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From the Desk of Coach & DG Howard

Where did half a year go? March has come and gone and April is upon us. "In like a lion, our like a lamb" kind of characterized the weather in our District and much of the nation. Mardi Gras, St. Patrick's Day the transition from the gridiron to the hardwood court. But don't let that fool you, "the glass is still half full" and as Rotarians we have several months left to fulfill our responsibilities to be "ALL IN" with the "MAGIC of Rotary!" It is time however to review our goals and aspirations for the RI fiscal year. Whether you are an AG, a club President or other club leader or you are an individual Rotarian. Look back at the last six months and review what you have accomplished and what you still want to accomplish through Rotary. What can you do for the rest of the 2025-2026 Rotary year to shift your focus from "being a member of Rotary to being a Rotarian?"

As I write this, we share a degree of unprecedented change globally, nationally and within Rotary. We understand that most people resist change. Change forces us to reevaluate and that can be tough. Where are you in your personal goals and club goals? If you are a club or area leader, how best can you leave a positive legacy for Rotary this next year and beyond? What can you do to help your club meet your goals in your community? How have you done personally at growing Rotary? What areas can you invest in to make your club more irresistible and more inviting? Does your club have a process to help develop or execute strategic goals for the next three years? How are you doing at visioning your remaining meetings, social events and any fundraising opportunities to impact your community? Are any of your folks exhausted or burned out? What can you personally do? I'm going to give you some low-cost high value suggestions and it matters not if you are a new Rotarian or a long-time part of your club. I'm going to call it the "ALL IN" challenge of three.

- 1) Find three people a month in your club who you appreciate and tell them thank you!
- 2) Find three people not currently in Rotary you will invite to a club function over the next three months.
- 3) Pick a Rotary or club cause you are not currently giving to and give \$30 (or more) a month over the next three months. Polio, District Foundation Disaster Relief, TRF Paul Harris giving, a local club project fund like books for the library or collection for another vetted cause.

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4) If your club does not have a regular after hours social, ask three fellow club members to bring their spouses or a friend and all go out together at least once a month for the next three months. Report it to your club secretary and ask it be counted as a "make-up."

5) Talk to your club leaders about making sure at least three members from your club go to the yearend Conference in Orange Beach as a group. Socialize, meet other Rotarians and come back home with new ideas for your club to try next year. **YOU NEED TO REGISTER AND GET A ROOM NOW!**

6) Ask your incoming President to appoint at least three members to be your Club's "Disaster Response contacts" and identify something your club will do when the next hurricane, tornado or flood strikes your community or your neighboring clubs within a 3hr radius

Myanmar and Thailand region's devastating and massive 7.7 magnitude earthquake


Speaking of Disaster Response, we probably have all heard as you read this that Myanmar and Thailand have been struck by a devastating 7.7 magnitude earthquake causing widespread destruction. This is a huge humanitarian crisis.

The initial earthquake was followed by a significant aftershock of 6.4M approximately 12 minutes later and more in the 5+ range since. Tremors were felt as far as China when the epicenter of the earthquake hit central Myanmar. More than six million people are thought to have been in areas experiencing the intense tremors. Buildings have been reduced to rubble, as of this writing an estimated 2,000 people are missing or feared dead. Homes are destroyed. On top of this, it is likely thousands will remain displaced or living in damaged

homes for the foreseeable future and require humanitarian assistance.

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Even the most dedicated Alabama Rotarians can't probably be of much help on the ground but there is something you can do, and I'll relate it back to my theme of threes. Continued on next page

Rotary could almost fill her days some weeks but she is also the mom of student athletes heavily involved in travel ball teams, she hunts with her husband David and her kids and manages the household when David is called out to emergencies as a commercial high voltage lineman, often traveling for days away from home to assist with storm repairs to get power back to storm victims.

We set up training at Midyear and if there is sufficient interest, Grants Chair Michelle Thomason will work to provide help or 1:1 Q&A in Orange Beach. Contact Michelle and make arrangements. This training is for District Grant qualification only. Someone from your club must attend for your club to apply for a 2025-26 district grant. If you meet with her, please bring a computer or tablet to begin setting up your grant as we walk through the process. Clubs interested in applying for a global grant in the 2025-26 Rotary year. Reminder: Your 2024-25 district grant final report is due by May 31st and must be completed to apply for a 2025-26 district grant.

