

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The RI Monthly theme for April 2024 is **Protecting the Environment**. The newest of R.I.'s 7 Areas of Focus, enabled by the actions of (2019-2020) Past RI President Mark Maloney (Rotary Club of Decatur, Alabama), has been supported by \$18.4M in Global Grant funding over the past five years. Protecting our environment has become overpoliticized, not only in the U.S. but throughout the world. That will serve no good purpose to our children and grandchildren in the long term.

Your District 6880 is participating in four Global Grants associated with Protecting the Environment—creating hope for "faces we will never see" but who will always remember Rotary's role, your role, in improving their life circumstances and those of generations to follow.

- Ancash region, Peru: Ancient dam rehabilitation to increase water supply supporting sustainable agriculture for 93 farming families in water-poor communities.
- Leslie County, Kentucky: Installing approved septic systems and connection to the public water system to improve water quality and access to clean water for 35 households.
- Antalya, Turkey: Installing solar panels on the rooftop of a 1700-student school.
- Chihuahua, Mexico: Providing potable, accessible water in two villages, serving 54 indigenous Tarahumara families.

Please take a moment to reflect on various ways we can make a difference and Create Hope locally regarding this vital Area of Focus. Something here touches every one of our communities. Clubs can do it alone or partner with civic organizations, educational, governmental, or other entities.

- Protecting and restoring land, coastal, marine, and freshwater resources.

#### Montgomery Sunrise Rotary Club's Jimmy Hill Passes Away

Jimmy passed away after losing his courageous battle with heart failure. His daughters, Lindsay Hill and Laura Hill Curtis, and their mom, Linda Reynolds Hill were with him.

Jimmy was preceded in death by his mother, Patricia Hill. In addition to his daughters, he is survived by his father, Charles Hill, brothers Randy Hill (Karen), Rick Hill (Amand a), and Mack Hill (Lisa), son-in -la w JB Curtis, precious grandson, Ben, nieces and nephews, his pet cat Miss Mia, and friends and family.

Jimmy was a longtime resident of Montgomery, graduating from Hooper Academy and earning a BSBA from Auburn University Montgomery. In 2015 Jimmy was named Outstanding Alumni at the College of Business for AUM. While at AUM Jimmy was an active brother in Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity.

It's ironic that Jimmy died of a weak heart when he had such a loving, giving, and serving heart. He spent the last 15 years of his professional life as President/CEO of the River Region United Way and as the State Director of C.A.S.A. (Court Appointed Special Advocate). Jimmy also gave much of his time and support to the community as a member of the Montgomery Sunrise Rotary Club. He as recognized as a Level One Major Donor to the Rotary Foundation. Jimmy led the efforts for the construction and the implementation of the Rotary Dog Park located in Downtown Montgomery during his tenure as president of the club. Jimmy caught the bug for hiking and no matter the weather, was always ready to lace up his hiking boots, strap on his backpack and hit the trails. With the combination of his love for hiking and photography, Jimmy was able to record the beauty of those hikes and share them with his posts and knack of storytelling. In the summer of 2023, Jimmy shared with the Sunrise Rotary Club the vision AUM had for restoring the hiking trail on campus. The club voted this as one of the service projects for the year. Jimmy was able to help with the building of the trailhead and clearing off some of the trail. This made the trailhead the perfect place for his memorial service.

Jimmy lived his life like he was on a hike - it's not a race, but a saunter; one step at a time; always stop and take a picture; it's ok to take breaks and eat a snack (except pickles!); share the adventure with friends; the trail may seem long but it's re ally not; hike with poles so you keep your balance; yes, the mountains are high, but you are strong and can make it; start early and don 't miss the sunrise; if you run out of water a friend will share theirs; if you fall your friends will help you up, while they are laughing; the best part of the hike is at the end when you can look back on what you accomplished and watch the sunset.



Demopolis Rotarians learned a road-building project that usually would take 20 years to complete will be finished in only five.

**Kevin White,** regional vice president of Birminghambased Brasfield and Gorrie, speaking to the club March

6, said the widening of the U.S. Hwy. 43/69 corridor from Thomasville to Moundville will be finished in record time because of a progressive design-build model.

The construction firm is contracted to build the entire corridor. Working with engineers and designers from ALDOT, it doesn't have to complete one section of the project before starting

work on another, which will enable the highway to be completed in a quarter of the usual time.

"It is the first time ALDOT has used this delivery model," White said. It enables the project to be built in the most cost-efficient manner possible. Actual construction to make the section four lanes instead of two, separated by a 60-foot median, is expected to begin later this year and be completed by the middle of 2029. White said one of the engineers on the project estimated that enough earth will be moved during construction to fill Bryan-Denny stadium eight times.

In another infrastructure project, club members learned that fiber optic, high-speed internet is coming to Demopolis and Marengo County. **George Henry,** CEO of Yellowhammer Networks, on Wednesday, March 13, said that his firm will oversee the contractors who will install the network. Already he has set up an office in Demopolis to serve as headquarters for the local section of the project, even though he doesn't expect actual work to start for another "year-and-a-half-ish." Once begun, the Demopolis installation will take between nine and 12 months, depending on the condition of the utility poles the company will use and whether

cable must be buried. Construction is going on throughout west central Alabama. "I have 3 ½ years to get all of that done," Henry said.



"There are probably about 35 or 40 things that people don't know we have anything to do with," said **Walton Roberts**, director of the Demopolis Parks and Recreation Department, at the March 27 meeting.

