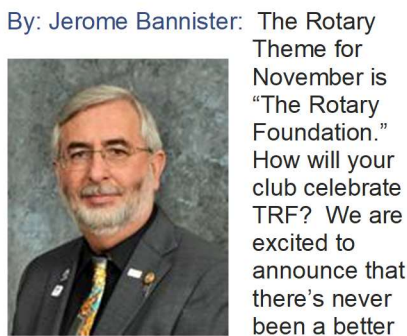

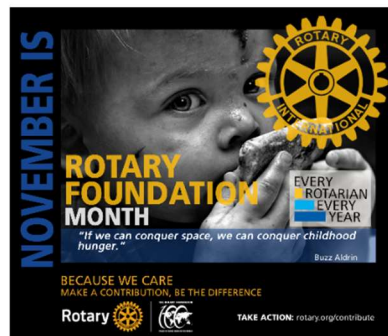

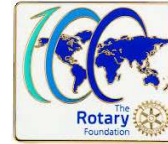

Multiple Paul Harris Fellow



When you give additional gifts of \$1,000 or more to the Annual Fund, PolioPlus, or an approved Foundation grant.

Recognition consists of a pin set with additional stones corresponding to your recognition amount.

Paul Harris Society

The Paul Harris Society recognizes Rotary members and friends of The Rotary Foundation who elect to contribute \$1,000 or more each year to the Annual Fund, PolioPlus Fund, or approved global grants. Learn more about the [Paul Harris Society](#).



Benefactor

When you include the [Endowment Fund](#) as a beneficiary in your estate plans or when you donate \$1,000 or more to the fund outright. Benefactors receive a certificate and insignia to wear with a Rotary or Paul Harris Fellow pin.



Bequest Society



When you give \$10,000 or more via your estate plans. Bequest Society members are recognized with an engraved crystal recognition piece, invitation to special events, and a Bequest Society pin.

Major Donor

Rotary recognizes individuals or couples making cumulative outright gifts of \$10,000 or more as Major Donors, regardless of the gift designation. This recognition level can be achieved only through personal contributions and not through recognition points. Major Donors can choose to receive a crystal recognition piece and a Major Donor in or pendant, and are invited to special events.



Arch Klumph Society

When your cumulative donations reach \$250,000. Recognition includes a special induction ceremony and your portrait, biography, and video clips in the Arch Klumph Society interactive gallery at RI's headquarters in Evanston, IL. Another digital gallery travels to Rotary events around the world. You also enjoy priority seating at the Rotary International Convention, and are invited to the annual

Arch Klumph Society dinner and other exclusive events, along with membership pins to inspire others to join in supporting TRF. Learn more about the [Arch Klumph Society](#).

CLUB BANNER RECOGNITION



D6760 Star Club designation is given to every club whose annual contribution to the Annual Fund and/or PolioPlus averages \$100 or more per member.



In order for a club to receive STAR CLUB designation, and be recognized at the District Conference, the club MUST turn in its Annual Fund or Polio Plus contributions by March 31 each year. Clubs that meet the goal by June 30th will be lauded by the District Governor during the official visit to the club. Also, there will be a special list of the STAR CLUBS displayed on and listed in the annual District Directory.

Designation as a STAR CLUB adds prestige to the Rotary clubs that achieve this annual level of support for our Rotary Foundation. Every year each Rotary Club can add more stars.

It is our goal to have every club in our District 6760 designated as a Star Club. What better way is there for all of us to affirm our belief in the incredible programs and projects made possible by the Rotary Foundation?

100% Foundation Giving Club



For clubs that achieve an average of \$100 in per capita giving and 100 percent participation, with every dues-paying member contributing at least \$25 to any or all of the

following during the Rotary year: Annual Fund, PolioPlus Fund, approved global grants, or [Endowment Fund](#).

Every Rotarian, Every Year Club

For clubs that achieve a minimum Annual Fund contribution of \$100 per capita during the Rotary year, and every dues-paying member must personally contribute at least \$25 to the Annual Fund during the year.

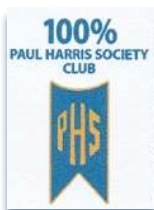


100% Paul Harris Fellow Club

For clubs in which all dues-paying members are Paul Harris Fellows. This recognition is a one-time-only award, but the intent is that the club will maintain its membership at the 100% Paul Harris Fellow level.



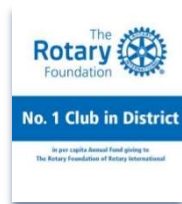
100% Paul Harris Society Club



For clubs in which every dues-paying member contributes a minimum of \$1,000 to the Annual Fund, PolioPlus, or global grants within a Rotary year.

Top Three Per Capita in Annual Fund Giving

For the three clubs in each district that give the most, per capita, to the Annual Fund. Clubs that give at least \$50 per capita are eligible.



Foundation Points Explained . . .

Donors receive one Foundation recognition point for every U.S. dollar contributed to the Annual Fund, PolioPlus Fund, or an approved global grant. Contributions to the Endowment Fund are not eligible. Donors can extend Foundation recognition points to others to help them become, or to name them as, a Paul Harris Fellow or Multiple Paul Harris Fellow. A minimum of 100 Foundation recognition points must be transferred at a time, and an authorizing signature is required by Transfer Request Form. Foundation recognition points may not be transferred from individuals to a club or district. Foundation recognition points do **not** count toward Paul Harris Society and Major Donor recognition. Foundation recognition points belong to the original donor until they are used or until the donor's death, at which time they expire. If the donor is a Major Donor, his or her points may be used by the surviving spouse.