In addition, its members are counted in the numbers of the sponsor Rotary club. It's a win-win situation! To help explain satellite clubs, RI has created a <u>brief</u>, <u>dynamic video</u> you can show your district's club presidents and membership chairs. My wife, Karen, and I attended the International Assembly (IA) in Orlando, FL for all 535 incoming DGEs from around the world. At last count only 4 DGEs were not able to attend, all due to illness. IA is an extremely busy week of training and networking in preparation for our upcoming year as District Governor. In addition to the DGE training there was just as much training for the DGE partners which Karen really enjoyed, and thought was very useful.

This year each DGE was assigned to a small "cohort" with other DGEs and their partners. Our cohort had two DGEs from South Korea, one from India, one from Nigeria and me. The South Korean DGEs were

not fluent in English, but one of them was able to bring their daughter along who was very fluent in English. We had one evening together and several other shorter sessions where we all learned from each other about Rotary in different cultures. I built a special connection with DGE Henry Akinyele from Nigeria since our District has partnered with a Nigerian District in a Global Grant in the past. We hope to be able to find another Global Grant opportunity with them soon.



There was also a Brazilian Night gala in honor of our incoming Rotary International President, Mario de Carmargo and his wife Denise. During the program at the gala President Mario revealed his theme for the upcoming Rotary Year as "Unite For Good" (possibly our last Rotary theme). President Mario spent a year in Minnesota as a Youth Exchange student and has been a Rotarian ever since.



We also had a "Cultural Night" where each Rotary Zone (our Zone is known as the Heart of America Zone) had an exhibit and demonstrated something unique to their Zone. Our Zone's cultural theme was American Football where we all dressed in our favorite team jerseys and had a tailgate party for all. It was a huge hit, with folks from around the world lined up to play cornhole. When someone from India, Japan, Mozambique, Brazil or any other country scored you would have thought they just won the Super Bowl! Visiting other Zone exhibits was fun and exciting.



I am personally saddened as his District Governor I to share the passing of Mickey McInnish, Mickey was known in Rotary Circles as a mutual friend and prominent Montgomery Rotarian, he served many times as District Midyear or Conference Chair- emeritus, as a Past Club President of the Montgomery Sunrise Rotary Club and a former AG. Mickey passed peacefully on Monday, April 7th. Mickey is survived by his family including his wife Sue, his three children and a host of grandchildren who filled him with joy and who knew him as "Big Mac" in recognition of his fondness for taking them for a burger. Mickey also leaves a huge extended Rotary family as well as his professional friends and family from his long government service tenure with the City of

Montgomery. Mickey was a longtime member of Montgomery Sunrise and even after retiring, he was made an honorary member just recently so that he could come out of retirement to help chair the 2025 Midyear and District Conferences. He was born in Birmingham, Alabama but still loved to celebrate the end of any successful conference with a glass of Scotch. If you look [underline added] closely at the photo of Mickey you will see his lapel pin is from the 2014-2015 Rotary Year. That year, the Rotary International President chose "Light up Rotary" as his theme. He urged Rotarians, "You know where you are strong, you know what your community needs, and you know how you can help." Referring to the Confucius' pronouncement, "It is better to light a single candle, than to sit and curse the darkness." He added, "The Rotary way is the Confucius way. The Rotary way is to light a candle. I light one, you light one, 1.2 million Rotarians light one. Together, we light up the world."

Mickey had many friends not the least of which were almost all of the District 6880 College of Governors (whom Mickey served time and time again as their conference chair) and his fellow club members. Attendees at the service included uniformed command staff from several agencies including the Montgomery Police and Fire Departments as well as colleagues he had worked with on any number of community projects in his tenure with the Montgomery City Attorney's Office. A number of Rotarians, including several in the current or past line of District Governors, who came to support Sue and his family at a Celebration of Life held recently at First United Methodist Church, in Montgomery, where Mickey was a prominent member of the church's music ministry. He indeed leaves a legacy of service to his community and was the kind of "bright light" in District 6880 that was embodied that year's "Light up Rotary" theme!

Mickey lived an amazing and full life and was involved in so many things you probably never even knew about. It is worth pulling up his full obituary at



In 1975 he became an Associate Professor of Radiology in Charleston, SC, where he also met his wife, Sissy. In 1984 he joined a group of radiologists at the Mobile Infirmary and became president of the medical staff in 2001.

Doug was highly respected for his art of diplomacy, gentle nature, and his extraordinary capability of solving difficult issues. He practiced in Mobile for 25 years, retiring in 2016.

In his retirement, Doug was an avid tennis player, voracious reader and exercise enthusiast. He was a member of St. Paul's choir, numerous clubs, organizations and friend groups. 