The events and activities sponsored by the department not only benefit the residents of the city but bring in welcomed tax revenue from visitors. Growing in popularity are the fishing tournaments scheduled on more than half the weekends during the year.

Our Rotary guest speaker on April 1 was U.S. Navy Rear Admiral Mike Brown. He is a Montgomery native who graduated from



Lee High School. He has degrees from Tulane and Georgetown.

RADM Brown returned to Montgomery in preparation for the Beyond the Horizon Air Show, featuring the U.S. Navy's Blue Angels. He says there are several misconceptions about the Navy, pointing out that aircraft carriers belong to the Navy, not the U.S. Air Force, and that Tom Cruise was a Navy aviator in the film "Top Gun."

RADM Brown reminded us that the U.S. is a maritime nation, with the seas providing the lifeblood of our economy. He says 26% of U.S. jobs are tied to global trade exports. Alabama's annual exports total \$27 billion, including agricultural goods, timber, paper, vehicles and components for ships and aircraft.

The Navy ensures that Alabama's exports get out of port. In wartime, ships are a critical part of homeland defense. An aircraft carrier represents five acres of

U.S. territory at sea, able to launch necessary attacks without permission from other nations. RADM Brown says China presents a threat to the world's oceans. He says China is challenging rules set 80 years ago in an attempt for Beijing to take control away from the U.S. to establish military dominance for the world's autocrats and tyrants.

He says the U.S. will defend global checkpoints, building relationships through goodwill. Unmanned U.S. warships are capable of launching missiles, but he says China is getting better at its own long-range weapons.



#### Mobile Sunrise Rotary

Andy Wynne, Director of the Child Advocacy Center of Mobile (CAC) introduced this great non-profit organization that is the Mobile community response to the problem of child sexual abuse.

A wide range of services offered 'under one roof' to sexually abused children and their non-offending family members helps them begin the healing process and prepare for the criminal justice proceedings. In the comfortable environment of the Center, twenty-eight professionals from several different agencies (including Mobile County Sheriff's Department, Mobile Police Department, Prichard Police Department, Mobile Department of Human Resources, Mobile County District



Attorney's Office, Lifelines Family Counseling Center, University of South Alabama Children's Medical Center) work together as a team to provide healing, counseling, support, and prosecution services.

There are many donors that support CAC and Andy said: "Words are not adequate to thank them for all they do to help care for the young victims of severe abuse CAC cares for. Donors' kindness is truly life changing, not only for their families, future generations, and even those who provide the care. Caring for children who have experienced the unimaginable if life changing. Innocence is truly lost. How relationships are viewed is fundamentally changed forever. Donors provide the hope these children long for and they are evidence of all that is good in the world."



The Mobile Museum of Art (MMofA) includes a permanent collection of more than 6,400 works of fine and decorative arts from America, Asia, and Europe. This collection spans periods from classical antiquity to the present day. MMofA is

supported by a unique public/private partnership of city and community support. Its facility is owned by the city of Mobile, and the art collection is privately owned.

Founded in 1964, MMofA has grown from a modest initiative of The Board of Commissioners of the City of Mobile, and two private arts entities, the Allied Arts Council, and the Mobile Arts Association, to the only accredited art museum in southern Alabama.



Jon Carfagno took the reins as the new Executive Director of the Mobile Museum of Art, on February 14, 2023, after a nationwide search. Jon came with both outstanding credentials and extensive experience with major art institutions. Over the last 10 months, many heard him say, "The future is bright for Mobile Museum of Art!"

Under his leadership MMofA is experiencing growth in every phase of its operations - in daily admissions, memberships, educational programming, exhibitions, new acquisitions, and financial support. The growth in financial support in particular has enabled the Museum to expand its staff to broaden its offerings, as well as present a series of exhibitions demonstrating the art and culture of Mobile through the decades. But even more exciting is the enabling of the Museum to commit to some truly spectacular blockbuster exhibitions in the coming months.

As the Museum approaches the 60th anniversary of the founding of MMofA, Jon looks forward to October 2024 for a gala celebration as never seen before by the Museum, when it brings together the artists who were featured in the Museum of Modern Art's 'The Responsive Eye' exhibition, which took New York City by storm at the time of MMofA's founding. Indeed, exciting times lay ahead for MMofA and Jon hopes that many Mobilians and others will be part of



Though this is Gina's first political office, she was not a newcomer to politics or to government work. Gina served the citizens of Mobile as the City's Public Relations Director and Spokesperson under former Mayor Mike Dow for three years. During that time, Gina was an integral part of Dow's executive staff, overseeing the Mayor's communications, the City's Special

Events Department, and sister cities' activities. After leaving her post in Mayor Dow's administration, Gina worked for eight years with MDi Media Group as the company's Public Relations Director before serving as the Community Affairs Leader with Hargrove Engineers + Constructors.

Gina has a broad background in media and government including reporting and anchoring the news at Mobile's WKRG-TV, WSFA-TV in Montgomery, AL, WCJB-TV in Gainesville, FL, and WJXT-TV in Jacksonville, FL. Gina's experience in government extends to the state level. She served as the Associate Director for the Alabama Petroleum Council in Montgomery, as a Public Affairs Representative and Lobbyist. As the Associate Director, Gina represented companies doing business in the state, she was a member of the Business Council of Alabama and participated in regional and national legislative conferences.


Kelly said she reached out to Rotary to restart Interact Club for more service opportunities.


