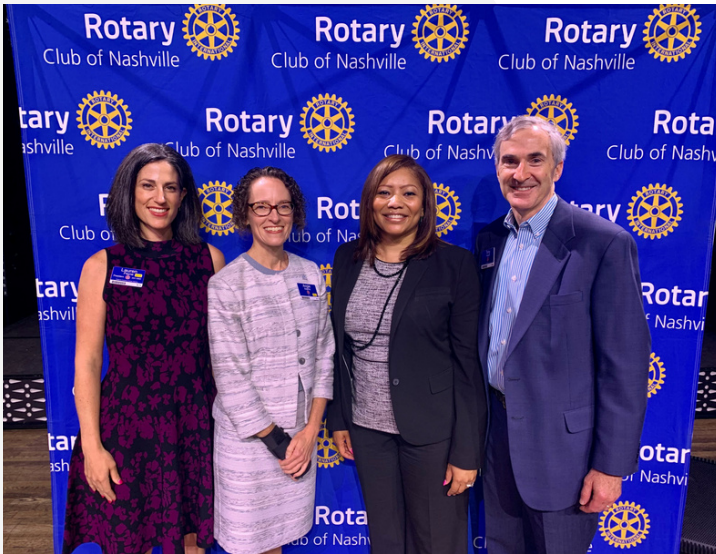


FORUM FOR FELLOWSHIP

Rotarians are leaders who seek to better understand our community. The program committee brought a diverse group of speakers to the Rotary podium this year. Rotary hosted 42 meetings. We navigated the need for evolving safety protocols and mostly met in a hybrid format, allowing members to join the meeting in-person at the Wildhorse Saloon or virtually via Zoom.



Speakers included Governor Bill Lee, Mayor John Cooper, university presidents, healthcare, business and community leaders. Topics ranged from current affairs, sports, lessons on racial justice and guests from around the country.



The Rotary Club of Nashville sponsors an Interact Club at LEAD Academy and a Rotaract Club at Fisk University. These clubs share Rotary's values and promote Service above Self for members. The Fisk Rotaract Club won Rotaract of the Year at the District Conference.

Rotarians are People of Action who live out Service above Self.

Backpacks with Second Harvest-Every month of the school year, Rotarians gather at Second Harvest Food Bank to pack 1,225 food packs to be distributed to children who experience food insecurity on the weekend.



Feed the Need- We celebrated our 20th Feed the Need this year as Rotarians, along with their friends and family, gathered for 3 service opportunities, packing and delivering food boxes to over 1,900 of our neighbors in need. We returned to Second Harvest as a group, working together again at our largest service project.

Habitat for Humanity- In September and April, we worked to build homes for our neighbors. We swung a hammer alongside the new homeowners to build Nashville's first ever Habitat townhome community.



Book 'em- Rotarians met virtually and in-person with an assigned classroom several times throughout the year, delivering a story and a free book for each child.

Inspiritus-On a beautiful morning in April, Rotarians worked to prepare healthy food gardens that produce healthy, free food for our neighbors in North Nashville.

Environmental- The environmental committee planted trees at Percy Warner in the fall and gathered at Shelby Bottoms in the spring to remove invasive species from the park.

Warner Elementary- We continued to support teachers and staff at Warner Elementary by catering appreciation lunches throughout the year.
