alternate signatory has been agreed on with the District Rotary Foundation Chair - me - at rickharned@gmail.com.



HAITI—WHERE ARE WE NOW?

In 2017, the Prospect/Goshen Rotary Club was awarded a Global Grant to implement the See & Treat Method of detecting cervical cancer in the Fonfrede/Les Cayes area of Haiti. In August, 2017 five Rotarians went to Fonfrede to train folks at CapraCare, our Haitian partner in Fonfrede, to detect precancerous cervical lesions through the use of ordinary vinegar, to freeze the lesions if found and remove them if necessary, all BEFORE the lesions became cancerous. While Rotarian Dr. James Haile trained Dr. Papillon and his nurse, Mirlene, we outfitted the exam room, unloaded a shipping container and participated in outreach and educational classes. We saw our first patient on August 3rd.

Get Ready for the New Year

Be Prepared! **RI Semi-Annual Dues and District Dues are billed based on your membership in the system on July 1.** New members are entered in DACDB and transfered to RI using the Member Compare Function. This is a 2-step process and requires loading the information, clicking the Add to RI function and waiting 24-48 hours to go back and be certain the member information transfered and a RI Number was returned. There is no longer a need to make ANY CHANGES to the membership or officer roster on rotary.org.



Rotary International (RI) has implemented a new requirement that **BIRTH D. BIRTHDAYS ARE NOW REQUIRED TO INPUT NEW MEMBERS.**

There are several clubs with what shows as unreconcilable issues in their MEMBER COMPARE function because of errors in start dates and/or birthdays. There are also several clubs who have members with duplicate RI #'s. Please contact District Administrative Assistant, Leigh Perry at 502-592-0930 or leigh@rotarydistrict6710.org for assistance.

UPDATE your club officers to be ready for the new Rotary Year on July 1! Run your OFFICER COMPARE function to feed your current and future officers to RI so your club has access to Rotary Club Central.

District and RI dues

District Dues are due after August 1 and dues for Rotary International are paid semi-annually on July 1 and December 1.

District Dues for the current year are voted on by all participants at the District Conference the previous June. Currently, dues for 2018-19 were set at \$31 per capita + \$220 assessment for PETS. An itemized statement for dues is submitted to club presidents, club secretaries and club treasurers during the first part of August.
