

have light appetizers, the vessel has a full bar and both inside and outside seating so "rain or shine" you will have a beautiful unique start to our annual conference. If you're even still hungry and not full from the appetizers

Plan your *Thursday dinner is on your own* at one of the many fantastic eateries in Orange Beach that run the gambit from elegant like the new "*Coastal*" about 100 yard walk from the Hampton Inn to the regional "locals" beach bars like the famous "*Flora Bama*" just a short drive east.



#### MONTGOMERY CAPITAL ROTARY

Recently, Charles Jinright, Montgomery City Counselor, was the Montgomery Capital Rotary Club guest speaker. He spoke briefly about current issues facing the city government. In addition, he brought the current director of Garrett Coliseum, Christina Thornton, with him explain Garrett's transformation since the city assumed control from the state. She briefed us on its history, expanded facility use, and provided updates to the structure.

Garrett was built in 1954. The Coliseum was the first of its kind to have an arched ceiling measuring over 100 feet, and over 7,000 seats without an obstructed view. The original purpose was to help bolster the agriculture industry. In that regard, it continues to do that and is also the location for the Alabama National Fair and the Southeastern Livestock Exposition/Rodeo.

Over time, it has hosted concerts from some of the world's greatest entertainers, including Elvis Presley, Elton John, and the Jackson 5, as well as for other performers long before Montgomery had a facility of sufficient size to host such events. For the remainder of the year, the Coliseum has 32 booked events, from the Alabama Truck Driving Championship to the Holiday Mall, scheduled for late November. Facility improvements will continue to make Garrett a viable venue for events in Central Alabama and keep adding to the appeal of the Montgomery Metro Area.

#### MONTGOMERY SUNRISE ROTARY

Montgomery Sunrise Rotary has completed most of the work on the club's district grant project: improvements to the public hiking and biking trail system at Auburn University Montgomery. Club members have installed new benches on the trail system and placed an information kiosk at the trailhead (with cork board and plexiglass doors for the posting of announcements). These improvements are made in memory of our late club member Jimmy Hill, and a plaque on the information kiosk commemorates Jimmy's life of service.









On Saturday, May 3, 2025, Montgomery Sunrise Rotary Club celebrated its  $30^{th}$  anniversary by



hosting the 3<sup>rd</sup> annual Shrimp Boil. The event

was marked by delicious food, great music (courtesy of Eddie Dennis and The Low Five Band), a classic car show, and shared fellowship. Donations totaling \$20,200



were presented to two outstanding nonprofit organizations, Hope Inspired Ministries and Service Dogs of Alabama.







Sunrise Rotary also honored Chappy's Deli owner David Barranco with its 2025 Commitment to Service Award. Because Mr. Barranco had a previous commitment, the award was presented to him a day earlier at Sunrise's weekly Friday meeting.

#### SELMA ROTARY

The Rotary Club of Selma launched a new project at Bruce K. Craig Elementary School this school year that provides immediate-need items to 300 students. Rotary Club of Selma used a \$3,000 district Rotary grant to



stock a Caring Closet at the Selma school with items that the students in Pre-K through fifth grades need, but are not ordinarily provided by the district. BK Craig is adjacent to Craig Field and is also home to Southside Primary students after their school closed in 2023 due to mold issues.



"The closet is packed with items such as new uniform pants and shirts, hoodies, undershirts and underwear, socks, deodorant, toothbrushes, snacks and bottled water that Rotary Club hoped would help the students feel comfortable while learning and children learn better when they are feeling

their best," Fisher said.

When Rotary started the project and selected BK Craig as the recipient, a team of Rotarians met with Principal Alison Turner and other staff to identify needs for the closet. And they found that the school – like many others – already had a closet with a handful of items to meet these immediate needs just at a smaller level. It is manned by secretary, Aurielle Boyd. So the club decided to ramp up the school's efforts and stock a full Caring Closet. Rotary started by installing a large shelf donated by Rotarian Adam Day. Then they bought several Rubbermaid containers and packed them with the bulk items bought on Amazon since there is no warehouse retailer like Sam's in the Black Belt. Morgan



Academy's Interact Club donated hoodies and sweatshirts. Rural Health Medical Program agreed to provide health items like toothbrushes. The team also got donations such as bottled water from Pepsi in Selma and 50 pounds of snack food items from the Selma Area Food Bank. Rotary bought the school a washer-dryer set that was delivered in April so the teachers could wash the Pre-K napmats while at school instead of taking turns taking them home every weekend. President Cindy Fisher said the

club wanted to help teachers cover the cost to meet children's needs that they often pay

for out of their pockets.

"Supplying the children with basic needs items helps them learn better in their school environment, it levels the playing field for those at a disadvantage at home and increases their academic performance and quality of life," said Fisher, who also is publisher of the Selma Sun and Black Belt News Network. "Not having adequate and appropriate clothing can impact a variety of social and economic aspects of a child's life, including peer acceptance and education opportunities."



Principal Turner said the school has been able to send the food home with the children in the most need and appreciates having the uniform shirts and pants for those without extras and mess up their clothes during the day.

"We are so grateful to be one of your partners," Turner said, adding that having items in a closet "gives the children additional support during the school year." Dallas County Superintendent Anthony Sampson said it's the principal's role to connect with the community and understand the needs of students and their families. What the principal communicates to service organizations like Rotary to fill those needs makes an impact on the students' learning experience, he said.

#### SELMA ROTARY

"The Caring Closet touches more than individual kids – it impacts families," said Sampson, who is also a member of the Rotary Club of Selma. "We appreciate the work of Rotary and are pleased to partner with the club. They are making a difference in the lives of students." Fisher added that the project answers Rotary's motto "Service Above Self" by investing in and supporting the community's youth. "I wish we could support a Caring Closet in every Selma-Dallas County school," she added.





The 2025 scholarship went to Sydney Pritchett of Selma High, Delaney McHugh of Morgan Academy, Kenlynn Lawrence of Meadowview Christian, Radiance Ransom of Dallas County High and Saniya Wilson of Saints Virtual Academy. The scholarship funds, ranging from \$2,500 to \$400, were given as part of the club's annual Renee Kelley Wilkerson Memorial Scholarship competition, named in honor of a former Rotary president and owner of Tally Ho Restaurant who passedaway in 2017.

The seniors won the funds through a speech competition talking about their academic, extracurricular, community and other accomplishments and plans for higher education achievement in the future.
